- AB 32 Sets Goal of Reducing Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions to 1990 Levels by 2020.

- Energy Efficient Lights at Town Buildings
- HVAC at Town Hall Upgraded
- Early Adopter of LED Traffic Signals
- Installing High Pressure Sodium Street Lamps
- Solid Waste Diversion Rate at 56 %
- All Town's Heavy Duty Diesel Fueled Trucks Run on Biodiesel
- Tree City USA



Green Business Program

- ABAG Program Developed through Collaboration between Bay Area Local Governments and Federal & State EPA
- Town Certified as Green Business
- Demonstrated Compliance with Environmental regulations
- Currently 5 LG Businesses Certified "Green"
- Met Standards for Conserving Resources, Preventing Pollution, and Minimizing Waste

- Develop a Regional Vision for Climate Protection in Public Sector Operations
- Set Regional Goals
- Identify Opportunities to Reduce Emissions
- Coordinate with Other Climate Protection Organizations
- Organize Educational Programs for Members



Joint Venture Climate Task Force (Proposed Work Plan)

- Contribute to Public Policy at the Regional and State Level.
- Analyze Solutions
- Form a Procurement Pool
- Issue RFP's
- Identify and Leverage Funding Opportunities
- Pilot Solutions, Share Experiences
- Track and Report Progress Toward Goals



Community Participation

- Determine if a Volunteer Citizen Group should be Established
- Consider Assigning "Green" Oversight for an Existing Board or Commission
- The Community Services Commission has Expressed Interest in this Issue



U.S. Conference of Mayors Climate Protection Agreement

- Based on Kyoto Protocol
- Goal is 7% Reduction from 1990 Levels by 2012
- List of Potential methods to Achieve Goal Included in Agreement



Agreement Options

- Direct Staff to Return Agreement as Action Item at Next Council Meeting
- Direct Staff to Make Amendments to Agreement Regarding the GHG reduction Goal, and /or the Actions that may be Taken
- Direct Staff to Return Agreement as an Action Item after Inventory Completed and/or More Information is Available Regarding AB32 Targets



Additional Opportunities

- Emissions Inventory
 - Address Current and 1990 Level
 - Useful for AB 32 and Kyoto Goals
- Emission Reduction Goals and Plan
 - Purchase of Hybrid Vehicles
- Installing of Solar Panels at Town Facilities



Potential Cost Items

- Joint Venture Climate Protection Task Force Emissions Inventory
- Purchase of Hybrid Vehicles
- Building Modifications, such as Installation of Solar Power at Town Facilities
- Consultant Fees for Development of Implementation Plan
