The Planning Commission of the Town of Los Gatos met in the Town Council Chambers, 110 E. Main Street, at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, April 12, 2000 in regular session.

MINUTES OF MARCH 22, 2000

Motion by Commissioner Lyon, seconded by Commissioner Muller, to adopt the Minutes of March 22, 2000 with corrections.

Carried unanimously. Commissioner Nachison absent.

WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS

VERBAL COMMUNICATIONS

Vice Chairman Bruno announced that this was the time and place to address the Commission on matters not on this evening's agenda.

Ray Davis, spoke regarding traffic concerns relating to regulation of land use issues.

REQUEST FOR CONTINUANCES

Vice Chairman Bruno stated that Item #3 is requesting a continuance.

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Commissioner Mueller questioned if approval of this application would set a precedence.

Mr. Korb explained the grounds for granting a variance, the required findings, and stated that the fact that an error may, or may not, have occurred is not part of the physical condition of the property. Mr. Korb stated that each variance application must be considered individually and the Commission has the discretion to approve or deny, based on the findings that must be made, persuant to Town Code and State Law.

Commissioner Lyon questioned how the height was determined.

Ms. Baily explained that it is measured by existing grade or finished grade; whichever has the lower profile and accessory structure are measured the same way.

Motion by Commissioner Quintana, seconded by Commissioner Lyon, to return 15690 Gum Tree Lane/U-00-1/V-00-1 to DRC for redesign to meet the height requirements.

COMMISSION COMMENTS

Commissioner Quintana stated that she understands the emotions that the applicants are experiencing, however, based on the findings that are required for a variance, and acknowledging that the Town grants very few variances, returning this application to DRC is necessary. Ms. Quintana questioned Item #3, relating to the building height, of the conditions of approval for the CUP, and stated she is not comfortable bifurcating the application.

Mr. Korb explained the procedure, relating to the conditions of approval, and the bifurcating of the application.

Carried unanimously. Commissioner Nachison absent.

Motion by Vice Chairman Bruno, seconded by Commissioner Lyon, to continue this matter to June 14, 2000.

Carried unanimously. Commissioner Nachison absent.

MARCHMONT DRIVE, 300/PRJ-99-062/PRJ-99-063. (00.10)

Requesting approval of a Conditional Use Permit for a Master Plan of Hillbrook School and approval of an Architecture and Site application to demolish an existing classroom building and to construct a new classroom building adjacent to the old building on property zoned HR-1. PROPERTY OWNER/APPLICANT: Hillbrook School.

Vice Chairman Bruno disclosed that his son attends Hillbrook School but he does not feel he needs to recuse himself because he has no financial interest in the school.

Mr. Korb stated that the Political Reform Act has been examined and it has been determined that there is no conflict of interest on the part of Mr. Bruno.

The following people from the audience spoke regarding this matter.

Jim Hilton, 300 Marchmont Drive, representing the school, stated that the building is non ADA compliant and

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needs to be retrofited to meet earthquake standards. He gave an overview of the project and the proposed master plan for the entire school.

Commissioner Quintana questioned the increased enrollment at the school.

Mr. Hilton stated that the use permit is based on 315 students and their enrollment has always been between 283-305 and they have never been above the 315 persons.

Commissioner Muller stated she is concerned about the traffic and speeding problems that exist and impact the surrounding neighborhood. Ms. Muller stated that this is an ongoing problem and questioned how the applicant planned to mitigate these concerns, especially during the construction periods.

Mr. Hilton stated that they are constantly working on this concern by educating the parents, contacting the Police Department, erecting signs, reconfiguring the parking lot to get the drop off traffic off the residential streets, and advocating car-pooling. He explained how they have restricted the construction traffic in the past.

Vice Chairman Bruno questioned the fire road and the bridge access and if it would be safer and easier to have construction traffic use the Anne Arbor gate.

Mr. Hilton stated that he would welcome the use of this access during construction because he would have better control over the contractors and it would be safer.

Commissioner Quintana clarified that the number of classrooms being demolished and rebuilt remains the same.

Arthur Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, submitted information from Dr. Charles Bass, who had to leave these proceedings prior to this hearing. Mr. Myers explained his concerns regarding the number of students and the possible increase of students. He referred to the pictures of prior construction, and construction vehicles, which he has submitted for the record, and reiterated his concerns regarding construction vehicles. Mr. Myers explained the impact that also occurs during the evening and week-end hours due to the abundance of extra curricular activities that occur at the school. He stated that on Family Fun Night, the Disc Jockey was so loud that they had to leave their home and stay elsewhere, and reiterated that the noise and safety issues from the traffic is paramount.

Elaine Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, explained the type of traffic and people problems that they experience and the increase activity during holiday times. Ms. Myers feels the situation is hopeless and she would like to see the gate at Anne Arbor Drive opened to relieve the construction impact on Marchmont.

Jim Hilton concluded by stating that they have done everything they can to mitigate the neighbors' concerns and will continue to work on the problems. Mr. Hilton stated that they have addressed the DJ issue and will do everything they can to work with the neighbors.

Commissioner Lyon questioned the hours relating to the gardening service, the amplified music, and the number of extra curricular activities that occur on the campus.

Mr. Hilton stated that they have addressed the gardening noise issues by moving the work time frame, will move the music to the middle of the campus, have athletic events which conclude by 5:00 p.m., and dances which conclude by 9:30 p.m. He stated that the campus is not rented to any outside group.

Commissioner Quintana referred to the conditions of approval and questioned if the applicant would agree to having only one amplified, outdoor event, per year.

Mr. Hilton stated they would agree to this condition.

There was no one else in the audience to speak to this matter.

Vice Chairman Bruno closed the Public Hearing.

Commissioner Muller questioned opening the gate at Anne Arbor during construction which she feels would be a solution for the construction that will occur on that side of the campus.

Vice Chairman Bruno questioned what restrictions could be placed to disallow stacking of construction vehicles on neighborhood streets.

Mr. Curtis explained that there can be a construction plan put forth by the school to eliminate these problems. He stated that the key is to disallow any stacking or queuing off site and this can be added as a condition of approval.

Commissioner Quintana questioned why both entrances have not been open for both students and construction.

Mr. Curtis explained that the neighbors have opposed it in the past,

Commissioner Muller questioned adding conditions which are more stringent regarding the extra curricular activities. Ms. Muller would like to see a plateau set so there is no increase in activities.

Mr. Curtis explained that a school is a permitted use in a residential zone and the Town has the right to apply any conditions they feel appropriate.

Motion by Commissioner Lyon, seconded by Vice Chairman Bruno, to approve 300 Marchmont Drive/PRJ-99-062/PRJ-99.063 with the following considerations, conditions, and findings.

CONSIDERATIONS

As required by Section 29.20.150 of the Town Code for Architecture and Site applications, the Commission deems that these considerations have been addressed.

CONDITIONS:

300 Marchmont Drive

Project Application PRJ-99-062 (Conditional Use Permit) Project Application PRJ-99-063 (Architecture and Site)

Requesting approval of a Conditional Use Permit for a Master Plan of Hillbrook School and approval of an Architecture and Site application to demolish an existing classroom building and to construct a new classroom building adjacent to the old building on property zoned HR-1.

PROPERTY OWNER/APPLICANT: Hillbrook School

CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

(To the Satisfaction of the Director of Community Development) (Planning Section)

 EXPIRATION. This approval will expire two years from the approval date pursuant to Section 29.20.320 of the Town Code unless the application is vested. Vesting for the Master Site Plan includes

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the demolition and reconstruction of the new classroom building under Architecture and Site Application PRJ-99-063. Once the application is vested, there are no further time limits to for the Master Site Plan.

- 2. EMERGENCY ACCESS ROAD. The emergency access road to Ann Arbor Drive shall not be opened up at any time to public or school use. The road may be opened for construction access only if it is part of the approved construction plan for an Architecture and Site application.
- 3. CAR-POOLING. The applicant shall maintain and promote (at least quarterly) a car-pooling program for their students.
- 4. ENROLLMENT. The enrollment shall be limited to 315 students.
- 5. EMPLOYEES. The after school maximum number of employees on site during activities in the gymnasium which draws an audience shall not exceed 12.
- 6. NIGHTTIME ACTIVITIES. There shall be no more than two nighttime activities per year; all nighttime activities shall conclude by 10:30 P.M. Nighttime activity is defined as any activity continuing past 9:00 P.M. All activities which draw an audience to the gymnasium shall take place after hours.
- 7. GYMNASIUM DOORS AND WINDOWS. The loading doors on the Ann Arbor side shall be closed at all times whenever activities are being held inside the gymnasium. The other doors and windows in the gymnasium shall be allowed to remain open during activities.
- 8. MUSIC. Music from live bands shall not be amplified. One amplified DJ event is permitted per year.
- 9. LEASE/RENTALS. No lease or rental of the gymnasium shall be permitted to third parties.

(To the Satisfaction of the Director of Parks and Public Works) (Parks and Forestry Section)

10. BUILDING FOOTPRINTS. The footprints of the future buildings may be required to be modified during the Architecture and Site approval process to reduce tree impacts.

ARCHITECTURE AND SITE CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

(To the Satisfaction of the Planning Director) (Planning Section)

- 1. EXPIRATION. This approval will expire two years from the approval date pursuant to Section 29.20.320 of the Town Code unless the application is vested.
- 2. TREE REMOVAL PERMIT. A Tree Removal Permit shall be obtained prior to the issuance of a Building, Grading or Encroachment Permit.
- 3. RECYCLING. All wood, metal, glass, and aluminum materials generated from the demolished structure shall be deposited to a company which will recycle the materials. Receipts from the company(s) accepting these materials, noting type and weight of material, shall be submitted to the Town prior to the Town's demolition inspection.
- 4. DEMOLITION. The existing classroom building shall be demolished prior to final occupancy of the new classrooms.
- 5. CONSTRUCTION PLAN. A construction plan shall be submitted to and approved by the Town prior to the issuance of a building permit. The plan shall include that construction vehicles shall park on campus during construction, there shall be no stacking or queuing of construction vehicles on neighborhood streets and no unloading of heavy vehicles shall occur on neighborhood streets. Vehicles of construction employees shall be parked on campus. The Ann Arbor Drive emergency access road

may be opened and used for construction access only.

(Building Section)

- PERMITS REQUIRED. A building permit application shall be required for each proposed structure. 6. Separate Electrical/Mechanical/Plumbing permit shall be required as necessary.
- 7. CONDITIONS. The Conditions of Approval shall be stated in full on the cover sheet of the construction plan submitted for building permit.
- PAD CERTIFICATION. A building pad certificate shall be prepared by a licensed civil engineer or 8. land surveyor shall be submitted to the project building inspector upon foundation inspection. This certificate shall certify that the building pad elevation and on-site retaining wall locations and elevations are in accordance with the approved plans. Horizontal and vertical controls shall be set and certified by a licensed surveyor or registered civil engineer for the following items:
 - a. Pad elevation
 - b. Finish floor elevation
- TITLE 24 ENERGY COMPLIANCE. California Title 24 Energy Compliance forms CR- IR and MF-IR 9. shall be printed on the construction plans.
- PLANS. The construction plans for this project shall be prepared under direct supervision of a licensed 10. architect or engineer. (Business and Professionals Code Section 5538)
- DEMOLITION PERMIT REQUIREMENTS. Contact the Bay Area Air Quality Management District 11. (415) 771-6000 and complete their process as necessary before obtaining a demolition permit from the Town Building Department. No demolition work shall be done without first obtaining a demolition permit from the Town.
- TITLE 24 ACCESSIBILITY COMMERCIAL: On site parking facility shall comply with the latest 12. California Title 24 Accessibility Standards for the disabled.
- TITLE 24 ACCESSIBILITY COMMERCIAL: On site general path of travel shall comply with the 13. latest California Title 24 Accessibility Standards. Work shall include but not be limited to accessibility to building entrances from parking facilities and sidewalks.
- TITLE 24 ACCESSIBILITY COMMERCIAL: The building shall be upgraded to comply with the 14. latest California Title 24 Accessibility Standards for the disabled. Necessary work shall be first investigated by the design architect then confirmed by the Town staff.
- NON-POINT SOURCE POLLUTION STANDARDS. The Town standard Santa Clara Valley 15. Nonpoint Source Pollution Control Program specification sheet shall be part of plan submittal. The Specification sheet (Size 24" x 36") is available at the Building Department service counter.
- ADDITIONAL AGENCY APPROVALS REQUIRED. The project requires the following agencies 16. approval before issuance of a building permit:
 - a. West Valley Sanitation District 378-2407
 - Santa Clara County Fire Department: 378-4010 b.
 - Los Gatos School District: 395-5570 ¢. Note: Obtain the school district forms from the Town Building Department, after the Building Department has approved the building permits.

TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF PARKS AND PUBLIC WORKS (Parks and Forestry Section)

NEW TREES. A total of 18 15 gallon Town approved trees shall be planted on the east side of the 17. property as shown on the approved site plan. The specie of tree shall be approved by the Parks Superintendent. Newly planted trees shall be double-staked, using rubber tree ties and shall be planted

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prior to final occupancy.

18. FINAL TREE PLANTING PLAN. The final approved tree planting plan shall be submitted with the building permit with copies provided to the Planning and Parks and Forestry Section.

19. IRRIGATION. All newly planted landscaping shall be irrigated by an in-ground irrigation system. Special care shall be taken to avoid irrigation which will endanger existing native trees and shrubs.

20. AERATION TUBES. Any impervious area encroaching under the dripline of existing trees shall have aeration tubes installed.

21. GENERAL. All existing trees to remain and newly planted trees shown on the plan are specific subjects

of approval of this plan and must remain on site.

22. WATER EFFICIENCY. This project is subject to the Town's Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance, Chapter 26, Article IV of the Town Code. A review fee based on current resolution shall be paid when the landscape, irrigation plans and water calculations are submitted for review, prior to the issuance of a building permit.

23. PROTECTIVE FENCING. Prior to any building permits being issued, the applicant shall meet with the Parks Superintendent concerning the need for protective fencing around existing trees. Such fencing shall be installed prior to issuance of a building permit and shall be maintained during construction.

24. FOUNDATION. Any buildings under the dripline of existing trees shall have a foundation built from pier and grade beam to minimize tree impacts.

TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE SANTA CLARA COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT:

25. REQUIRED FIRE FLOW. Required fire flow is 1500 GPM at 20 psi. residual pressure.

26. FIRE LANE MARKING REQUIRED. Provide marking for all roadways within the project. Markings shall be per fire department specifications. Installation shall also conform to Local Government Standards and Fire Department Standard.

FINDINGS

As required by Section 29.20.190 of the Town Code for granting a Conditional Use Permit, the Commission finds:

1. The proposed use of the property is essential or desirable to the public convenience or welfare because an existing school and the continued use of that school is desirable to the public convenience and welfare.

2. The proposed use will not impair the integrity and character of the zone because the school already exists and by Town code this use is acceptable in the zone.

3. The proposed use would not be detrimental to public health, safety or general welfare because

it is an existing use and is allowed in the zone.

4. The proposed use of the property is in harmony with the various elements or objectives of the general plan and the purposes of the Town code because it is an existing use and the use is in harmony with the general plan and the Town Code.

As required by Section 15314 of the State Environmental Guidelines as adopted by the Town, the Commission finds that this project is Categorically Exempt.

COMMISSION COMMENTS

Los Gatos Planning Commission April 12, 2000

Adopted

Commissioner Lyon requested that the school work more closely with the neighborhood to mitigate their concerns.

Commissioner Quintana stated that she feels approval of this matter is premature because she would like to revisit the traffic situation and the use of the Anne Arbor gate. Ms. Quintana would rather see the application continued until additional information can be presented regarding the negative/positive impacts relating to the use of both campus gates. Ms. Quintana stated that she is not opposed to the school, but would just like to see the traffic concerns addressed.

Carried 4-1-1. Commissioner Quintana voting no. Commissioner Nachison absent.

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TOWN OF LOS GATOS CALIFORNIA TOWN COUNCIL/PARKING AUTHORITY JOINT REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY June 5, 2000/Minutes

TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council/Parking Authority/Redevelopment Agency of the Town of Los Gatos met in the Council Chambers of the Town Hall, 110 East Main Street, at 7:07 p.m., Monday, June 5, 2000, in joint regular session including study session.

ROLL CALL

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Given by all in attendance.

STUDY SESSION/SANTA CLARA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AGENCY (00.40)

Mayor Blanton introduced Michael Evanhoe, Director of Congestion Management & Highway Programs, who discussed the Proposed Highway 17 Construction Program. He delineated designs and proposals for widening Highway 17 through Los Gatos; reconfiguring Highway 17 and Highway 85 interchange at Lark Avenue; and modifying the clover leaf at Highway 9 and Highway 17, including the addition of traffic lights in that location.

Council Consensus:

The configuration of the interchange between Highway 85 South to Highway 17 at Lark is working and accidents do not seem to be prevalent. If something is done in this location the height of the ramping should be no higher than it is now, and if at all feasible the tennis courts should be impacted as little as possible. The 5.6ML can be allocated to improving the highway south of The Cats for alleviating accident clean up.

There were three council members in favor of widening Highway 17, believing that commuters would remain on the highway and off town streets if the traffic movement was eased.

A different access to Highway 17 at Highway 9 and additional traffic lights on Highway 9 did not seem to warrant the expense for the amount of traffic that might be diverted from downtown.

The savings from the Highway 9 project and the Lark Ave. proposal could be better spent adding improvements to the mountain section of Highway 17 improving areas prone to accidents and improving conditions which would allow more speedy removal of accidents from the mountain highway. These improvements would keep through traffic moving on the highway and off the Los Gatos streets.

Motion by Mr. Hutchins, seconded by Mr. Pirzynski, that Council/Agency approve the Minutes of May 1, 2000 Joint Council/Agency Regular Meeting as submitted. Carried unanimously.

Motion by Mr. Hutchins, seconded by Mr. Pirzynski, that Council/Agency approve the Minutes of May 22, 2000 Joint Council/Agency Regular Meeting as submitted. Carried unanimously.

VERBAL COMMUNICATIONS

Pedestrian Safety:

Ray Davis, resident, spoke about stop signs and crosswalks being kept up for visibility and safety.

Bear Creek Open Space Preserve:

Pete Denevi, 129 Vista Real Court, spoke about the proposed Los Gatos Country Club above Lexington Dam, and noted the potential litigation against Mid-Pen and asked that Council consider any monetary donations to this open space request being clearly defined as going toward land acquisition and not litigation costs.

Skateboard Park in Los Gatos:

Steve Glickman, 145 Maricopa Drive, School Board Member, spoke about the skateboard proposal for our town, and noted the activities—begone to bring it to fruition.—The Park Commission has been working on it and the location that has been suggested is Oak Meadow Park.—Council will watch for a recommendation from the Parks Commission before making its assessment of the proposal.

Review of the Planning Commission:

James McIlvain, 15331 Francis Oaks Way, submitted an analysis of the actions taken by the Planning Commission.

HEARINGS

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/APPEAL (17.09)

Mayor Blanton stated that this was the time and place duly noted for public hearing to consider an appeal of a Planning Commission decision approving applications for a Conditional Use Permit for a Master Plan of Hillbrook School and approval of an Architecture and Site application to demolish an existing classroom building and to construct a new classroom building adjacent to the old building on property zoned HR-1. Project Application PRJ-99-062 (Conditional Use Permit). Project Application PRJ-99-063 (Architecture and Site). Property Location: 300 Marchmont Drive. Property Owner/Applicant: Hillbrook School. Appellant: Elaine and Arthur Myers.

The following people from the audience addressed this issue:

Martin Durmer, 255 Marchmont Drive, spoke of traffic, noise and safety issues. Carpooling should be mandated. Late night events generating noise and traffic overflow should be regulated.

Jim Hilton, business manager for Hillbrook, 718 Ashby Drive, Palo Alto, spoke of the application to replace an existing building that is not earthquake proof nor ADA compliant. The noted that the

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enrollment will not be increased due to these upgrades, nor will traffic increase. The school is willing to work with the neighbors regarding these issues.

HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Art Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, spoke of traffic volume and increase noise level. He made reference to a neighborhood petition. The increased extra curricular school events have added to the impacts on the neighborhood.

Judy Ardizzone, 16414 Hilow, wanted the traffic in the area to be dealt with

Milton Clound, Marchmont Drive, spoke of the smaller school at the top of the hill thirty years ago, and he noted the large increase to this school and the great increase in the traffic in this area. He asked that Ann Arbor be opened for foot traffic and bicycle traffic.

Mul Aiway, 16734 Marchmont Drive, asked that the traffic for this school be shared among the other neighborhoods and not just funneled up Marchmont.

Lee Higginson, 127 Ann Arbor Drive, noted that the project does not generate additional traffic or usage and therefore there is no need to request access to Ann Arbor.

Judy Ardizzone, 16414 Hilow Road, asked for mitigation methods for the traffic problem.

Milton Macloud, 285 Marchmont Drive,

Jeffrey Barnett, 101 Wollin, believed there was a legal basis to grant the appeal.

Barbara Dotson, 239 Marchmont Drive, asked for use of the viable alternative to the traffic impact, and have traffic move in a one way direction through Marchmont and then out Ann Arbor Drive.

Patti Elliot, 269 Marchmont Drive, Marchmont, children can not ride their bikes with all the school generated traffic. Marchmont should insist that mitigation methods be used for this problem, such as car pooling and smaller cars.

Diane Hembry, 201 Marchmont Drive, spoke of requirement of bus use by Hillbrook to keep traffic down. She asked for a moratorium at Hillbrook until the traffic issue is solved.

Dan Natchison, 115 Ann Arbor Drive, does not want the gate open to through traffic due to traffic safety issues at the corner of Shannon and Ann Arbor.

Greg Moss, 16788 Littlefield Lane, spoke about the Englewood neighborhood being impacted by the traffic generated by Hillbrook School.

Barry Bakken, 111 Wolin Way, ask Hillbrook how to solve the problem.

Bob Derham, 100 Wollin Way, lived 27 years on Ann Arbor, dealt with Hillbrook all this time, watched parents picking up children that climb through the gate. Gate should remain closed.

Raol Workhouff, 269 Marchmont Drive, do not allow additional construction or remodeling until traffic mitigation plan is developed. One way traffic flow; commercial lot used for bus shuttle to the school; car pooling established; and a formal cap on the enrollment.

Stu Brewter, 16425 Hilow Road, spoke about safety on this road and traffic mitigation.

Marty Salazar, 16602 Marchmont Drive, opposed to any change in the use permit

Michael Taylor, 119 Ann Arbor, opening the gate on Ann Arbor will just create another set of problems.

Della Dodds, 256 Marchmont, spoke to the issue and asked that all people be allowed to speak and give new ideas. She asked for a cap to be placed on enrollment.

Ray Davis, resident, spoke about general plan, traffic policies, original land use permit, traffic studies, and the need for CEQA study.

Sandy Forbes, 123 Ann Arbor Drive, did not want the traffic through the back gate. Asked for different times for the students to arrive at school.

Hal Chase, 107 Ann Arbor Drive, no use of the back gate, consider the activities that are allowed

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on campus, use of bussing, and limit late night noise.

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HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Dave Culbertson, 16528 Marchmont Drive, spoke of walkers, joggers, going through both ways. He suggested opening the gate one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon. Asked for speed signs.

David Hembry, 201 Marchmont, asked for a traffic study.

Charle Best, 149 Longmeadow, asked when Hilow would be on the street improvement list.

Jim Randall, 260 Marchmont Court, lived there 27 years, noted the young families with children and the traffic safety issues impacting the surrounding neighborhoods. The school needs to address this issue and find solutions for the traffic problem. He suggested use of alternate routes and bussing.

Diana Daughters, 145 Burgoyne Street, former teacher at Hillbrook, asked for some additional time to work out the issues that have been discussed tonight.

Art Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, spoke again about traffic and the need to find solutions.

Jim Hilton, business manager for Hillbrook, addressed some ways of mitigating the traffic.

Sarah Bayne, 300 Marchmont Drive, Hillbrook Administrator, noted willingness to participate in any traffic study which would help alleviate these problems. She noted that the school had cut their late night activities by nearly one half last year. She was willing to ensure that all evening functions would be ended by 9:30 p.m. so that traffic noises would be over by 10:00 p.m. No one else from the audience addressed this issue.

Motion by Mr. Attaway, seconded by Mr. Pirzynski, to close the public hearing. Carried unanimously.

Council Comments:

Mr. Attaway asked that the school submit a parking plan and traffic mitigation plan and requested that the school work with the neighbors and the staff.

Mrs. Lubeck reviewed the request for a master plan for the school which opens up the conditional use permit of the school and allows Council to look at these issues and make requirements of the school. Requirements of schools are based on the square footage of the buildings and numbers of teachers and not on the numbers of students. There are 86 striped on site parking spaces at this time which is not sufficient for the needs. She suggested using Town's traffic engineer to review this problem and offer some solutions for the school and neighbors. She asked that bicycle and pedestrian use on Ann Arbor be reviewed. She thinks the Planning Commission needed to look more carefully at the Master Plan and the placement of the buildings for the CUP. She would like this item returned to the Planning Commission and ask that the Master Plan be looked at in this perspective. That the Commission ask for a traffic study and request that the applicant participate in the costs for arriving at some traffic calming solutions.

Mr. Pirzynski supported the previous statements, noting that the minutes of the Planning Commission did not reflect the neighborhoods' concerns and the breadth of the issues involved.

Motion by Mr. Pirzynski, seconded by Mrs. Lubeck, to grant the appeal and return this issue to the Planning Commission on the basis of new information that has been generated and which is

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> significant enough for them to continue to work on the proposal and request a traffic study. (Motion includes the following comments to the Planning Commission.)

HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Continued Council Comments:

Mr. Pirzynski did not want this issue to play one neighborhood against another. He asked for a study that would be orientated toward mitigation measures that are workable.

Council noted that there are not only traffic issues but other extreme problems in this area. Council spoke of the Shannon Road traffic impacting on Ann Arbor and the need to include this neighborhood in the study. Council asked that the Ann Arbor gate be considered for pedestrian and bicycle access. The number of parking spaces for day time use and evening and special event use be evaluated. Mandatory bussing and car pooling considered as options. Limit the number of events and the time of the events. Hold community meetings so that the school, parents and neighbors can work out the solutions to these problems. There are competing goods at issue which must be reconciled. Take the comments, the issues, the potential mitigation options, and the consensus resolutions back to Planning Commission. Order a traffic (calming study and scope of work from the budget which will be in sync with the neighbors. Begin the process within the next six weeks keeping all interested parties informed.

Motion includes comments to Planning Commission. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Blanton stated that this was the time and place duly noted for public hearing to consider an appeal of a Planning

The following people from the audience addressed this item:

Skip Spiering, representing Dividend Homes, spoke about the grading needed for this project and noted that the Causey Lane area has sufficient frontage rights. Documents were submitted to show Causey is a private road and he spoke of legal access. A presentation was given showing sufficient parking provided for on site, and noting that this configuration gives a better buffer zone between properties.

Willis Flood, 131 Pinta Court, listed many items of this project that were inconsistent with the Hillside Specific Plan and asked that the neighbors be given time to review the newly submitted

plans presented this evening. Bob Bixler, 104 Pinta Court, approved the original plan for this subdivision. Housing fits into the neighborhood the way that it should.

VERBAL COMMUNICATIONS

Chair Bruno announced that this was the time and place to address the Commission on matters not on this evening's agenda.

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NEW PUBLIC HEARINGS

MARCHMONT DRIVE, 300/PRJ-99-063/PRJ-99-063. (00.06)

Requesting approval of a Conditional Use Permit for a Master Plan of Hillbrook School and approval of an Architecture and Site application to demolih an existing classroom building and to construct a new classroom building adjacent to the old uilding on property zoned HR-1. PROPERTY OWNER/APPLICANT: Hillbrook School.

Chair Bruno explained that this matter was being heard on remand from the Town Council and the Planning Commission was given specific evaluations to consider.

Chair Bruno stated that although he can legally participate in this matter, he would refrain from discussion and would abstain on any motion. Mr. Bruno explained that this was in fairness to the neighborhood because he has a child who is now attending Hillbrook School. Mr. Bruno reiterated that he is under no legal restraints regarding this hearing but has chosen not to participate out of fairness.

The following people from the audience spoke regarding this matter.

Sarah Bayne, representing Hillbrook School, explained in detail what the school has done to address the neighbors concerns regarding traffic and speeding. Ms. Bayne stated that they will continue to educate their parents of the needs to adhere to the rules and regulations. Ms. Bayne explained that the use of car pooling has increased by over 40% this year and they are researching additional alternatives. She referred to the traffic study that the school has done voluntarily and stated that they have limited evening events to no more than six per year which is a significant decrease and have required the evening events end by 9 p.m. Ms. Bayne explained the three neighborhood meetings that were held in June, July, and September and stated that she believes the measures that have been taken meet the recommendations of the Town Council. Ms. Bayne stated that they have also elected to make the following good will gestures to their neighbors: 1)prohibited all Hillbrook parking on Marchmont Drive permanently; 2)increased their on site parking spaces by 20; 3)met with ALTRANS and are reviewing their proposal; 4)are researching the possibility of busing students; and, 5) limited week-end use of the campus and prohibit any non Hillbrook use of the gym or field. Ms. Bayne explained in detail the school's master plan and goals and stated that they do not plan to ask for any change in the number of students which are presently permitted under their CUP which is 315 students.

Commissioner Quintana questioned which outside groups used the Hillbrook campus.

Ms. Bayne stated that soccer teams, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, and several churches used the campus.

Barry Bakken, 111 Wollin Way, would like to see what the impact of the changes produce; and, is concerned that by adding 7,500 square feet, the school may want to increase its enrollment. Mr. Bakken does not feel that Ann Arbor should be used for access.

Glenn Brown, 205 Marchmont Drive, has gone to all the neighborhood meetings and feels that Hillbrook is

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not responding to the neighborhood concerns. Mr. Brown feels that the Town needs to also help with the traffic problems throughout the Town and in this neighborhood.

Nancy Stengele, 104 Ann Arbor Court feels that Hillbrook is trying to pit neighborhood against neighborhood in order to divert attention from the real issue. Ms. Stengele is not in favor of having the Ann Arbor gate opened for any reason.

James Finkle, 111 Ann Arbor Drive, gave a history of the closure of the Ann Arbor gate and stated that he would like to see car-pooling initiated and required and an assembly area defined to assist with busing the children.

Martin Dermer, 255 Marchmont Drive, feels that Hillbrook has increased their enrollment which has increased the neighborhood problems. Mr. Dermer would like to see the Ann Arbor gate opened and everyone share the burden. He would also like to see mandatory carpooling.

Dan Nachison, 115 Ann Arbor Drive, feels the opening of the Ann Arbor gate will create a tremendous mess. Mr. Nachison explained the traffic pattern in the area and stated that he would like to see specific, mandatory action taken by the school to help solve the problem and whether we can require TDM mitigation.

Jeffrey Barnett, 101 Wollin Way, objects to the traffic report and gave his reasons why. Mr. Barnett feels that people will be driving into his neighborhood if pedestrian traffic is allowed via the Ann Arbor gate. He stated that he believes that approximately 90 cars would be diverted to his neighborhood if the gate were opened.

Michael Taylor, 119 Ann Arbor Drive, feels the traffic situation in his area is evolving and the traffic problems on Marchmont are created specifically by Hillbrook. Mr. Taylor explained the scenario that can happen if homes are developed on Shannon Road.

Sandy Forbes, 123 Ann Arbor Drive, would like to see the students bussed to Hillbrook because she believes this is possible and would reduce the traffic problems. Ms. Forbes gave examples of other schools or organizations that use buses to alleviate the traffic problems.

Elaine Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, submitted a petition and requested that no decision be made until the traffic problems have been resolved. Ms. Myers is also concerned that the school enrollment will increase. She explained the type of traffic and speeding problems that occur.

Ray Davis, feels that a shuttle bus would solve the problems.

Jeanne Aikman, 48 Whitney Avenue, feels there is a bigger problem within the school than traffic. Ms. Aikman explained how she thought the campus would be altered by the proposed new class rooms and stated that she believes that busing is possible.

Della Dodds, 256 Marchmont Ct., stated that there is no mutual agreed upon traffic initigation plans. Ms. Dodds read from the traffic study and stated that she finds it difficult to believe that the Town would allow the CUP without specific traffic mitigation.

POINT OF ORDER

Motion by Chair Bruno, seconded by Commissioner Muller to continue this meeting to 2:00 a.m., Thursday, October 26, 2000.

Carried unanimously. Commissioner Lyon absent.

Jimmye Mollin, 5903 Dry Oak Ct., San Jose, teacher at Hillbrook school stated that the teachers had input into the strategic plan for the school.

Candy Braken, 111 Wollin Way, did her own cross traffic evaluation and feels that the traffic problems will increase. Ms. Braken feels that Hillbrook has to find a solution to the traffic concerns.

Patti Elliot, 269 Marchmont Drive, would like to see this as an opportunity for Hillbrook to deal with the problem. Ms. Elliot feels that Hillbrook should be required to deal with the problem before receiving their CUP. She explained the different methods available to solving the problems via carpooling or the use of buses.

Devin Derham-Burk, 100 Wollin Way, emphasized that the Town Council's directives have not been met by Hillbrook and she feels that full, good faith, compliance with each of the directives should be met before approval is given.

Barbara Dodson, 239 Marchmont Drive, believes that the increase in traffic constitutes a change of circumstances that should compel the Town to reconsider the closure of the back entrance of the school. Ms. Dodson feels that this would also reduce traffic community wide and she does not feel that Marchmont Drive should be forced to take the entire burden of this traffic problem.

Robert Dunne, 124 Hilow Court, President of the Board of Trustees for Hillbrook School, stated that changes have been made to address the traffic concerns and approval of this application will not deter them from continuing to work with the neighborhood to alleviate the traffic problems. Mr. Dunne explained that they are evaluating all alternatives.

Lucille Weidman, 215 Carlester Drive, suggested that any CUP granted should contain a required six month, or one year, formal review of the CUP; to cap the number of vehicles traversing Marchmont Drive per day; to cap the number of the present enrollment of 315; to mandate the use of a professional initiated carpool program, school bus service, and shuttle bus service of all school events at a staging area away from either neighborhood. Ms. Weidman further requested that no master plan approval be given until the traffic volume is significantly reduced and all other traffic related problems have been solved. Ms. Weidman stated that the staging of the dismissal time only prolongs and agony and this should also be considered. Ms. Weidman gave other suggestions to solve the concerns.

Diana Weissman, 118 Mill Road, stated that it has been made very clear to all parents that they have to help with the problem and many parents are now car pooling.

David Guimarin, 48 Jackson Street, stated that there are only 310 students presently enrolled at Hillbrook which constitutes 244 families. Mr. Guimarin explained that Hillbrook has been in this location for 60 years.

Ken Arendt, stated that there are two neighborhoods and a business in between which is creating an environmental impact on the neighborhood. Mr. Arendt feels that the business does not need to spread the problem, or move the problem, it needs to solve the problem.

Los Gatos Planning Commission October 25, 2000 Adopted

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Jim Hilton, 300 Marchmont Drive, project Manager for the school, stated that the increase in square footage for the facility is required due to ADA requirements. Mr. Hilton explained that carpooling has increased over 40% and the school is working to solve the problem.

Ms. Bayne concluded that the school was not trying to pit one neighborhood against the other but was truly trying to make the school compliant and improve the standards and regulatory classrooms for its students. Ms. Bayne clarified the reason why they had the staggered dismissal times, and stated that they have no plans to increase their enrollment.

There was no one else in the audience to speak to this matter.

Chair Bruno closed the Public Hearing.

Discussion followed regarding continuing this matter to a future date.

Commissioner Muller is concerned that if this is approved the incentive to carpool or find other traffic solutions may disappear. Ms. Muller questioned if the Town can require or mandate carpooling or busing or initiate a review process.

Mr. Curtis stated that in this instance the Town probably cannot require carpooling or busing but it can be voluntary. If the applicant will voluntarily agree to provide carpooling, then it can be included as a condition of approval. He explained that a six month review can be required

Commissioner Muller stated that she would also like to see the neighborhood pull together and approach the Town for some traffic calming measures.

Motion by Commissioner Muller, seconded by Commissioner Marcucci to approve 300 Marchmont Drive/PRJ-99-062/PRJ-99-063 with the following considerations, conditions, and findings.

As required by Section 15314 of the State Environmental Guidelines as adopted by the Town, the Commission finds that this project is Categorically Exempt.

Chair Bruno reopened the Public Hearing to question the applicant.

Chair Bruno questioned if Hillbrook school would voluntarily create, institute, and mandate a carpooling program for the parents.

Sarah Bayne, representing Hillbrook school stated that the school voluntarily will create, institute, and mandate a carpooling program.

Chair Bruno closed the Public Hearing.

COMMISSION COMMENTS

Commissioner Quintana stated that she would like to see more specifics regarding the carpool policies that they will be implemented and how those policies will be enforced. Ms. Quintana would also like to see consideration given to Vanpooling and a report regarding the number of non Hillbrook activities by other groups. Ms. Quintana believes there is a certain amount of community benefit to providing the facilities to groups that have difficulty finding places to meet. She feels it is important to have this information prior to acting on the application.

Chair Bruno clarified that the entire matter can be reviewed in six months and to the extent that a condition is violated or to the extent that a program is not implemented, the consequence is back to the Commission.

Los Gatos Planning Commission October 25, 2000 Adopted

Commissioner Marcucci questioned if condition #7 could be removed because it didn't seem fair that an overall community benefit be removed in the interest of improving traffic on the week days. Ms. Marcucci stated that soccer and baseball fields are limited resources in the area and other groups do benefit from the use of these playing fields.

Commissioner Muller stated that condition #7 will give relief to the Marchmont neighborhood and this will lighten the load on the weekend. Ms. Muller explained that she had considered this condition long and hard and is sad that this is at a cost of a community benefit but, at the same time, she is mindful of the Marchmont residents.

Mayor Pirzynski made presentations from the Town to two resigning Planning Commissioners, Paul Bruno and Laura Nachison, for their years of service to the Town while serving on the Commission. Mrs. Nachison was present to receive her commendation and thanked Council for the opportunity to have served our Town.

Mayor Pirzynski presented a commendation from the Town to Paul Curtls for his service as Director of Community Development. Mr. Curtis thanked the Town for the opportunity to have served our community.

Mr. Davis, new to the community, offered his comments on these presentations.

CLOSED SESSION

Town Attorney, Orry Korb, announced that Council had met in Closed Session prior to this evening's meeting pursuant to Government Code Section 54956.9, concerning Pending Litigation of Julie Dunn vs. Town of Los Gatos, et al., Santa Clara County Superior Court, Action CV779496. There was no final action taken.

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Motion by Mr. Blanton, seconded by Mrs. Decker, to remand this proposal to the Design Review Committee for redesign without penalty; finding that the present plan is inconsistent with the General Plan; there is an expressed desire to work with the neighborhood to obtain an acceptable architectural style; and that this is new information that had not been available to the Planning Commission. Council asked that the applicant work with the present neighborhood in developing a compatible architectural style. Carried unanimously.

HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL MASTER PLAN/APPEAL (17.15)

Mayor Pirzynski announced that this was the time and place so noted for public hearing to consider appeal of the decision of the Planning Commission to approve a Conditional Use Permit for a Master Plan of Hillbrook School and to approve an Architecture and Site application to demolish an existing classroom building and to construct a new classroom building adjacent to the old building on property zoned HR-1. Project Application PRJ-99-062 (Conditional Use Permit). Project Application PRJ-99-063 (Architecture and Site). Property Location: 300 Marchmont Drive. Property Owner/Applicant: Hillbrook School. Appellants: Martin D. Dermer and Michael W. Taylor.

The following people from the audience spoke to this issue.

Michael Taylor, 119 Ann Arbor Drive, appellant spoke about traffic and traffic counts and asked that the Ann Arbor gate not be opened. He asked for a mandatory program; quantitative targets for compliance; and a review and policing process.

Martin Dermer, 255 Marchmont Drive, he asked for less traffic in the area and proposed a hundred car limit for students and fifty for employees accessing the school at one time. He also asked for no parking of people associated with the school in the surrounding neighborhoods; no evening events past 9:00 p.m. Gates be closed by 9:30 p.m. No weekend events.

Patti Elliot, 269 Marchmont Drive, speaking as part of appellants' time, spoke of curtesy being offered by the parents and drivers on the Hillbrook property. She spoke of petitions from the neighborhood submitted for the record. Carpooling is requested. She spoke of her personal traffic study and the impacts she observed due to the traffic generated by the parents and students.

Sarah Bayne, Head of Hillbrook School, thanked Council for its interest. The non compliant class room buildings need to be upgraded per regulations from the California Education Code requirements. She spoke of 60% of parents using carpooling and asking that certain students that live nearby walk to school. She said the improvements would lead to an increase in the availability of program rather than increase in student numbers. On hearing of these concerns, the school immediately prohibited parking on Marchmont and asked parents to work with the suggested restrictions. The CUP has limited the school to 315 students during the last 15 years.

193 students are residents of Los Gatos. Shuttle busses are used for night time events. 13 to 18 children have been considered for the use of Ann Arbor gate.

Jolie Heuston, Berliner Cohen, representing Hillbrook School, spoke of the conditions that have been reviewed, no error or abuse of discretion, number of parking spaces, traffic study and traffic

calming, use of car pooling, and working with the conditions of approval that have been approved twice. This project does not increase the traffic. The school will enforce the CUP for car pooling. The school is in compliance with the General Plan and is implementing traffic calming measures at this time.

Debora Wagner, 16374 Hilow Road. She spoke of the CUP, and asked that the numbers of

vehicles be documented.

Della Dodds, 256 Marchmont Court, asked for specific and measurable ways of checking traffic

and safety on Marchmont.

Ed & Valerie Lozowicki, 223 Rosalie Court, both came forward to express the safety issues as they see and live with them. Spoke of the two blind curves on Marchmont. Asked that specifics be added to the CUP. Spoke of the larger and heavier vehicles that are now being driven by families and the safety issues related to them on a narrow winding street like Marchmont.

HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL MASTER PLAN/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Reuel Warkov, 269 Marchmont Drive, asked for the safety needs to be addressed as a condition of the CUP. The school is asking for special consideration and the neighborhood requests the same consideration from Council regarding traffic safety issues.

Donald J. Housman, 16369 Hilow Road, spoke of traffic safety and the near misses of accidents

in this area.

Robert Dunne, 124 Hilow Court, President of the Board of Hillbrook School, spoke of the efforts of the parents and the school to ease the problems in the neighborhood. He lives in the area and has children at the school. The school will have no more than 315 students on site. They find the 100 car limitation too restrictive. A reduction of cars to 60% is what they think is attainable and possible to track.

Ric Giardina, 16190 Harwood Road, cars have been moved off Marchmont, on site cars have

been reduced, they need the buildings rehabilitated.

Ray Davis, newly arrived, spoke about site use and the need to reduce traffic and observe safety issues.

Laura Nachison, 115 Ann Arbor, spoke of protecting the existing neighborhoods and working more diligently on ways to augment carpooling options.

Diane Hembry, 201 Marchmont Drive, asked for traffic control in the Marchmont area and help from Council concerning the safety of the neighborhood children and pedestrians.

Sue Murphy, 6070 Riding Court, mother of child in school noted that she is respectful of the neighborhood. She enjoys being able to park on campus; spoke of participating with the neighborhood; and asked that the two communities co-exist and co-operate over these difficult circumstances.

Judy Ardizzone, 16414 Hilow Road, spoke of the paving of Hilow, a one way street. She noted that the pot holes acted as a barrier to speeding traffic, and now cars are going through there so fast that the residents will be asking for the installation of speed bumps.

Dennis McEvoy, 81 Reservoir Road, spoke of traffic in all of Los Gatos during the time that children arrive and depart from school. He noted that all neighborhoods adjacent to schools must i make accommodations for that traffic. He is a parent at Hillbrook and noted that the parents were trying to meet the needs of the Marchmont neighborhood.

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Kim Wolsencroft, 81 Reservoir Road, on Board of Directors of Hillbrook, spook of different communities trying to live together. Spoke of living with a school in her own neighborhood and the accommodations that both the residents and the school cooperated on.

Christopher Sanders, 106 Ann Arbor Court, asked for bussing to be used at the school.

Roger Sanford, 55 Roberts Road, Hillbrook parent, asked for approval of the rehabilitation of school buildings and some understanding from the Marchmont neighborhood.

Paul Grams, 16126 Peacock Lane, opposes the opening of the gate on Ann Arbor.

Chris Bearden, 112 Ann Arbor Court, willing to open the gate if it solves some of the problems, and offers 20 students ingress and egress. He asked that bussing be reinstated for some students and carpooling be required for others.

Harvey Sackett, 16015 Short Road, spoke against drop off points for bussing because of the dangers facing the children in the unsupervised locations.

HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE 300/HILLBROOK SCHOOL MASTER PLAN/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Sandy Forbes, 123 Ann Arbor Drive, spoke in support of bussing for traffic relief.

Sarah Bayne, Head of Hillbrook School, noted that the 1988 Hillbrook CUP limited the number of students to 315; that 93 families are residents of Los Gatos; shuttle busses are used for evening events; there are liability issues involved in dropping off students to shuttle bus to the school; she noted that the carpooling information came from the school directory in identifying those students who live within a half-mile of each other; that information was used to estimate the 60% reduction.

Martin Dermer, 255 Marchmont, wants a review every six months; no parking on Marchmont; no weekend event; and the school close down after 9 p.m. with no more traffic after 9:30 p.m.

Della Dodds, 256 Marchmont Drive, addressed traffic; asking for 100 vehicles only per day; or at least a specific number that can be worked toward and evaluated and reviewed every six months. Jolie Houston, of Berliner Cohen, representing Hillbrook School, spoke of peak hours and percentages. She notes that numbers are hard to track, but percentages do work and are what are used in traffic reports.

Michael Taylor, 119 Ann Arbor Drive, appellant, asked that the school focus its attention on traffic reduction and work with the neighborhood on solutions.

No one else from the audience addressed this item.

Motion by Mr. Blanton, seconded by Mrs. Decker, to close the public hearing. Carried unanimously.

Motion by Mrs. Decker, to continue this item to April to try to reduce the impact by at least 50%. Continue the conditional use hearing to April 2, 2001. The Town to take a count of vehicles during that period of time and check the numbers of cars to a measurable number in the range of 80 to 110 in a day. Motion dies for lack of a second.

The following people from the audience addressed this issue:

Michael Taylor, resident of Ann Arbor Drive, had questions regarding the gate being opened between the school and Ann Arbor during school hours and during construction.

Martin Dermer, 255 Marchmont Drive, spoke about traffic safety, congestion, noise and the great impact to a residential neighborhood due to a commercial enterprise. He submitted a letter for the record.

Sarah Bayne, 300 Marchmont Drive, Director of Hillbrook School, spoke of the dedicated work of families and parents who have been working on the traffic problems, and finding measures to mitigate them.

Alison Humphries, 19969 Garnett Court, Saratoga, spoke as the car pooling chairman of the mitigation methods that the parents have worked together to put in place. She noted that 60% of the parents are now car pooling. She committed to being car pooling chairman next year, and noted that the parents are willing to commit to car pooling in the future. She showed slides to demonstrate her presentation, and spoke of a cap of 165 cars entering the property each day.

Patti Elliot, 269 Marchmont Drive, spoke in support of the efforts of the school to mitigate the traffic problems which they generate, and she believes they have done a good job. She requested that the Town support these efforts with doing traffic spot checks.

Elaine Myers, 293 Marchmont Drive, spoke of the efforts expended on mitigating the traffic impacts of the school. She asked for the Town's support on patrolling the speeders.

Diane Hembry, 201 Marchmont Drive, mentioned the ongoing concerns that the school presents. She noted that the school also runs summer camps and the neighborhood has these traffic problems all year long.

Patti Connery, 16015 Short Road, spoke in support of the school and all the work they have done to mitigate their problems with traffic.

Ray Davis, resident, spoke against the Hillbrook School construction project.

Heather Crane, 1697 Don Ave, San Jose, as a parent she spoke in support of the schools mitigating measures.

Ric Giardina, 16190 Harwood Road, noted that the school is not a profit making enterprise.

James Richardson, 15310 Kennedy Road, spoke of the great traffic improvements that have been made by the school.

Athena Philippides, 350 Bella Vista Ave, spoke in support of all the efforts the school has made and the solutions that have been instituted.

Melissa Eldredge, 973 Cherrystone Drive, as a parent supported the school project.

Steve Blaz, 1508 Bouchard Drive, supported the school's efforts and proposals.

Laura Nachison, 115 Ann Arbor, asked if the Ann Arbor gate was going to be opened for construction of this project. She noted that Ann Arbor is presently being used as a staging area for construction projects in the area.

Rob Dunne, 124 Hilow Court, President of the Board of Trustees at the Hillbrook School, asked again for a cap of 165 cars which will be used as a maximum number as the school continues to look for ways to lower its traffic impact on the neighborhood.

David Guimarin, 48 Jackson Street, asked for approval of the CUP.

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HEARINGS CONTINUED

MARCHMONT DRIVE/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Lucille Weidman, 215 Carlester Drive, spoke about evening events and construction traffic.

Dennis McEvoy, Hillbrook parent, asked that the number of cars be flexible due to some school

Craig Moorhead, 341 Los Gatos Blvd., supports the proposal and the need for construction on the old building. Asked for safe buildings for the children

Judy Ardizzone, 16414 Hilow Road resident, spoke aginst the number of cars which pass by her house daily. Asked if the County was working on this situation with the Town.

Jolie Houston, of Berliner Cohen, Ten Almaden Blvd, 11th floor, San Jose, spoke specifically about CUP requirements. She noted that the CUP requires traffic counts twice a year for traffic analysis and noted the condition that the road may be open for construction access as part of an approved construction plan.

Sarah Bayne spoke again concerning the cap of 165 cars. She clarified that this is the number of cars leaving the site between 7:30 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. and is a number which does not include staff who are remaining on site at that time. She feels that this is a number which the school is committed to.

Martin Dermer, Marchmont, wanted more stringent numbers placed upon the number of cars which will be traveling the road. He asked that campus be free of rental to third parties and that there be unannounced car checks and traffic monitoring.

No one else from the audience addressed this issue.

Motion by Mr. Glickman, seconded by Mr. Blanton, to close the public hearing. Carried unanimously.

Council Comments:

Mr. Blanton asked if the school would agree to the stipulation of no third party activities permitted on campus. The school agreed, noting that that is now their present policy.

Mr. Glickman stated that there is a shortage of facilities in Town for youth activities, and he would suggest eliminating #7 from the CUP because the school could serve as a Town asset.

Mr. Blanton, Mr. Glickman and Mr. Attaway agreed to the cap of 165 student cars and periodic spot checks to be done by the Town to ensure that the school is complying to this condition. Town should install traffic signs stating radar enforcement and send an officer during peak hours.

Mr. Pirzynski and Mrs. Decker believe a cap of 165 for students is far too high considering there are also 55 staff cars on site. They asked that staff use mitigating methods for themselves also. They appreciate the efforts made by the school and would like to see these methods used by other Town schools that are suffering with traffic congestion and neighborhood impacts. The car pooling efforts were applauded but the possibility of van pooling was strongly encouraged to continue the reduction of neighborhood traffic impacts.

MARCHMONT DRIVE/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Motion by Mr. Glickman, seconded by Mr. Blanton, to move approval of the application and adoption of the CUP with the following amendments: A cap of 165 outbound parent vehicles; Item 10) No lease or rental shall be permitted to third parties of campus facilities and striking the term "of the gymnasium;" Item 6) All night time activities are not to exceed ten events a year and shall conclude by 9 p.m. with all vehicles off the property by 9:30 p.m. and all activities which draw audience to the gymnasium taking place after school hours; Item 13) Radar signs to be deferred until Town has the opportunity to observe the traffic pattern; Item 11) Unannounced traffic count inspections will occur twice a year in March and October to observe compliance of the not to exceed 165 outbound parent vehicles; Condition 5 of Architecture and Site Approval) to set the hours of construction at 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, with the full construction plan on file with the Town. Carried by a vote of 3 ayes. Mrs. Decker and Mr. Pirzynski voted no indicating that the outbound vehicle count could have been reduced further to 150.

PUBLIC DIALOGUE CONSORTIUM/COUNCIL & PLANNING RETREAT (25,28)

Mayor Pirzynski announced that this was the time and place so noted to consider final report from Public Dialogue Consortium on the Town Council and Town Council/Planning Commission retreats.

Ray Davis, resident, spoke against the current land use process and asked for consistency in following the General Plan.

Council Comments:

That Council should set specific dates to meet with the Planning Commission in study sessions so that the meetings address issues and concerns before they become problems. That Council have consistent monthly meetings with the Commission to keep a progressive dialog going. Council requested periodic updates of how the measures in the summary were moving along.

COMMUNITY HOUSING DEVELOPERS/LOCAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION LOS GATOS CREEK VILLAGE/MILES AVENUE 31 (26.15)

Mayor/Chairman Pirzynski announced that this was the time and place so noted to consider:

- Accepting report of Seifel Consulting Incorporated "due diligence analysis of funding request for Los Gatos Creek Village"
- b. Making a finding that Los Gatos Creek Village provides a significant community benefit by meeting current needs for affordable housing, and exempt Los Gatos Creek Village from the traffic impact mitigation fee

The following people from the audience addressed this issue:

Skip Spiering, representing the appellant, showed a scale model of the site with the existing tree. He gave the history of the project over a twelve year time span, and noted that the Planning Commission and Historic Committee had recommended approval in 1993. He explained that the original design is harmonious with the site and the existing building, also any change in the design would destroy the integrity and symmetry of the two buildings and the individual buildings together, thereby upsetting the Japanese cultural style and design of. He agreed to work with staff on softening the effect of the north wall.

Sherwood Sullivan, 103 University, spoke against the proposal but asked that there be a redesign of the project with a higher elevation on the commercial side and a lower elevation situated on the

Melissa Havercroft, 111 University Ave., asked that the building be redesigned so that it is lower on

the residential side. Molly Sullivan, 103 University, spoke against the proposal and the loss of view from her home if the project is built with this design.

No one else from the audience spoke to the issue.

Motion by Mr. Glickman, seconded by Mr. Blanton, to close the public hearing. unanimously.

Motion by Mrs. Decker, seconded by Mr. Glickman, to grant the appeal of Architecture and Site Application S-00-9; Conditional Use Permit U-00-10; and Variance Application V-00-2 with the following findings:

For granting Conditional Use Permit:

- The proposed uses of the property are essential or desirable to the public convenience or welfare creating an asset and extension of a cultural opportunity with the Netsuke Society which is something the Town has never seen before or may never have available again.
- The proposed uses will not impair the integrity and character of the zone as this is a dense transitional zone, and offers an interface between the commercial and the residential sections, which is reflected in similar locations throughout the Town.

The proposed uses would not be detrimental to public health, safety or general welfare in that the shadow studies show negligible impact to the residents to the north.

The proposed uses of the property are in harmony with the various elements and objectives of the General Plan, Downtown Specific Plan and the purposes of the Town Code by offering a live-work situation that supports a small resident owned/resident serving business which is encouraged in the General Plan.

HEARING CONTINUED

UNIVERSITY AVENUE 75/RESIDENTIAL UNIT/COMMERCIAL ZONE CONT.

For granting a Variance:

The variance was granted in 1993 due to the dedication of private property to the adjacent public parking lot by Ms Vadas.

The protected and historic tree existing on this property limits the possibilities of architectural

If the footprint of the building is moved to the south, a firewall would have to be built between the existing and proposed buildings, and cause loss of continuity of design.

It forms a graceful transition between dense urban and residential use.

For Community Benefit per Traffic Policy:

This project generates five peak hour trips which is offset by the expressed cultural value of the proposal and the architectural character that is unique to the downtown.

Consistent with the Redevelopment Plan and the uses of the Central Business District.

Categorically Exempt from the State Environmental Guidelines.

Considerations for work in Historic District that the proposal will not adversely affect its surroundings.

For Architecture and Site Application Conditions of Approval: There are 33 items considered by the Planning Commission and by Council which will have to be met

Planning Commission did not err, but this an issue and policy which Council has the opportunity and discretion to find above and beyond the Commission, in that Council can grant this variance. Plans for Construction to include a directive to the contractor to notify the construction crew to take precautions to protect the historic oak tree and that there will be a fine if the tree dies.

North Elevation of project will be addressed by the Applicant and the Community Development

Director to mitigate its lack of style.

Motion: Carried unanimously.

The following people from the audience spoke to the issue.

Martin Dermer, 255 Marchmont Drive, asked for careful review of the traffic counts arriving and

leaving the campus. He favored announced counts done by the Town.

Patti Elliot, 269 Marchmont Drive, spoke in support of the efforts of the school to mitigate the traffic problems which they generate, and she believes they have done a good job. She requested that the Town support these efforts with doing traffic spot checks.

MARCHMONT DRIVE/HILLBROOK SCHOOL/CONT.

Speakers continued:

Jolie Houston, Berliner Cohen, spoke of the reviews that address the cup. And asked for approval. Sarah Bayne, 300 Marchmont Drive, Director of Hillbrook School, answered questions concerning an Art Show that overlapped on weekends. She noted that after this approval is given the school will have its gates locked on weekends.

Mr. Attaway asked that the school and staff keep in mind that Council wants to see continued efforts in reducing the traffic count. He would prefer the school work toward a cap of 150 cars and to realize that the 165 cap was a definite maximum

Motion by Mr. Glickman, seconded by Mr. Attaway, that Council modify Item #12 of the CUP to read, "Traffic counts are at the applicants expense. The Town shall conduct traffic counts at the Marchmont Drive of Hillbrook School twice a year during appropriate months chosen by the staff." Carried unanimously.

Mr. Glickman noted that all the responsibility to make the traffic counts diminish rests with Hillbrook School.

Mayor Pirzynski affirmed that the parties should not be in an adversarial position but in a cooperative mode of working together toward traffic calming in the neighborhood. He stated that the quality of life for the neighbors will be enhanced through the efforts of the school to continue to support its car pool program in a rigorous fashion and to look for alternative mitigating measures to reduce the neighborhood's traffic, such as van pooling for students and staff. This cooperation should lead to rebuilding a sense of community among the parties.

Speakers and Council Comments:

Les White, Interim Public Works Director, discussed the Town Plaza Park Plans, noting that the bathrooms would remain optional at the Plaza; that there was sufficient funding for the fountain design plans; that there was no funding for construction of the bathrooms; and Council could decide after further consideration if it would like to include public facilities.

Mr. Blanton spoke in favor of incorporating rest room facilities in the park due to a shortage of public facilities in the downtown area.

Mrs. Decker would like the rest room issue studied further as other interested parties have kept that from occurring over the years for various reasons which may no longer be viable considerations at this time. She also brought up the issue of the fountain and safety concerns associated with its depth and design. She asked what the time line was for completion of the new fountain and if the Town needed to keep the existing fountain in operation during this time.

Mr. White noted that the fountain would remain empty for about a year before the new one is operational. This is due to the high cost of electrical repair. Staff will review the safety issues involving this fountain and consider filling in the structure until the new one is ready to be built.

Mr. Pirzynski asked that consideration for user friendly, low risk water facilities that children can enjoy themselves at be explored.

Mr. Attaway asked that the present fountain be treated as we did the fire truck in Oak Meadow. He noted that he has never seen a claim involving Plaza fountain and he does not want to deprive the community of there fountain this summer while waiting for the new construction.

Mr. Glickman requested acceleration of the project for safety reasons.

Mr. White reported that staff would return to Council with various options concerning the treatment of the existing fountain.

Ray Davis, resident, spoke of the hazards of using recycled water in a public fountain and the health concerns associated with young children playing in this type of environment.

Lewis Hernandez, 180 Calle Margarita, asked for bathrooms and baby changers for people with children in the park or at least a place to wash your hands. A sterile bathroom in the park for

transients would be appreciated.

Shirley Henderson, Antiquarium on Main, asked that Council please leave the fountain until after the Music in the Plaza Program. Asked that this fountain be recharged but that Town move forward on the new fountain.

Ms Figone, Town Manager, noted that the safety issues involving the fountain would be reviewed and a report would return to Council. The subject of bathrooms would be deferred at this time but might return to Council for consideration in the future.

Les White, Interim Public Works Director, noted that the 4 way stop at Bachman and Santa Cruz had been removed from the plans by Council in February when the plans had been approved. Traffic reports had shown that this configuration would cause grid lock in the downtown.

ENERGY CONSERVATION MEASURES/RESOLUTION 2001-52 (24.39)

Ms Figone, Town Manager, presented a comprehensive overview of the energy situation including the Town's past and present conservation actions. LED bulbs are replacing the Town's traffic lights and the emergency generator is being refurbished. Community education is included in the Town's Website including energy related links to other websites. A business orientated energy conservation newsletter has been developed to coordinate with the Chamber of Commerce to distribute to the business community. The legislative activity concerning this issue is also being tracked and reviewed.

Mr. Glickman, spoke of a workshop on Energy Crisis Impacts, First Responders, which will be held in Alameda, May 11th. He asked that someone from Town attempt to attend this meeting. He feels that loss of emergency services is a far greater impact than the rolling blackouts has been.

Ray Davis, resident, spoke of land use issues, large homes and their relationship to energy conservation. Requested required use of energy efficient roofing materials and solar panels.

Motion by Mr. Glickman, seconded by Mr. Blanton, that Council adopt Resolution 2001-52 entitled, <u>RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS ON ENERGY CONSERVATION MEASURES</u>. Carried unanimously.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS (25.28)
There were no reports given this evening.

TOWN MANAGER REPORTS (26.28)

A-Consider Report on Leadership Los Gatos (26A.12)

Mayor Pirzynski recognized the 600 volunteers who have contributed to our community. He noted the leadership evolving from the General Plan Task Forces I & II. He spoke of continuing opportunities for the community to take part in local government and the need to identify volunteers and encourage their participation. This proposal suggests ways to develop a strong leadership

component within our community.

Town Manager Figore addressed the Leadership Los Gatos Program. Staff will work with the Chamber of Commerce on a leadership program which will include a candidate selection process and related volunteer identification program which will reach out to other community organizations and agencies. The budget for the program will be carefully reviewed and the scope of services will return to Council for final approval.

Mr. Hernandez, 180 Calle Margarita, spoke about leadership and children. Facilities for people with children, including baby changing tables, would be helpful in the course of to conducting business with the Town. (Baby stations and a place to sit with children can be looked into as suggested by and Mr. Blanton.)

Informational Report on Leadership Los Gatos was considered by Council, accepted and filed

B-Consider Verbal Report on Skateboard Park (26B.33)

Town Manager Figone provided Council with an update on the status of the skateboard park. She noted that staff had work with County Supervisor Gage's office on addressing the feasibility of siting the facility in Vasona Park. There is cooperation from the County, and an initial assessment of a site is underway. The goal is to return to Council June 4th with a preliminary feasibility report. At that time the siting of the Lydon Cupola bandstand in Oak Meadow Park will also be considered. There is a high level review of the Vasona Park location taking place at this time. After Council next reviews the proposal there will be time to incorporate the community in bringing the project to fruition. Funding will take place through agencies and public participation

PUBLIC HEARING

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR 2001-2006/HEARING (21.09)

Mayor Pirzynski stated that this was the time and place duly noted for public hearing to consider proposed Town Capital Improvement Program (CIP) 2001-2006.

Town Manager Figore addressed the 15.7 million dollars of capital expenditures for the next five years. She noted that 12.9 will be expended the first two years, and emphasized the 15 million that has been budgeted for resurfacing over a five year period. After completion of the recommended infra structure needs assessment the Town will have a clearer picture of the condition of its infra structure and can identify a more systematic way to identify and schedule capital improvement projects and more fully evaluate alternative methods for funding the capital needs.

Assistant Town Manager gave an overview of the CIP delineating the projects and funding sources.

Council Comments:

Mr. Pirzynski, Mr. Blanton and Mrs. Decker favored the aggressive five year plan for the street

improvements and resurfacing program.

Mr. Attaway would prefer to see the three budgets together before making allocation decisions. He asked why the undergrounding of utilities and new storm drain on Santa Cruz Ave is no longer in the CIP. He believes the budget that has been presented is very aggressive, and he asked for confirmation from staff that these projects could be completed as outlined. He spoke of using the undergrounding

money on Lot 6, and asked if the manager's conference room could still be considered. He would like to have a method of keeping a prioritized list of projects that have been identified, even though there is no available funding at the present time. He felt strongly that the next budget needs to look at

downtown parking structures.

Mr. Pirzynski approved of those projects identified in the CIP and which are delineated on their own merits. The undergrounding projects should be put on hold until the PG&E issues are resolved. If there are projects that have been eliminated from this budget that Council would like reevaluated, Council should bring them up for discussion. He spoke of the study session last summer which addressed the street resurfacing program and believes this is an aggressive program which can be successful. He asked that staff monitor the projects for success and if there appears to be any problems that Council be notified immediately. He asked for ongoing status reports.

Mr. Glickman & Mrs. Decker requested consideration of undergrounding of utilities on Los Gatos

Blvd. in a more comprehensive manner than one project at a time as development occurs.

Mr. Piper noted that PG&E has requested the ability to withhold their undergrounding funds until they have stabilized their company. In the mean time, Town allocations will continue to grow and be made available when the next viable project presents itself.

Public Works Director, Les White noted that data would be obtained from the Sanitation District on the condition of the sanitary sewer system, and from San Jose Water Company on the condition of the water main on North Santa Cruz Ave. Public Works Department will schedule the resurfacing

of North Santa Cruz Ave. after any underground utility work has been completed.

Mr. Glickman requested further information regarding the infrastructure needs assessment and what exactly the Town would gain from this study. Town Manager Figone explained that the scope of exactly the Town would gain from this study. services would return to Council before any funds would be expended. Mr. Glickman requested that the report be made available to Council for a longer period of time than the weekend before the Council Meeting. He also requested a prioritization of the CIP projects as they relate to the overail Town's funding capabilities, as a safety net for completion of projects, if the projection for funding falls short of expectations.

The following people spoke to this issue. Ray Davis, resident, spoke on air quality in the Civic Center and the need for improvements. He addressed the fact that Shannon and Hicks are too narrow for main arterials. Water pressure and availability must be improved throughout Town.

Mr. Hernandez, 180 Calle Margarita, spoke of the railroad tracks down by Wedgewood and the need

for maintenance and clean up of the property. No one else from the audience spoke to this issue.

Town Manager Figore noted that the discussion regarding funding for undergrounding of utilities on North Santa Cruz Ave. would return to Council with the Redevelopment Agency Budget.

Council Consensus to close the public hearing and return the Capital Improvement Program to Council for adoption May 21, 2001.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion by Mr. Blanton, seconded by Mr. Glickman, to adjourn this evening's meeting at 12:00a.m. Carried unanimously.

I think that the mitigation measures have gone far. I'm sure there's some issues. There always are, but the reality is that you've been following this for a long time. Usually it's been a very large turnout from the Marchmont neighborhood, and it's a smaller turnout tonight. I think that's a good sign that probably the mitigation is working.

As a parent, I can speak wholeheartedly of how the carpooling and how the other situations have been working out and the children have been embracing the change. The parents have been rallying to the cause.

As you know, the realities, the practical realities of life sometimes cause people to have to change schedules. I'm a single parent, and there are times that my four-year-old can't get it together to get my nine-year-old to Hillbrook to get to the carpool, so I will have to drive up there. That is just the practical realities of life.

I ask you, when you hear of the things that have happened here tonight, to try and keep it in perspective. The school has been an active member of this community for many years and has educated our children in a very positive way.

As a parent, as a resident, may I ask you to

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As a parent, as a resident, may I ask you to please support Hillbrook in its efforts. The building that is going on is making it a better place for my children, a safer place. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you. Are there any questions from the Commission? Thank you. Sarah Bayne.

SARAH BAYNE: Good evening. As the letter from Jolie Houston submitted to you all at the end of last week indicates, it is our belief that we have been and remain in full compliance with the conditional use permit.

Our -- our reasons for that are that on the evening when the count was conducted by the Town, we had seven faculty members who left earlier than the 3:45 time, and two other staff members who left. I would respectfully remind the members of the Commission that in the many, many months of negotiation over the conditional use permit, discussion about the legal necessity of exempting

staff and faculty from the count was what resulted in an exit count versus an entrance count.

Therefore, it is our belief, and it is consistent with the 18 counts, which we have respectfully conducted over the past three months, that we remain within compliance of the conditional use permit. And that also includes all the other many restrictions, which Hillbrook was willing and voluntarily submitted to and continues to submit to in order to get along with our neighbors.

So, having said that, I would also welcome the Town to conduct as many traffic counts as they are interested in performing to verify the counts which we consistently perform.

Our count in the afternoons is always going to be slightly higher than that of the morning for the very reasons that Mr. Sanford represented, which is it's much harder under human circumstances for parents to carpool in the afternoon. Having said that, that one day apparently was the only time in all of the counts that we performed when we were over the limit.

Thank you. I'd be happy to answer any questions if you have any.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Do we have any questions from the Commission? Commissioner Muller.

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COMMISSIONER MULLER: Yes, I have a couple. In the agreement, was there any reason why you could exceed your limits? Were there excuses or justifications for going over your limits?

SARAH BAYNE: No. There was a lot of -- a lot of discussion in the entire carpooling system, which we established over the past year and a half, which has been told to us is a model for other schools, that there was a legal reason and -- for the exemption of employees of the school to be required to carpool and, therefore, their entire existence was meant to be exempt from the count.

So that was what we understood, which was why the entrance count, for example, in the morning was never one that was ever considered. It was the exit count because of the assumption that employees arrive at the school, and they do not exit between the hours of 7:30 and 8:30.

And employees of the school also exit after 3:45 in the afternoon.

commissioner muller: So you're saying -excuse me. You're saying there's some discrepancy in
the -- on how the count is decided, that there's a
misunderstanding about this?

SARAH BAYNE: No. I'm saying that on the

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carpool coordinator, the parent volunteer carpool coordinator, that she would need -- this is -- Kiddy Cab exists in Sunnyvale, and that she would need a significant pod of parents in a certain neighborhood in order to make it worth their while to provide a service.

so the conversation that was had with her was Allyson Humphries telling her that we'd only been able to come up with three or four parents in, for example, the Willow Glen neighborhood, and two or three parents in the Saratoga neighborhood, and therefore, we would not be able to take advantage of their services.

So the same -- it's two different ways of looking at it, but either way, our carpooling system was working so effectively that parents were not choosing to use a system that they had to pay money for basically.

SARAH BAYNE: Probably. But they're all carpooling together is what has happened is that, for example, there are probably out of 10 or 12 children who live in the Willow Glen area, they're all arriving in probably two cars in the mornings.

I should just note that we are not required by our conditional use permit to van pool. It was recommended that we look into it, which we absolutely have and will continue to do.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay, thank you. Patti Elliot.

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One of the reasons that there's so few of us here tonight is that we actually didn't get notice. I received an e-mail from the co-appellant, Martin Dermer (phonetic), who only learned of this hearing I guess late last week, by which time he was already in Australia. He sent me an e-mail when he got word of it asking that I put on the record that he received insufficient notice and would like to have the hearing continued to a time that he could attend and express his concerns.

So please don't take this small number of people here as any indication that the neighborhood is not involved or interested.

The Town Council, in reaching the 165 limit, made it very clear that that was an absolute maximum, a very generous number for the school, and in fact, that number included consideration for staff vehicles leaving at various times.

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Referring to the November 2nd letter from Ms. Houston from Berliner Cohen law firm, in that she said that Hillbrook has complied with all of the CUP's rules, and we don't agree with that. You've probably seen my list of five times when the school was -- the campus was still in use until 10:50 one night and 12 -- let's see, 10:50 and 9:30, and it just goes on.

So I wish we would be protected by the CUP, which doesn't seem to be enforced.

There have been definite improvements in the traffic situation, and I really appreciate the fact that Hillbrook has prevented its visitors from parking on Marchmont in there. They have to park on the campus, and it really has improved the situation so much. It also helps the mail delivery people, because they used to park in front of Mailboxes, Et Cetera.

Since we're still having so much problem with the speeders, in the attachment number 21 of the Council agenda report of April 12th of this year,

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there was a suggestion of speed boards that have helped other cities. And I hope that maybe we can get them to slow down a bit.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you.

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Jolie Houston. I hope

JOLIE HOUSTON: Yeah, that's it. That's the East Coast wise. Jolie Houston with Berliner Cohen.

I would just like to address a few things, specifically the car counts that we did on the 30th that seem to be out of compliance with the Town's car count. I think the discrepancy there is the school does 2:30 to 3:30, not to 3:45, and I think that could be the discrepancy there.

The one thing that has been brought up consistently, it was brought up consistently at the City Council meetings, the Town Council meetings, is speeding, and we really cannot control the speeding with the CUP. That's a Town enforcement issue. But I do know that the school has been very diligent with sending letters notifying parents to slow down, and I have even heard from other neighbors that the speed has slowed down, along with the traffic issues.

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We're not making excuses. We're just pointing out why we were over that one day. Our counts have been consistently under. I think the school has really worked diligently. Even the neighbors have commended the school for taking in account and reducing traffic.

The rainy day issue, I think that was a significant issue. It was the first rainy day. The informal type carpooling had not been established. I know Sarah has sent out e-mails and letters, I think e-mails to the parents about picking up the slack on the days where kids that would normally ride or walk may be -- may be driven and not be part of the formal carpooling.

There's another issue that we do believe we're in compliance with the CUP. We have worked very hard. Our records, which have been taken daily, and it's not just one count, it has been several counts. I think it's up to 18 now. At the time I wrote my letter, it was lower. The daily logs do show compliance.

Further, we're -- we're subject to the CUP. It runs with the land. We're always subject to car counts. We're always subject to traffic or nighttime violations. We know that. We are -- we are aware of

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that, and that is the control on this. But one thing that we do ask tonight, that we can go forward, and we do get to go forward with our master plan, and that we can show you at any time that we were in compliance.

And if you have any questions, I'd be free to answer any of them.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Any questions from the Commissioner Muller. Commission?

COMMISSIONER MULLER: Yes, somewhere there was a reference to a different plan per rainy day, a rainy day plan. Has that been established? that you were working on it and we're getting close to --

JOLIE HOUSTON: COMMISSIONER MULLER: -- and we're getting close to the rainy time.

I think Sarah --

JOLIE HOUSTON: -- said that she e-mailed parents I think saying that now that the rainy days have come, we have to even, you know, be more aware of carpooling. I don't think it's part of the formal carpooling program, but it is -- they are requesting that just because it -- it's raining, all of a sudden the carpooling goes, you know, haywire.

I think Sarah can address that because she was the one that sent the e-mails. (Inaudible.)

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COMMISSIONER MULLER: I must say only if you have something to add to that, but if she stated it, that's fine.

JOLIE HOUSTON: Because, you know, we think this is a very organized system, and then there's also -- when there's also failsafe methods like on these rainy days, you know, if you're going to be taking one kid that usually rides his bike with a few other kids, they're encouraging kids to, you know, hey, get in the same car and go to the school. And so they are trying very hard with even the informal carpooling.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you.

JOLIE HOUSTON: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Mr. Davis.

MR. DAVIS: Comments in the public

interest.

I'm going to help the charming little lady over there that spoke from the neighborhood and others.

One thing the female attorney didn't mention was that -- and some of you being new may not realize, use permits are subject to revocation at any time for due cause, okay. This is serious business tonight.

If they don't comply significantly, they can have --

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they can lose their school, period, okay. So please be aware of that.

I'd also point out that I'm a little chagrinned that you're only talking about car counts. What about the other -- rest of the conditions for the use permit? Come on, that's -- the whole thing is supposed to be reviewed, not just car counts.

And I want you to understand the DRC. These people showed up, and that guy there, particularly, showed up with the architect with a plan for an administration building that was 700 foot over the approved master plan by the Council, legislative act approved, and they had the audacity, the unmitigated gall to show up at the DRC with a building that is 700 square foot over the approved size and think they're just going to bully their way through or do the wear down bit. You've heard of wear down before. All right.

So I think you ought to continue this and discuss all of the conditions. That's your job.

That's your -- what you're required to do, and I think Mr. Lortz kind of missed the boat here on the staff report. Should have been the whole damn thing, okay.

And, you know, I don't want to have to appeal this to the Town Council with that complaint.

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: You're on your 30 seconds for wrap up.

MR. DAVIS: I would urge you in the best interest of the Town -- you know, there's a -- reviewing the case, while it goes back to 1960, nothing but abuse by this private interest group. The public interest always -- the tail wagged the dog. The last 30, 40 years, it's only recently that the

Town Council decided the dog is going to wag its own

1 tail, okay.

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And if I may suggest, you need to carry it through, okay. 'Cause that's what you swore to do when you took the job on as Planning Commissioners, uphold the public interest and not be partisans for the private interests.

Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you. I have no other cards. I'm -- unless the Commission has a question, the public hearing is closed. Thank you.

Public hearing is closed, as I said, and I'm going to return the question to the Commission for questions of staff, comments and a motion.

And I'm going to start it off with a question to staff.

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Mr. Lortz, could you comment on the points that were brought up regarding whether teachers who are exempt from the count and how the 165 figure of cars leaving the school was arrived at, entering or leaving the school is arrived at by Council.

MR. LORTZ: The -- no, there's no exemptions. Basically, the 165 is the number that must be satisfied. The number was arrived at after extensive public input both from the neighborhood, as well as from the school.

At one point the number was going to be 150, but the feeling was that that gave the school no latitude for extenuating circumstances, so there was a lot of discussion that resulted in the number going from 150 to 165.

I think for everyone, to see the traffic count came out high on the p.m. And as a result, we're holding up the master plan until this issue gets resolved.

We're suggesting that this -- or recommending that this item be rescheduled at the December 5th meeting to allow us to do probably another couple counts between now and then unannounced, unadvertised, and then I would also say that the neighbors, if they do notice that there is activity after 9:30, and in

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violation of the use permit, that they call the police department.

And I will make the police chief aware that that's what I suggested happen. And that we will then take evidence through the police department in terms of any recorded violations that have occurred in terms of late night activities. Because I did read the desk item and the letter indicating that there was some late night activities.

Further, the third item was speeding, and the traffic speed signs are something that we are exploring. We're having to make sure that those are done in a way that is going to be easily implemented, something that — this is a capital improvement item, so it's a fairly costly improvement. We have not yet placed those signs anywhere in Town, and this will be one neighborhood that we'll look at installing them if and when the Council approves their use.

So the -- the traffic count is over. And we wanted to give the school an opportunity to correct the situation by whatever means are necessary through the school's extensive e-mail system or very aggressive carpooling program and come back on December 5th, after we've had an opportunity for them to take corrective measures as necessary, and see what

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the traffic counts result in.

This next meeting, when we have a check to see, a six month review, that is typically not a public hearing. But we will for the next meeting, and the next time, it is not going to be a public hearing, but it will -- is a public meeting. Everybody is invited to testify, and we will notify the neighborhood.

I was hopeful, and this report came to me about two days before it was going to be sent out to the Planning Commission, because we were waiting until the last second to do the car count, and then when the report came to me and the number was over, I was very discouraged. And so that's why we're holding up the master plan, and we want to make sure -- in fact, we cannot take to the Planning Commission any type of project while there's a violation on that property.

COMMISSIONER MULLER: I just have a It looks like the school is making attempts to comply here. At the same time, what I'm also

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seeing here, if a student comes to you and they don't have their homework, you don't want to hear my dog ate it, or I lost it. You want to hear possibly some responsibility for it, some acceptance and some proactive comments about how they will get that home to you.

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And I am hearing some excuse making here, and I didn't appreciate that. I don't want to hear the excuses. We've got not to exceed numbers here. What we are looking for is accountability.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: I'd just like to make one comment, and that is I'm concerned that the counts that the school is going by are not accurate and, in fact, all of them may be higher than recorded by the school because their count is only for an hour rather than the hour and 15 minutes.

Commissioner Drexel.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: I move to continue the review of conditional use permit PRJ-99-062 for Hillbrook School to December 5th. The continuance is to allow Hillbrook School to develop a strategy to reduce the afternoon traffic count.

Independent vehicle counts will be conducted unannounced prior to the next hearing. When the conditional use permit was granted, a maximum of 155

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afternoon trips were allowed, which it was decided
would provide a 15 trip margin for error for unusual
situations. Hillbrock should develop a strategy tha
would reduce the number of afternoon trips typically
to 150°.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Is there a second?

I'll second the motion. Are there any comments,

discussion? Call the question. All those in favor.

(Ayes.)

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: All those opposed. Carries unanimously.

A VOICE: And as Mr. Lortz said, this is not a public hearing item, however, the community development — development department will send out notices to the neighborhood to notify them of the next meeting date on December 5th.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: The next item on our agenda is item nine, which is amendment to the Town residential development standards to address demolitions, replacement structures and significant remodels.

Discussion by the Commission? Any comments?

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CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay. Commissioners, it has been moved and seconded for approval of A and S application S-00-70. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, I will call the question. All those in favor of approval of architecture and site application S-00-70.

(Ayes.)

CHAIRMAN LYON: Aye. Opposed. None. Passes unanimously.

MR. KORB: Anybody dissatisfied with the decision of the Planning Commission may appeal the decision to the Town Council. The appeal must be filed within ten days. It must be filed in the clerk's office on forms available in the clerk's office, and there is a fee for filing an appeal.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay. Next item on our agenda is item three, which is the review of the conditional use permit PRJ-99-0602.

From the last meeting there was specific direction to -- from the Commission to gather additional data relative to traffic by the staff. And I do have a number of speaker cards associated with this item. So we will be taking public testimony on this.

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The first speaker card I have is for Ms. Hembry.

DIANE HEMBRY: Hi, I'm Diane Hembry. I live at 201 Marchmont Drive in Los Gatos.

Sometime I would like to be the last speaker on this subject. I always get my arguments brought down by Hillbrook, and so sometime I'd like to be the one who replies to those arguments.

I've been coming here. We've lived at the same house for 19 years. We've been here for every meeting we've been notified of. I was very distressed to read in the paper the comments by some of Hillbrook people saying there must not be a lot of interest in this because there aren't a lot of neighbors here. Well, I was not notified of the meeting last time, and there were several meetings I have not been notified of.

Okay. Also, what I'm seeing in this is we've kind of over the years that we've been here on this issue is we see this cycle happening is the rules are made. Hillbrook breaks the rules. The neighbors come and object. Hillbrook puts forth some excuses like it was raining, or it was a week before holidays or something.

So then the counts go down. We sit around

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Okay. I'm tired of it. It's a waste of my time. It's a waste of their time. So I would like to see the conditional use permit withdrawn until such time as Hillbrook can meet the standards and keep them. I don't think we should have to keep coming back here time and time again to do this.

My son and I counted cars in September before he went away to college, and we started one morning during the rush hour and got 178 cars. The limit was set at 165. We guit counting. That wasn't the end of rush hour. So the count has been exceeded for a long period of time.

Okay. Probably -- and also about 90 percent of the cars continue to speed on our road. Okay.

Both of those are issues we need to take care of. I haven't counted the cars recently.

I feel like I'm dealing with a teenager.

I own my own personal teenager, so I don't need to deal with another teenager, and I would like to, you know, just see it resolved. And I'd like everybody to, you know — there have been other things happening. People have been dropped off in cul-de-sacs, rather than going through the gates of

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So I think if the rules are established, they should be met. If they're not met, then I think the conditional use permit should be withdrawn. It's very simple.

And as I said, I've been involved in this for a long time having lived there for 19 years. And I've come to every meeting I've known about. So please keep notifying me about the meetings.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you. Any questions for Ms. Hembry?

DIANE HEMBRY: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Dubois.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Yes, Ms. Hembry, with respect to the speeding --

DIANE HEMBRY: Uh-huh.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: -- conditions that you have observed, when you have observed those conditions, have you reported them to Los Gatos Police Department?

DIANE HEMBRY: I have not. Okay. And the reason I have not is over the years I've made a lot of reports, okay. And it -- it's becoming to the point of being an annoyance.

I can start calling the police every time I

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see somebody speed if you want me to, but the thing is I basically don't see a lot of action happening. Why doesn't the police come -- why don't the police come out there and patrol more? Why don't they surprise people on that road? They could pick people up every single day if they were in, you know, not in marked cars.

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They'd probably pick up my husband as well.

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COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: It's -- it's helpful from our standpoint to have some statistical data when

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there are calls from the neighborhood --

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DIANE HEMBRY: Uh-huh.

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COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: -- of, you know,

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speeding and that type of activity going on. That way

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we know the police have been notified, and there is

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response. That's why I asked the question.

17 18 DIANE HEMBRY: Right. No, I understand that. And I used to call in every single violation.

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And it was taking over my life.

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And I guess that's why I just want to see -- I just want it solved, you know, because I keep coming

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back here and coming back here, and I have all these

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wonderful geometry tests I'd much rather be grading

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tonight than, you know, sitting here, so anyway,

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that's my story.

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CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, Ms. Hembry.
Ms. Elliot.

PATTI ELLIOT: I'm Patti Elliot. I live at 269 Marchmont Drive.

I don't have quite as long a tenure as
Diane, but continue to see a lot of speeding, continue
to see a whole lot of traffic. Have seen people
dropping off in the cul-de-sacs, which I can only
interpret as an attempt to keep the numbers down given
that they're counting cars coming out of the gate. So
if the parents are dropping off in the cul-de-sac,
obviously those cars don't get counted.

I can't run out of my house every day and, you know, try to run up the hill and take down the license plates. It's just not feasible, and I have called and sent e-mails a number of times, and I don't see any specific response. Maybe they're out there patrolling in unmarked cars, and I don't see it.

In any event, I think Diane's point is well taken, that when the heat is on, the numbers come down through whatever method, and again I think part of that is the cul-de-sac dropping off. In addition to people dropping off lower down on Marchmont, I've seen that as well. That doesn't solve the problem.

I think what really needs to happen is a

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specific requirement for numbers of cars coming into the neighborhood at all in addition to which I think that the Council or the Commission needs to take action on the van pooling issue and require the school to implement van pooling, because if they would do that in addition to the cooperative parents who are carpooling, I think that would go a long way towards solving the problem.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you. Any questions for Ms. Elliot? Commissioner Dubois.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Same question as I asked before. Have you made calls to the police department regarding speeding --

PATTI ELLIOT: I have in the past -
COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: -- and the traffic
conditions?

PATTI ELLIOT: -- I haven't recently.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you.

Ms. Dodds.

DELLA DODDS: Hi. I'm Della Dodds. I live at 256 Marchmont Court, and I just want to acknowledge I think Hillbrook has made some good efforts to try to reduce the speeding when there's a sign that goes out

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every day to help remind the parents to slow down, so just to provide a balance.

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I think the school has tried, and I know that the school has tried to get parents to carpool, but I -- I think the reality is that in -- in our car -- or our car life that we lead that, you know, not enough people are carpooling, and so we are in this repetitive thing that the rates are higher until the heat comes on, and then, you know, there's that push, and it drives the volume of cars down. But we end up right back in front of you again.

experience in other situations like this, but I don't know how we're going to get out of this repetitive cycle of just we've exceeded the limits, and so we're back in front of you, and then the pressure gets on the parents, and then they bring it down for a while. Unless there's something very much more programmatic that's required.

We've brought up many suggestions over the number of months we've been in front of you in terms of van pooling, other drop off spots and other things. I don't know if it's really the resident's position to say exactly what that is, but I think it is within the Commission's prerogative to require that that be part

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Australia at the time.

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One of the things that has come up here that I've always noticed is that the — as the main appellant, I felt that I should be given as much time to speak as the school, since I was the — one of the main reasons that it got brought back to the Council in the first place. I object to the idea of being limited to a few minutes.

Back in the seventies, the school had a hundred or so students, and it had a van, minivans that traveled up and down the Marchmont hill. There's some reluctance now by the school to bring back the minivans. And I don't see the reason for that.

They -- they could do it then, they can do it now. It would severely reduce the volume of cars, which is the main problem on Marchmont.

For a small street, we've counted on a continuing basis with videotape, so we've got the proof, 900 cars approximately pass my door daily. 900 cars.

There's only 15 houses to 17 houses beyond

me. So it's not the current -- the residents above me

that are causing the volume of traffic. It's

Hillbrook School:

What we've got is a monumental problem. The

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school increased in enrollment from 100 plus about 25 up to 315 students without any thought of the residents that live on Marchmont. And we put up with it long enough.

We don't want -- I don't want personally, I don't know if I speak for everybody, I want to see the construction continue. I don't like unsafe buildings where children have to go to school. So I think that perhaps the CUP should be allowed to go -- to allow the people, allow Hillbrook to build their properties, but put the safeguards on reduce the amount of cars that Hillbrook can bring up and down through my neighborhood, through my street.

Your duty first and foremost has always been to protect the neighborhood against all encroachments. If you look in your -- in your guides and in the government codes, that's what your duty is. That's what your prime directive is. We'd like you to follow that prime directive, to protect us against 900 cars coming up and down my street.

And I'm -- again, I do object to the three minutes, since I was the major -- the appellant on this. But you've got to do something also. We had an agreement with the school and with the Town Council that the -- there would be no weekend events. We now

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CHAIRMAN LYON: Mr. Dermer, I'm going to hold you up there. We've got comments relative to the weekend events in a desk item. Commissioners -- and you were limited to three minutes, and I have to be fair to everybody else who's speaking on this item.

desk item. I don't want to take your time up by going over it, although I was hoping that they would be more specific in the CUP number six about the time limits, whether that involved just the nighttime activities as parties and dances and all that sort of thing, or what -- what everyone has to stay out of.

And I guess I made it clear that the cleaning personnel didn't bother us, but you'll probably notice in -- that there were a couple of Saturday nights when people came up at 1:00 o'clock

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SARAH BAYNE: Sarah Bayne, head of Hillbrook School. Here we are. I believe that this hearing is about our compliance to the CUP. I believe that at this time we are in compliance with the conditional use permit, which was finally formed through an incredibly long and arduous process for the school.

We live in the neighborhood and have worked incredibly hard to not only comply with the CUP, but also to get along with our neighbors.

In particular, I wanted to speak to one of the items that Mrs. Myers spoke about in her letter.

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our art show, which previously was scheduled on weekends, was not held on weekends last year because our conditional use permit had just changed, and is not scheduled for a weekend. It starts on a Thursday and continues again on the next Monday.

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So on the school calendar, it shows the art show, but there are no -- there are no attendees.

It's a children's art exhibit. But parents and visitors will not be permitted to be on the campus. I hope that answers that question.

We have been counting daily both mornings and afternoons and expect that we will continue to do so. Our parents have launched a huge carpool campaign to include afternoons as well, and if you asked any parent, they would tell you that they are carpooling. The effort has been gargantuan, and I believe that this community deserves a lot of credit for having worked as hard as they have.

I just wanted to remind the Commission also that within the conditional use permit are safeguards to assure our compliance, including random car counts that are written into the conditional use permit. So were we to be found in compliance tonight, there would be assurances that we would not do all the things of which the neighbors seem to be accusing us.

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We continue to speak to our parents about speeding and will continue to do so. I know it's a problem for the entire community. I know that Highlow Road contains a lot of high school traffic that go cut out and avoid Los Gatos Boulevard, but we will continue to make sure that our neighbors and our parents know that they are supposed to be in compliance with the laws of the state and the town.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, Ms. Bayne. Questions? Commissioner Dubois.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: In earlier testimony this evening, someone indicated that perhaps in an attempt to get around the numbers they're dropping off people on the cul-de-sacs. Would you respond to that, please.

SARAH BAYNE: Very few children walk to school, to Hillbrook, in through the gate. We know the parents of those children, and know that there is one parent who parks down on Englewood and walks his children the three blocks up to Marchmont. There's another child who lives on Marchmont Drive who attends the school. I know of no -- no parking in the cul-de-sac.

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on the other hand, our -- if that had been the case for one or two parents, our numbers have been very comfortably below the limit such that were that to be the case, we would certainly speak to them, 'cause that's not the -- that's not the sense of what -- of what the exit counts are.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: My concern is that the parents may be understanding the intent, but looking for a way around it, and if that is in fact occurring --

SARAH BAYNE: If that's the case -
COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: -- it is impacting the neighborhood.

SARAH BAYNE: Absolutely. I totally agree with you and understand both the intent and the method of tracking what our actual counts are.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Marcucci.

commissioner marcucci; One of the earlier neighbors mentioned a van pool program or a minivan program that used to exist with the school. Can you address the feasibility, and have you looked at doing something like that again?

SARAH BAYNE: We have -- this came up in the earlier Planning Commission meeting. It was suggested, but not placed into the conditional use

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permit, that we explore van pooling, which we did in detail.

What we discovered was that it was not economically feasible for the van pool to engage us as clients, because we could not provide large enough pods of children in certain neighborhoods who -- to fill -- to fill a van and make it economically feasible for them.

We will continue -- we are in a good relationship with Kids Cab and will continue to see if it will be possible in the future. I totally agree that it would be great to have that happen, but I think it is a measure of how successful our carpooling has been that parents are choosing to carpool together and packing their cars full of kids.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Drexel.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: Was the reason that the van pooling didn't work because parents chose not to participate in it, so there wasn't a large enough pool available for van pooling in different areas because it wasn't mandatory, or you weren't making it mandatory? Have you explored mandatory carpooling with the van pool?

SARAH BAYNE: We have -- we have not made carpooling mandatory, but we have made it a -- we are

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a carpooling school basically, and I would say that we have an overwhelming majority of parents who are carpooling.

We have not made van pooling mandatory because it costs money. We've made it available to parents. And we have -- our parents are spread over a fairly -- fairly large geographical distance, and even if it were to be mandatory, it would not be -- it would not be feasible for parents to have their children travel all over the place in order to get to school.

Does that -- does that answer your question?

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Muller

COMMISSIONER MULLER: Two questions. One on the follow-on on that. If you used to have a van pooling, you never did have.

SARAH BAYNE: No. What the school had -the school had two buses which were highly underused
and cost the school -- the school lost about \$25,000 a
year on the maintenance of those -- of those buses,
because there were not enough children to fill the
buses and get them to school in a timely fashion.

In other words, the kids lived too far away, and so children would be traveling over 45 minutes.

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question is could you address the opinion here of some of the neighbors that a large effort precedes or surrounds the times when you're under the gun, so to speak, when your CUP is coming up for review, and then it seems that there's sort of a sliding, backsliding when you're not under the gun, and then it ramps up again, this sort of cyclical problem that's going on.

Could you address that, how -- what do you have in force to make this more consistent?

SARAH BAYNE: What we had in place was a regular morning count. And we knew from the time that we launched this huge effort and network of carpooling starting in the winter of last year, that in the morning we had -- we had mastered an excellent carpooling program.

We were caught by surprise in being four cars over our limit in the afternoon. And what we realized was we had to launch an all out effort to get carpooling into place in the afternoon. And that's what we seem to have done by our counts.

But our method, our own safeguard is to count every single day and to make sure that we are far below where the CUP permits us to be.

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counts?

COMMISSIONER MULLER: So you conduct daily

SARAH BAYNE: Yeah. We've been conducting daily counts.

COMMISSIONER MULLER: And you plan to do this into the future?

SARAH BAYNE: We are investigating and have been investing in a laser counter, because it's hard to devote human labor just standing out there and counting, which is what we have been doing.

But I think that that's where we're going, is getting a laser counter so we can be assured that our counts are always below. We can't afford it. The school is too important. And the school is too important to our parents and to these children to ever be in violation. We learned that very clearly.

COMMISSIONER MULLER: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Dubois, follow-up question.

existence today a formal mechanism between you and the neighborhood for communications? Do you have a committee? Is there any formal talk between members of the neighborhood and the school that we can address issues more rapidly and face to face as opposed to

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continually coming into the public forum here? Does that exist today?

SARAH BAYNE: It does not exist today.

We -- Hillbrook hosted many meetings with the neighborhood over the last two years. I underline many.

And we would continue to ask and have that available if the Commission thought that that was important. They weren't always productive meetings, but that was not through lack of effort on our part.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioners, any other questions for Ms. Bayne?

Thank you, ma'am.

The next card I have is from Ms. Houston.

JOLIE HOUSTON: Yes, good evening, Jolie
Houston, Berliner Cohen.

Actually, I'm just here to answer any further questions, but I do want to emphasize that this is a CUP, and it is not something that the school has to comply with when they're only under the gun. It applies every day that the school is open. It's their business license. It's something that they have to do to operate.

And we did look into van pooling, and I do want to emphasize, because at the last meeting we

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submitted a letter from Kids Cab showing that we had looked into it. We promised Town Council. We promised last year that we'd look into it. We did look into it. Again, next year they will look into it.

Every year they have to submit their carpooling program. Twice a year they're subject to random car counts. I don't believe that what has happened or what we're being accused of doing is getting under the gun and coming under compliance.

This van pooling is an option that will be -- may be used in the future, but the carpooling is really there to stay. They are looking into figuring out how they can do the counts more effectively and keep on top of it.

And I know the noise or speed, those are issues that the school would need to be notified also. And, you know, we apologize about the speeding, but that -- that is really not the CUP -- a CUP issue. You know, they can call the police, or they can, you know, work on it.

I believe if the speeding is still an issue, they need to notify the school and let the school know so the school can send out more letters and let

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everybody know on the street, you know, hey, slow down.

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And if there's any more questions, we'd be happy to answer any questions. Do you have any questions of me?

CHAIRMAN LYON: Any questions for Ms. Houston?

Thank you, ma'am.

Commissioner Dubois

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Would you elaborate a little bit on your effort each year to explore your van pooling? I mean, are you going back to the same company each year looking for another bid, or are you going out trying to find other alternatives --

JOLIE HOUSTON: I believe Kids Cab was the only one that we could look into. I think Sarah could talk to that issue more, but that was the one that was an option.

I know this goes way back to the Council, meetings. When we were before Council, Councilmembers wanted us to look into dropping kids off at certain parking lots. We explored that option, but the property owners did not want to incur liability, we did look into many, many options, and then we got down to really focusing in on carpooling, something

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that works, something that's within the school's control.

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And I think what you have to see here is the carpooling does work because the school can control it. It's within their control. It's the parents that care, and it's the school that cares. And some of these other ideas I think failed because they didn't have enough control over them.

So we will look into van pooling, and if there's other businesses out there that provide, I'm sure they'll look into those, too.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, Ms. Houston. I don't see any other questions.

The next speaker card I have is for Mr. Davis.

RAY DAVIS: Yes. Don't live in the neighborhood. I am concerned about the public interest in Los Gatos, okay.

I would beg to differ with Ms. Houston that this is -- isn't much of -- the impact of this hearing really isn't much.

I say different. I know for a fact, and I know you know that a use permit is -- can be revoked at any time completely for due cause.

The traffic issue, based on all the public

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testimony I've heard right from the get go, is the critical factor in the use permit of -- for this school. If they fail to satisfy the terms of the use permit on the traffic, they fail 100 percent in my opinion. And that is one of the things that you will be asked to weigh I'm sure. Okay.

As I said before, there's been a history of abuse by this school going back to 1966. You go through the file, and you can see the special privilege that the Town has extended to these people at the expense of the neighbors. It's a horror story of special privilege. And, you know, here it wants to be continued again, okay.

I read in the paper the weekend in the Mercury News about the district attorney,
Mr. Kennedy's opinion of Ms. Bayne, less than favorable if you read that same article. In fact, he described her quite succinctly as a liar.

So, you know, I think the issue of potential moral turpitude with anyone that is involved in a use permit is germane to the issue, okay. And should be considered on your part. 'Cause you're trying -- you're being asked to take her word that it will happen, and I submit to you her word isn't worth a tinker's dam.

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District attorney's opinion is what I've heard. Proof positive of that is the fact that right now they have an application before the Town for an administration building that is 700 square foot larger than what was approved in the master plan by you folks and the Town Council, approved.

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And they could care less about the -- what was approved and the wishes of the Town Council and you folks. That's -- it's just so clear they're going to bully their way through anything they can. If they can get an extra, you know, 700 -- it was a 2,000 square foot building, and they want to grow it by 700 square foot on their own. Just because they submit a plan.

It is not to be believed how these people operate.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you --

RAY DAVIS: I sit here, and it makes me mad.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, Mr. Davis:

RAY DAVIS: And that's what I say is true.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Next speaker card I have is

for Ms. Neidman. I believe. Need -- did I -- did I get -- did I say it wrong, ma'am? I'm sorry. Okay.

LUCILLE WEIDMAN: That's okay.

CHAIRMAN LYON: My vision this evening.

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I apologize.

I'd just like to address a few issues that were brought up regarding the cul-de-sac issue. I have been videotaping the traffic over the last, I guess about a year now.

I visually saw the children being dropped off at the Karen Court in the afternoon between the hours of 2:00 and 4:00 o'clock, anywhere between four and six vehicles. They would go up the street, go into Karen Court, and then I would see the children come out of the school, go into Karen Court, and then the cars would come out.

So it's anywhere between four and six vehicles that I observed doing this on a -- every once in a while I would go out and check between Oct -- September and the end of October.

Another point. The van pool, I was speaking with Ms. Sandy Bailey, and she mentioned that the parents were going to be carpooling in the Almaden area and in the Fremont area, and it was just a matter of another week before that could get started, and that was back in September. The parents were going to

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individually hire a service to take their children from the Fremont area and from the Almaden area.

In my observation, I don't see any private companies coming or going from the school either visually or on the take, like say A and E or any of the other transportation services in the area. So I don't know what happened with that plan that Ms. Bailey was speaking to.

Also, the Hillbrook family demographics that was produced -- that was brought out in the April meeting references the fact that there are 93 students in Los Gatos, 43 in Saratoga, 11 in Monte Sereno.

Just in the -- and ten in Campbell, just in the immediate area. So one would think they could at least van pool with these specific children so that the area -- I'm not saying -- it is quite diverse.

I'm not saying that's not true, 'cause she has children coming as far as Watsonville.

But you have a high number, 93 in Los Gatos, that could be a carpool program. 11, 43, and 10 in just the Monte Sereno, the Saratoga and the Campbell areas. That could be easily van pooled either with Kid Cab or one of the other local companies that are in -- in fact, there's a company in Campbell that van pools children.

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But my main concern was I just wanted clarification on the fact that children are being dropped off at cul-de-sacs. What happened to the van pool program that was going to be started for the Almaden and the Fremont children?

And in my observation, I see mainly one child per vehicle. Some children two per -- two children in a vehicle, and one vehicle had three children. So I don't see where there's a van pool situation going on right now, but I -- I can see by their numbers alone that was presented at the April meeting that they could at least carpool in the areas of Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, Saratoga and Campbell. That's quite a high number of children.

Thank you so much.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, ma am. Any questions?

Seeing none, thank you.

I have no other speaker cards for this item. At this time I will close the public hearing, return this item to the Commission for comments, questions of staff or a motion.

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You know --

of counting the number of cars.

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CHAIRMAN LYON: I'm sorry, ma'am, you don't have the opportunity to address the Commission. The public hearing has been closed. Continue, Mr. Korb.

MR. KORB: We cannot -- I cannot satisfy or confirm, based on the information we have, the testimony of the individual speakers tonight. It's essentially their perspective of what's occurring.

You -- even -- this is not a hearing where you're being asked to make a determination about the evidence that you're presented with, but ultimately if you were in a hearing environment, you would have to weigh the evidence that you have and determine which evidence you believe deserves greater weight and decide based on that evidence appropriately.

You know, the reality is the Council made a decision based on a number of different considerations, and it is very clear that pressure was placed on the school to come up with a method of reducing the amount of traffic, and that was their -- essentially a compromise that was imposed upon them, and the neighbors got that as a condition placed on the application.

But whether that will ever ultimately

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satisfy either the school or the neighbors, I can't say. This is the most objective means we have of counting the traffic.

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COMMISSIONER MARCUCCI: Thank you CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Muller.

COMMISSIONER MULLER: Do we automatically review this every six months? No. We can condition it to come back in six months?

MR. KORB: You can't place a condition, but you certainly request that staff bring it back within six months.

with this is the neighbors have not been reporting speeders to the police, and that might be another subjective arena we can get some data, and if that falls off, maybe that would at least alleviate some of the danger involved with the traffic if there's better monitoring of that aspect.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Dubois:

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Follow-up to

Commissioner Muller's comments.

I agree. I am of the opinion -- and I could be -- as a Commissioner, I certainly could, if the evidence were present, vote to revoke a conditional use permit, 'cause a conditional use permit is

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actually putting conditions on the business for operating in a neighborhood. There isn't, I don't believe at this point, sufficient evidence that we can make that kind of a finding tonight.

What troubles me most, however, is there is a lot of anecdotal evidences coming in tonight from the neighborhood that's pointing out things that potentially there are -- such as the cul-de-sac dropping off of children. Parents who were -- are users of the school. We're not even sure that they are people going to school, but I can make the assumption that they're dropping off kids to get around this traffic count. That's a potential problem.

There's certainly been testimony tonight of, you know, 900 cars in front of a house. I'm not sure that that's all the school's, but again, those are things that are raising concerns here.

The other thing that I can see, I think it's -- that is really missing in this whole mix is a communications between the neighborhood and the school. I would like to see someone from the neighborhood or the neighborhood have a -- form a committee of representatives to have -- create dialogue, direct dialogue between the school

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and neighborhood.

Now, maybe it's been done in the past, and it hasn't worked, but I think that it's worth trying, because I think you folks need to start talking.

The neighborhood has got complaints. The school needs to respond, and not respond two months, three months or six months later in front of this Commission. It needs to be dealt with now, because the frustrations are just building and building and building. 'Cause we're going to keep coming back for CUP reviews if we don't start addressing this.

so I would really like to see the neighbors and the school take the effort to step forward and start talking. I would also like to encourage the neighbors that when there are speeding problems to start calling Los Gatos Police Department so that we at the next -- at the next hearing can see evidence from another -- another source that's saying yeah, we're writing speeding tickets over on Marchmont in front of this school. We're seeing this, we're seeing that. That's what the police department does. They do enforce traffic laws out there. And if they're occurring, you should be calling them, and we would encourage you to do so.

That's where I'd like to see this go. I

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would really like to see this come back through the Commission. I know everybody's tired of hearing these things, but I think there's enough concern here tonight that we have an obligation to review, to get some good evidence to find out where evidence does exist if there is a violation of this conditional use permit.

If it does exist, then this Commission perhaps has to take action on that, and we need to have some independent evidence to look at that --

> CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Marcucci.

COMMISSIONER MARCUCCI: Is there a way that we can enlist the police department to do some traffic monitoring actions like they did on Daves Avenue? not sure what you call it, but the thing that you drive by that tells you what your speed is when you go past it.

MR. LORTZ: We will ask the police chief to put additional surveillance out there. It is a balancing act. There's only so many officers in the town at any one time, and they balance their -- the peak responsibilities. But I will ask the police chief to do that.

I will also ask the engineering department, when they do their counts, to make surveillance about

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will be factored into how we look at the counts and how we do surveillance, how we do capital improvement projects and whether we do speeding signs out there, radar signs, all of those things.

COMMISSIONER MARCUCCI: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay. Commissioner Drexel.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: How often do we do a count, a traffic count, or how often does the planning department do a traffic count?

MR. LORTZ: It's the engineering department does the counts, and they do them, I believe it's twice a year under the conditions of approval.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: So there isn't any way we can increase that number to get a more --

MR. LORTZ: The Council approved the conditional use permit, and they said twice a year.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: All right. Thank you.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ LORTZ: We will do spot checks from time to time.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay Commissioners. I, too, given the testimony this evening would like to see this CUP come back and be re-reviewed.

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I would also like staff to -- I would make the recommendation that staff do additional traffic counts including cul-de-sac drop offs so that we can monitor the situation.

I would also encourage the residents to call the police if they do see speeding or traffic violations. Please use the non-emergency line, though.

Additionally, I will -- as Commissioner Dubois mentioned, there needs to be a dialogue between the neighborhood and the school. We have had other situations with neighbors and establishments under conditional use permits that they have met in good faith, worked through their problems that once seemed that there was no way they could come together and finally, you know, work through those -- those problems and came together, were in mutual agreement of solutions. And I think that is something that needs to happen here.

Additionally, I would also encourage the school to submit a -- you know, keep updated the neighbors on its calendar of events. Hand it out, mail it to your neighbors so they know what's going It's a way that, you know, you can demonstrate to on. them that you are self policing by not having

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activities that would violate your conditional use permit and keep the neighbors informed of what is going on.

They can also be, you know, your best friend if there are activities going on on campus that are not sanctioned and keep you informed if that is happening.

So Commissioners, other comments or -- at this point? Commissioner Quintana.

COMMISSIONER QUINTANA: I'll be real short since all the rest of the Commissioners expressed most of my thoughts already.

However, I did want to emphasize that in asking staff when the traffic counts are done that the count be designed somehow to catch all the school related traffic, whether it be through the entrance, through the cul-de-sac or drop offs nearby that still affect the traffic in the neighborhood.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay. With that, I will just ask for a consensus of the Commission if they're willing to accept the report as delivered by staff, that based on the vehicle counts, the objective evidence we have that Hillbrook is compliant with their conditional use permit.

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an Architecture and Site Application. It is not a conditional use. It is focused strictly on replacement of existing buildings.

Will the owner-applicant please come forward.

SARAH BAYNE: Sarah Bayne, head of Hillbrook School. Are you ready for me to start?

Good evening. We are here to hopefully complete the final stage of preparing to complete our master plan for Hillbrook.

I'd like to spend most of the time answering specific questions that you have, but before I open it up to you, I just wanted to bring several items to your particular attention.

First of all, the plan that we have submitted, the architecture and site plan, is one that maintains the very low and modest profile architecturally over all the buildings present and planned for Hillbrook. We have been able to produce a square footage plan which is in compliance with our conditional use permit and also fits the needs and requirements of the school going forward.

There has been, I'm sure you have noticed, some change in square footage from one building to the other. That has been done to meet the requirements of

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our accreditation for the addition of an additional lavatory and nurse's station in the administration building. In exchange, we have reduced square footage in other parts of the campus, so therefore our actual -- even though the master plan was deemed conceptual in its writing at the Commission level last spring, we have submitted a plan which is of reduced square footage to that plan.

There was a question raised in the staff report, which I wanted to just address up front for you, which is one about the stucco versus wood siding in the art building. Our recommendation for the stucco siding for the art building was that stucco was also close in -- and the building closest to the art building. However, if the Commission deems it appropriate, as other buildings, including the library and the administration building, are wood sided, we would be more than happy to go in that direction. This is not an issue that we have a particular stance on.

Finally, at the recommendation of the Commission in December, we have held a neighborhood meeting, and I know that you have a desk item from Mrs. Myers about a construction plan, which for this project and the project being completed that was

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started in the year 2000, we have a construction plan. In the year 1999, which forms the substance of most of her comments, there was no construction plan. So this is going forward. We of course have a very full conditional use permit with very specific restrictions, which the school works daily to meet.

And at this time I would be happy to answer any questions that you might have about the projects.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioners, questions.

Commissioner Marcucci.

COMMISSIONER MARCUCCI: In your neighborhood meeting, did you discuss the master plan as we have before us tonight? I'm just wondering if the neighbors had any particular comments or brought up that had already been addressed.

brought up -- actually there's a letter that you received as a desk respond -- basically summarizing the issues that the neighbors brought up in the meeting, which had to do with car speed, location of signs, telling Hillbrook parents to slow down and not -- not specifically about the buildings, which actually, quite frankly, have not been the center of their concerns. Their concerns in general have been the impact of Hillbrook traffic on the neighborhood.

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SARAH BAYNE: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioner Quintana.

COMMISSIONER QUINTANA: Would you consider sort of a compromise on the stucco building and have that building itself be a transition building between the two? What I'm -- what I mean is --

SARAH BAYNE: Part stucco and part -
COMMISSIONER QUINTANA: Part stucco and

maybe part stone or wood to sort of tie it together.

SARAH BAYNE: Sure. Absolutely. Absolutely. CHAIRMAN LYON: Commissioners, other questions? Commissioner Drexel.

COMMISSIONER DREXEL: I just have one little question. I notice the size of the administration building has gotten larger, and I just want to assure your neighbors that you do not intend to be hosting conferences or enlarging your -- your activities through this larger administration building.

SARAH BAYNE: No, no. Not in any way.

And it -- the increase in square footage is almost to the -- to the foot precisely, the increase of a nurse's station, a separate lavatory and an ADA ramp.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Okay, Commissioners,

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any other questions? Seeing none, we will go to comments --

SARAH BAYNE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: -- from the public. I have two speaker cards on this item. The first card I have is from Mr. Davis.

neighborhood, except for today when a truck was parked
out there for quite some time and used the street for
staging, which we're hoping they won't do any more.

My question really, believe it or not, sort of ties into what Mr. Davis' concerns were, but I do have a question, and that is if the square footages are to be established tonight, does that establish the square footages for perpetuity? In other words, for example, on the middle school, where the approved CUP allowed 5,200 square feet, Hillbrook looks like it's borrowing from that to put on to the administration building and then taking away to build a middle school.

But then does that then allow Hillbrook in the future to submit for additional improvements that would increase square footages so as to say accommodate increased student body, or once these square footages are established tonight at A and S, does that put a cap on the size of the buildings?

And I think that to maintain an appropriate balance between buildings on that site and open space, it would be appropriate to lock in the sizes as they are now represented. Also will prevent these poor

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neighbors from having to come back.

That's my question. I mean, you don't have to answer me right now, that could be --

CHAIRMAN LYON: Actually, Ms. Nachison, what I'll do is I'll have our Town Attorney address that.

LAURA NACHISON: I have his papers, I'm sorry.

MR. KORB: Oh, my gosh. The master plan sets out the ultimate -- ultimate, the intensity of use of the site in terms of square footage. So long as the construction that has occurred or will occur is within the square footage required by the master plan, then it -- then it's okay.

Now, the plan currently is for a certain amount of square footage, and if they wanted to add subsequently an additional thousand square feet -excuse me, 34 square feet -- I don't have the -- I didn't have the matrix in front of me --

LAURA NACHISON: Well, it's --

MR. KORB: -- they could add 34 more square feet supposedly under an A and S process. But if they wanted to in fact increase the size of any of the buildings and ultimately increase the total square footage above and beyond that which is approved in the master plan, then that would be an intensification of

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the site. It would require a new CUP to amend the existing master plan.

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Also, you mentioned more students. The existing CUP sets forth the maximum number of students on site. In order to add more students independent of any work on the buildings, that would also be an intensification and would require a modification of the CUP.

LAURA NACHISON: And in that case, how -how is that monitored? I know for building, they
would have to go through a process. But if the -- if
the square footage were there -- in other -- I guess
my question is can they go up to, for example, 5,200
on the middle school?

MR. KORB: They can go up to the total square footage that is allowed under the master plan.

LAURA NACHISON: Okay. So tonight, if it's established that the administration building needs the extra square footage, that then caps the size of the middle school?

MR. KORB: That's correct.

LAURA NACHISON: Okay. Okay, thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYON: Thank you, Ms. Nachison. I have no other cards on this item.

Ms. Bayne, do you want to come back up and

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address anything that you have heard? And answer any 1 final questions that the Commission might have. 2 SARAH BAYNE: I'm available to answer any 3 questions. 4

CHAIRMAN LYON: Do you want to address anything that you've heard? Okay. Commissioners, any final questions of Ms. Bayne? I don't think so.

And I'll make the findings that the project is categorically exempt pursuant to Section 15314 of the State Environmental Guidelines as adopted by the Town, and that in reviewing the application we have taken into consideration Section 29.20.150 of the Zoning Code.

And then I would add that I think the project is consistent with the master plan, and it was clarified that the intensity of development cannot exceed the square footage that was approved by the master plan, and this one doesn't. 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which brings us to new public hearings.

And before we go into the first of those,

I'd just like to say that the procedure that we follow
is that the applicant and his team can come up, and
they have five minutes to present their project.

Excuse me? Oh, there is no -- this is in general, not
Marchmont in particular, for public hearings.

Then the public has -- members of the public have three minutes each to present their discussion. There -- on the podium is a light that shows green when you begin. When you have 30 seconds left, the green light flicks to the middle. Please try and keep track and start summing up at the green light. And then the red light goes on, and the buzzer sounds when your three minutes is up.

If there's an applicant, then the applicant has a -- and his team have a three-minute rebuttal period.

So with that, we will go to the first item on the agenda, which is 300 Marchmont Avenue,
Hillbrook School. And this is for a six months review that was requested by the Planning Commission in December. And we have a Staff Report that indicates that the traffic counts are in compliance with the Conditional Use Permit.

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of the data I recorded, and I have the videotapes with me this evening for the Commission and/or Staff to review to verify the accuracy of the data.

At the April 16th, 2001 Town Council meeting, it was established that the cap for the outbound vehicles in the morning and afternoon was not to exceed 165 vehicles. On June 6th, 2002, the outbound traffic exceeded the cap by five vehicles.

I am not here this evening to extract penalties for this infraction. I am here to ask the Commission to review the cap of 165 with the request to lower the cap to a number within the range of 130 to 150.

The unannounced traffic count data supplied to the Commission attests to the fact that Hillbrook has lowered the number of outbound vehicles to maintain the cap of 165. The indication being the carpool-vanpool program is a success.

At the April 16, 2001 Town Council meeting, Miss Humphreys, Hillbrook School carpool coordinator, made a request for a 50 percent cushion increasing the cap from 150 to 165, as the carpool program was in place for only a few months.

In March and April of last year, the two -the Town conducted two unannounced traffic counts.

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The number of outbound vehicles had been very consistent, just under 150. Miss Humphreys stated we feel confident that we can maintain those kinds of numbers. The request was approved.

In light of the data showing a reduction in inbound vehicles over the past year, the residents of Marchmont and Ann Arbor are asking that the cap be placed no higher than 150 with consideration to as low as 130.

Thank you for your consideration of this request.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you,

Ms. Weidman. Are there any questions from the

Commission? The next speaker is Ray Davis.

RAY DAVIS: Yes. I have an continuing interest, because I've participated in this right from the beginning.

The thing that stands out to me is I read the Staff Report, and I notice that it talked about ongoing twice a year counts, but they left out the key word unannounced. Unannounced. If they're not unannounced, they of course are worthless. So let's get on top of that real quick.

I also want to point out that I'm sure most of you are not aware that Town of Los Gatos was held

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by a Superior Court to be negligent in its use of land use permits in terms of living up to the terms of the conditions involved said permits. They found in the case of Auto Mall about a year ago that Town was not living up to its responsibilities, and the grand jury, along with the judge of the Superior Court -- I forget his name -- told the Town to get your act together or else.

The Town responded we will get our act together, and we will set up a -- a system so that any citizen can complain, okay, on any land use permit condition or lack of enforcement. I went down today to see if that had been done. Ladies and gentlemen, there's no -- no application for a permit on the file down below.

And I checked six months ago, the same situation, okay. I did pick up the handout on the Conditional Use Permit. Also on one on code compliance. Not one word, as the court directed, that there be an avenue for the average citizen to voice their complaint on failure to observe how conditions of land use permits are either carried out or not carried out.

And I say that is terribly pertinent to this, because if Mr. Lortz doesn't do his job, there

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is an avenue for the average citizen to complain as delineated by the courts, okay. And the Town of Los Gatos is negligent and by not following, in my opinion, contemptuous of the Superior Court order.

okay. Also, two homes up there, right -- as I mentioned before, right under the brow of that hill on Marchmont, I think it's about 260 -- number 265, something like that. I mentioned that before, that absolute engineering abomination there. Someone is either going to have a terribly serious accident or be killed because of that tremendous traffic coming down that street and coming off the top of that little bluff that should be eliminated --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you, Mr. Davis:

RAY DAVIS: -- before somebody, as I say, is
killed or seriously injured.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Martin Dermer.

MARTIN DERMER: I'm Martin Dermer, 255
Marchmont Drive, Los Gatos.

I think I have to echo some of the statements here from the prior two speakers about inaccurate reporting. The very fact of calling Marchmont Drive Marchmont Avenue is -- is just one indication of that. It clearly is -- it's Marchmont

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Drive and has been for the 40 years that I've been here and on that drive.

I want to point out that the -- the actual Staff Report last year, as presented to the Town Council in the -- when the parlimentation was made, Bud Lortz asked for 150 cars as a maximum. Council, in reviewing it, turned around and said we'll give them 165 so long as they work towards 150 cars. The 165 was a grant of a ten percent overage so that they could get -- the Hillbrook School could get their act in order.

So far as I can see, except for the slight decline in enrollment that they've had, they're still in violation of the 165 rule to some degree, and certainly in violation of the 150 rule, which to some degree they've tried to ameliorate by spreading out the people coming and going by having people come 15 or 20 minutes later to try and get them outside the hour and a quarter limitation, which is the car count that we're doing, the one hour and a quarter in the morning and one hour and a quarter in the evening.

But the car counts that Lucille Weidman put together show clearly that there's still 900 cars passing my door every day that Hillbrook is in session. They go 450 up, 450 back. Still 900 cars

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passing from morning till night, which is much too much for a small street.

The only thing I want to point out is that we have here a continuous situation, a flowing situation, and no pun intended. But if we do nothing at this point, then we're relegating this to appeals, complaints and probably courts.

what I'm suggesting that you do is that we take it from the Council that was wise enough to say give it a review for six months, and if you do nothing else at this meeting, let's set a date to review the situation again six months from now and also to have the Town Planning Department continue unannounced monitoring of the auto traffic entering and leaving Hillbrook.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Thank you. Jolie -MARTIN DERMER: I timed that pretty good.
CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Yes, you did. Almost
to the second. Jolie Houston.

Currently the school is using an electronic car counter that they purchased so they can maintain carpooling to make sure their carpooling is working. And, again, I think we've done -- we've done what we've been asked to do. This is our second six month review and, again, I would just say we are here to

And, again, we've submitted evidence that the enrollment has not dropped. That's why -- and if there's any other questions, I'd be happy to answer

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioners, do you

JOLIE HOUSTON: We have some people --CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Burke. JOLIE HOUSTON: -- from staff to help out here, too.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Okay. What incentives do you give to the parents of the students to

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carpool? Any, or is it just -- or is it just kind of a please do this?

JOLIE HOUSTON: It's -- well, we -- we -- we don't -- we require it, or we have -- I guess we just ask for them to help us with the -- to keep the cars down, and we carpool. I guess I'd have to ask staff.

Judy, do you -- it's just -- it's all volunteer. And every fall and every spring there's a big campaign to get the carpooling going. There's no monetary incentive or anything. It's just please help us keep the car count down, and they -- they do it.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: And are there any requests to have people arrive outside the count window?

JOLIE HOUSTON: Not that I'm aware of.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Okay.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Any other questions?

COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: Thank you. Would you please describe the carpool plan, your program that you have? You call it a program. I'd like to hear -- I'd like to have that described to me.

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committee and a parents' association at the school to make sure that this indeed was happening, and that people were carpooling, and that the word was out, and all during the year we promote carpooling.

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we promote carpooling by signs on the street asking people to slow down and by signs at the school asking for carpooling. In addition, we submit to the Town the documents each year indicating who drives with who. We submit a list of all of the -- all the families at the school, and then each of them have to fill out and return to the school a sheet of paper that shows who they're carpooling with, and we also send all of those into the Town.

We think we've been quite successful so far with these arrangements. And we've worked quite hard at it. We've put in a counter so that we could keep track and make sure that we weren't going over, and so far I think we've kept it under.

We've -- in addition, we've continued to push carpooling. As we took in new students this year, we indicated on admissions, through the admissions office, they had to carpool, that we are a carpool school, and that they were to make those arrangements to carpool.

And even the pre-schoolers, you will now

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often see the little seats that goes -- go in cars, the car seats, as parents take them out of cars and switch to another car. You'll see them sitting along the sidewalk at school for carpool arrangements.

So those are some of the things that we've done.

COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: And you think you've been successful with that?

BETH HOBBS: Well, yes. We're certainly much, much better than we ever were. We do not provide financial incentives, however, a number of parents have found social incentives to continue the carpooling, as the children have actually enjoyed it, and it's much easier on parents if they only have to drive one way.

COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: Okay. And have you met with the neighbors? Do you meet with them periodically, regularly, every month --

BETH HOBBS: We've met with neighbors a number of times, and I can't tell you how many over the last three years or so. We had a meeting --I can't remember when our last one was, maybe December, January, that we met with the neighbors, and our business manager, Judy Parks, is in charge of facilitating those meetings periodically with

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COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: I'm wondering if there needs to be more of a -- you know, so that the -- it's a little more than just periodically, but I would like to see more of an effort. I don't know if you have, you know, a scheduled meeting in the fall, and one in the -- you know, middle of the year just to see how things are going.

BETH HOBBS: Okay.

COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: Might be --

BETH HOBBS: We don't have them scheduled that far. No, there are not set dates like every six months, but --

COMMISSIONER TALESFORE: Maybe they have -- well, I -- no.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay. Can -- if you haven't filled out a card, would you fill out a card and bring it up --

BETH HOBBS: I will do that

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delay vehicle departures from Hillbrook grounds.

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On Thursday, May the 9th at 3:40, I was pruning in my courtyard and overheard a staff member at the gate advising two incoming drivers to delay their departure from the parking lot because the count was high at 163.

And subsequently, even more vehicles began arriving. Between 3:45 and 4:00 p.m., 16 vehicles left the school. What will Hillbrook come up with next? We residents believe that the 165 count performed only twice a day is still too many vehicles.

Some vehicles aren't even counted are the ones that are at noon and many of the late -- the after school traffic, which goes on to 6:00 p.m. and sometimes later.

At the second page of Mr. Lortz's letter, under conclusion, it states the complaint stating that people are not carpooling and are dropping children off at the end of the street appears to be unfounded. Some of these are being carpooled as far as the neighboring streets as a way to keep the car count lower from Hillbrook benefit.

At the closing of the December 5 Planning Commission review, Commissioner Dubois recommended that residents get together with Hillbrook in an

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effort to solve problems that we have. Hillbrook initiated such a meeting on January 7th, and seven of its neighbors, three Hillbrook board members, and two Hillbrook administrative members have such -- had such a meeting.

Judy Parks is a business manager and neighborhood liaison, and she has been helpful to me as has Ann Morrissey and Alan Bronson, who is the maintenance supervisor. I very much appreciate their assistance.

In December I called the Los Gatos traffic sergeant and remarked that it was very difficult to get license numbers from speeders. He said to call anyway. And I regret that I have been neglecting the call, even though I see many speeders several times a day. But I don't want to be calling all the time.

But the busy December and 11 medical appointments in January and February that I had, I failed to make the calls, and I just noticed in the packet that was sent to me that --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Please come to a conclusion, thank you.

ELAINE MYERS: Yes, I will. I have noted that some repeat violators -- I have noted some of the repeat violators' license number, and I'll keep them

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for future use. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: You seem to have, I'll say, two accusations. One was cars were held at the gate so they weren't counted as outgoing traffic.

ELAINE MYERS: No. But I can understand that it's difficult to find time. Many people are working. My husband is retired, and we could go probably at any time, and we've always gone to the Hillbrook meetings, but for people who are working — and for the staff of Hillbrook, it's unfair for them to work long hours and — into the evening. I don't know how it can be fixed.

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Before doing that, I just would like to say that my understanding is that this is a review, and there's no formal action that the Planning Commission will take, that, as the Staff Report indicates, the Hillbrook School is in compliance with the conditions of their permit as were monitored and is open for discussion, and then I'll try a consensus motion.

After discussion from the Commission, I'll try a consensus motion. Any discussion? Okay.

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COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Do -- are we precluded this evening from requesting another hearing in six months?

MR. KORB: You're not precluded from asking Staff to schedule another review. You can certainly do that if you wish to, and Staff can address the issue if Staff wishes to do so.

However, just to echo the statements made by the Chair, you do know that this is a situation where there is an existing use permit. A use permit is a property entitlement. And we -- and there is no basis today, no entitlement on the part of the Commission and no proceeding for the Commission today to make any kind of adjustment to the conditions, and there is a specific procedure under our code for doing so, but that requires evidence that there has been a clear violation and -- and any kind of adjustment would have to be measured to that violation. And, again, as the Chair has noted, Staff Report, at least based on the objective traffic studies, do not indicate a violation.

We do note that there is a condition of approval concerning construction hours that is always a problem with larger projects. And Staff is on

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notice, and I'm sure Staff will send inspectors out to insure that the construction companies are meeting the time requirements, and they may have to do so a number of times, and Hillbrook School is on notice also that they're responsible for insuring that their construction contractors do meet the schedules, and we'll do our best to make sure that that disruption to the neighborhood is terminated.

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Dubois.

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COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Well, I'm not inclined to make a motion to modify Conditional Use Permit, but

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there appears to be continuing evidence, and this

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is -- you know, I've heard this twice I think now,

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these problems. There appears to be continuing

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evidence that we haven't completely solved the

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problem.

And in the last meeting I did request that a regular dialogue occur between the school and the neighborhood so that we don't have to keep coming back here to try and solve these problems. They should be solved on a communications level.

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I am concerned by the -- we're getting now report from the police department, there are being reports made, whether they've caught anybody speeding

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out there or not, that's a police traffic issue out

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there, but it may also be a traffic calming issue that perhaps the neighborhood themselves needs to initiate.

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There's some evidence coming in tonight, although albeit from the neighborhood itself, that we have counts that may not necessarily be accurate, even though are unannounced are showing them in compliance. And that would kind of lead me to want to see this again in six months just for another review and strongly encourage the neighborhood again to establish a regular dialogue, because I think that — I think it's a shame that things like this construction noise was not addressed when it started first showing it. It should be dealt with right away.

That traffic issues, obviously something happened on February 5th, 'cause you've got three traffic calls out there, and the police department was out there, and I think we need to look at what is going on out there. And I think we can start with neighborhoods talking with Hillbrook. And perhaps it may be even necessary for the neighborhood and Hillbrook to meet with a representative of the Los Gatos Police Department or from the traffic calming person of the Planning Department to start looking at

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what are the issues, the traffic issues that are affecting this neighborhood.

So I'd really like to see it come back, if we can at all possibly do that, and have the neighborhood follow the recommendations I'm trying to --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Micciche.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Let me just ask one question. The statement is no additional reviews are recommended based on the following, because they've met the count and so forth. What would happen if during on one of our testing periods they didn't meet the count? What's the procedure for that?

MR. KORB: Well, generally, the procedure is for Staff to notify the holder of the use permit that they are in violation of the use permit and to give them notice that they have to come into compliance, and to schedule another unannounced count to see if they're back into compliance. We don't usually pull the trigger and execute anybody for, you know, one violation. We, you know, like all reasonable jurisdictions, try to bring people into compliance. And that's what would happen in this situation as well.

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COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: It wouldn't automatically come back to the Planning Commission ---

MR. KORB: No. Well, there is -- there is a condition of approval that I believe -- I think it's a condition of approval, but I'm not certain, so I don't want to misspeak, but I understand that Staff is supposed to, if they find any, I guess, significant violations of the use permit, to schedule revocation hearings immediately.

So when we make a report, and this is one of the reasons why I believe Staff is not recommending, though of course we can have another review, but not recommending it, and that is because if a violation does occur in any of the reviews, the -- or, excuse me, any of the studies, that will continue concerning the traffic issues or, like I say, we meet with any difficulty dealing with Hillbrook School regarding construction noise in excess of the hours that are allowed and that type of thing, then Staff is under an obligation to automatically schedule a revocation hearing, and Hillbrook doesn't want to go there, nor do we.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Burke.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Couple questions. It seems like the noise violations are after hours.

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MR. KORB: The standard proceed -- the standard procedure for any off hour potential violation of any code, whether it be grading, noise, construction, et cetera, is to contact the police department. The police department is knowledgeable about what they are supposed to do. They will go out, they'll check it.

As you can see, they do record their visits. And if there is an issue that does involve another department, they are to notify the other department.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Okay. 'Cause, you know, I know when my neighbor jackhammers at 8:00 o'clock on Saturday morning, I'm reluctant to call the police, 'cause I figure they have something more important to do, but --

MR. KORB: Well, that's your choice.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Well, right. I can just see people have similar kinds, okay. Our traffic counts are random. Do they involve the hoses across the street where they're obvious that they're going

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on, or unscheduled, not random?

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MR. KORB: I can't answer that question.

 $\mathtt{MR.}$ WILLIAMS: I think they're manual visual counts.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Manual visual counts?
MR. WILLIAMS: That's correct.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Would it be possible,
I'm just curious, 'cause, you know, a couple comments
were made that, you know, cars were held at the gate,
could we count both ingoing and outgoing cars? I know
we only for the permit count outgoing. But I think if
we look at numbers and we see a bunch of cars, you
know, bunch up right before they're supposed to go
out, we might see that happening, or if it doesn't,
we'll see definitely it's not happening.

MR. KORB: Well, we -- I mean, we could certainly count all sorts of things, but the -- you know, the permit conditions do state what constitutes a violation. And, you know, for instance, you know, there may be a question of good faith on the part of the school, if they're holding cars back and, you know, that's just, you know, a suggestion by some of the neighbors. But if they -- if those cars are not counted during the time, they're not technically in violation.

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we do count, and if they're in violation of those conditions, that's what we bring to your attention.

But we could count incoming and outgoing, but just not towards the permit?

> MR. KORB: Yeah. I'm not --

COMMISSIONER BURKE: (Inaudible.)

MR. KORB: I'm not say that we're going to do that. That's something that Staff can take up.

> COMMISSIONER BURKE: Okay.

MR. KORB: But that's something we can do,

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but it's not going to provide any evidence of a violation.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: I understand. And the third thing is -- or the third question is does the Town have any sort of photo radar apparatus if there is a speeding issue on that street? I mean, even if it was not to issue violations, but to issue warnings or whatever, you know, a photo radar device.

MR. KORB: I don't know. I don't think we do, but I don't know for certain. Imad is -- is nodding his head that we do not.

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner

Talesfore.

commissioner Talesfore: I have a question of Staff as well. Have you, or has anyone on the Staff met with both groups together? I mean, is that something that you would do, could do, can't do? It's not feasible?

MR. KORB: Well, oftentimes when a -- a major application is in the process of being considered and there are issues of, you know, importance to the neighborhood that affect the processing of the application, there have -- I shouldn't say oftentimes -- there have been times when

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I don't recall whether that was done with regard to Hillbrook School. We certainly are not doing it at this time, because this application has long since acted on, and Staff, you know -- as you know, in the Town is fairly lean and is allocated according to the projects that we have to deal with right now.

And as I said, I do believe I misspoke when I said oftentimes. We have done it in the past, but I don't think it's the norm.

MR. WILLIAMS: I would just add to that one of the recommendations I'm hearing tonight is take a look at traffic calming. That is a possibility that through that process we would have dialogue with -with both parties certainly in that effort as well, so --

MR. KORB: And also, I may just suggest to any member of the neighborhood that is interested in discussing traffic calming, you may want to corner That program is administered initially by the Imad. Department of Parks and Public Works, and he can give you information about how to go about getting that program considered for this neighborhood.

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Dubois.

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If I remember a COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: section in the vehicle code correctly, I think in order to enforce radar, there would have to be a survey conducted on streets every so often. that true in the Marchmont area, and has --

(End of Side A-I.)

(Beginning of Side B-I.)

MR. KORB: We're attempting to work with the owners of the auto mall and, in fact, had successfully I believe that the ultimate concern that the done so. person had was the time it took for that to happen,

That person, in his frustration, complained to the grand jury. And the grand jury did send several of its members in to investigate how we go about dealing with conditional -- conditions of use permits and enforcing those conditions.

And what the grand jurors determined, and what their report said, was that they didn't really see any clear evidence that we weren't enforcing our conditions, but they did have a concern about first, whether we had a policy regarding how will we go about enforcing those conditions when a complaint comes in.

In other words, how we intake the complaint and how long, you know, what time periods are in which

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we are to respond. And also some frustration in trying to understand the -- the relationship between the police department and the Community Development Department, each of which has, as we've already discussed here, its own role in responding to these complaints.

Because a record may be taken in the police department, that may not necessarily come back to the Community Development Department and vice versa. And so in terms of somebody coming in and saying I want to see how many complaints you've received, that kind of evidence was a little difficult to present to the grand jurors, and so they wanted to see better communications, and if possible, some modification of our record keeping system.

The response, which was approved by the Town Council and sent back to the presiding judge who's responsible for the grand jury, was that we were -- we certainly agreed that we should have a written policy. One was adopted and was also approved by Council and was forwarded to the presiding judge to notify them that we had followed that ultimate recommendation of the grand jury.

With regard to the communications issue, we certainly agreed that the communications between the

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two departments should be maintained at the highest level possible. We didn't agree that we weren't doing it, but we certainly agreed that it should be maintained at that level.

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would look at the kind of record keeping, we said we would look at the kind of record keeping that is done in the police department and make modifications if possible. But what the grand jurors did not know, and what we ultimately reported to the grand jury, was that the police department uses an off-the-shelf software program which it uses to record everything that it does, and that it's not a system that's easily modified. And as a consequence, the cost and the kind of confusion that would be ultimately associated with modifying it didn't justify doing it. So we weren't going to change it. And we reported that ultimately to the grand jury as well.

finding that we weren't complying -- or we weren't requiring compliance with our conditions, and I believe that we did everything that the grand jury required of -- or at least recommended that we do, and that we met the requirements of the law with regard to reporting back to the presiding judge.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay. I guess it's --

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excuse me, Mr. Davis, you're out of order I will add my comments now.

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While I sympathize with the neighborhood, I feel that based on the objective evidence in the Staff's Report at the current time, that Hillbrook is in compliance with their CUP, and that when they are not in compliance, based on the unannounced surveys of the traffic, monitoring of the traffic into the school or out of the school two times a year, it would be brought back to us.

So I am not convinced that having a review before the Planning Commission every six months is a productive use of our time. However, at the same time, I would urge that the neighbors take some initiative with creating a dialogue with the school, that — there were several other things that I was thinking of.

That when there are problems with the construction, to notify the police and the Planning. Department.

And that in addition, I might suggest -this is just my personal suggestion -- that the County
has a mediation service that, from my understanding,
is very successful in working out these kind of
problems that are long-term and between parties. And

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I think it's a little bit easier to do that and come to some understandings and compromises when there's a third party involved who is not -- is not a stakeholder on either side. So that's just a suggestion from my part.

So what I'm going to do is to ask that the Commission reach a consensus that we accept this report and that the -- that Hillbrook School is in compliance with their CUP, and then I'm -- I thought I had taken notes on the comments that Commissioner Dubois had made that sounded like good suggestions that be followed up by planning and/or the neighbors. Could you repeat those? They took notes on it? Could you repeat them?

MR. WILLIAMS: Sure. One, it was monitoring the construction activity. Two, it was the traffic calming request that would need to come from the neighbors to Parks and Public Works. And three is look at the speed study so we could implement radar enforcement.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay.Commissioner Dubois.

Excuse me. You're out of order. I'm sorry,

Commissioner -- were there comments from

Commissioners? Commissioner Talesfore.

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constraints of what we're working with here, I would urge -- agree with Commissioner Dubois, but I would also urge the school to take action as far as meeting with neighbors. You both have to live in the same neighborhood. It's extremely important that you both be positive about working this out. These are the figures that we have in front of us now, but things can sometimes flip or change or whatever.

This is not a scientific -- this isn't a -- how do I say it? This isn't a definite number here at any given time. But what's definite and what's important in my mind is that you work it out together.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Commissioner Burke.

commissioner Burke: I'm going to respectfully disagree with the Chairman. I think that this hour has been probably been very valuable. I mean, this is a tough situation for the neighbors and the school both.

And to just say we're going to have another hearing if there's a violation I don't think is -- is necessarily the right thing to do. I don't know if we need one every six months, you know, maybe once a year, maybe more towards maybe the middle of the

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school year, like in April or March. But -- and not necessarily every year, but I think we ought to have at least one more and see how the progress is going and maybe look at a few numbers and see how the traffic calming issues come up from the standpoint there are going to be other situations like this throughout the Town. It think it's very valuable.

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Respectfully, in my experience, the Hillbrook School has come before the Planning Commission at least three or four times while I've been on the Commission, and I didn't hear anything new tonight. The issues are all the same. They're existing. They're not within the scope of the Conditional Use Permit, and like I said, while I feel for the neighbors, I -- I will reiterate that there is some responsibility on the part of the neighbors to initiate themselves some of the solutions that can be looked at through the traffic calming, through reporting to the school when you find violations, et cetera.

Commissioner Micciche

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I'm going to agree with the Chair, though. I'm going to agree that the fact is I think there's an effort being made to do carpooling. It's reported -- has to be reported to

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the Planning Department on a periodic basis. the reports. I'm not sure what we could add to it.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Yeah, that's my other -- my other concern is that we could have a review every six months. We can find them in compliance every six months, and we haven't changed anything because we have to work within the boundaries in the Conditional Use Permit.

So with that, before that, Commissioner Dubois.

COMMISSIONER DUBOIS: Well, I'm going to be one of the dissenters here because, as you've pointed out, we haven't heard anything new, and that's what bothers me is we keep hearing evidence coming in. It's that there are violations in numbers, there are violations of the Conditional Use Permit. the evidence that our Staff went out and gathered. Ιt was evidence coming from the neighborhood, but nonetheless, it's not any less valuable than any evidence that we've had presented before us.

I think that if we take no action, that this will continue to exacerbate in this community. I think that it's good to encourage dialogue to occur between this neighborhood and this school. that we should take a proactive approach with our --

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from our Staff to try and solve real traffic problems, real neighborhood problems and real problems they believe are within the scope of this Conditional Use Permit.

And so I disagree. I personally would like to see this back in front of us in six months. I personally would like to see us make a super effort to try and solve this problem, and frankly, would volunteer my time as not part of this Commission to assist in doing that if I could. That show strong I feel about it.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay.I guess a consensus means everybody. Is that my understanding what a consensus is? Am I wrong? So we don't have a consensus. What do we do now?

MR. KORB: Well, this is not an action item ---

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Action item, so —

MR. KORB: — so you're not required to take

any action whatsoever. If you do have a — if you

can come to a consensus on whether to — whether you

want — if a majority of you want to have a follow-up

review, then it probably would be a good idea to tell

us, because otherwise there won't be one.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay. So --

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MR. KORB: So we need to know that.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: -- let's poll us on

whether we want to have a six month review or not.

Those who would like a six month review?

COMMISSIONER BURKE: Would we start with a review and set a time frame, rather than necessarily

six months?

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CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay. That's a good idea. A review. How many would like a review? Those opposed? Well, that didn't solve anything. So given that, I'm going to try something else.

I would suggest that we direct Staff to go forward with the suggestions that have been made in terms of what Staff can do, and ask the school and the neighborhood to please try again and -- we will be having more traffic counts in the next six months, in a year and a year and a half, and if there is no compliance, then the issue will be back to us.

Do we have agreement on that? That's a consensus.

MR. KORB: Madam Chair, if I may, just -- I need to just cover a couple more issues on that question you asked me before.

The first one is I -- there was a -- we did receive a letter from the -- it was the grand jury or

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from the court reminding us with regard to the grand jury report that we had not made a response, which we were required to do within a period of time. And we were required to do that. We were late. And we had to get that in. We apologize to the court, and we did get that response in. But again, the response was consistent with what I told you.

And the second point is, I'm speaking from memory, so my memory may be flawed on any one of these points, but I think that was the essence of what occurred as I recall it.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Okay. With that, I think we will now go on to Item 2.

MR. WILLIAMS: Commissioner --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Excuse me?

MR. WILLIAMS: -- I just have one comment here. What we can also do, if it would be helpful, is provide the Commission with an item of interest that indicates the results of the traffic count --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: Yeah

MR. WILLIAMS: -- so you get the information of what the traffic count numbers are every six months --

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: I think that's a very good idea.

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area.

CHAIRWOMAN QUINTANA: The second item on the agenda is 111 Church Street, and this is a request for a Conditional Use Permit to legalize a use that has been on the site for 135 years. An Architectural and Site Application permit for some minor architectural modifications, which include five items; a bell tower, a Tower of Jerusalem, which is a play structure and also used to cover up proposed mechanical equipment, a deck around, I believe, an oak tree, which would be about 150 square feet, an elevator to make access easier from the first and second floors, and roll-up doors on the existing gymnasium.
