SUBJECT:

CONSIDER AN APPEAL OF A DECISION BY THE PLANNING

COMMISSION APPROVING A TIME EXTENSION TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A SKATE PARK ON PROPERTY ZONED RC. A MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION HAS PREVIOUSLY BEEN MADE FOR THIS PROPOSAL. CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT U-07-155 APN 529-05-049.

PROPERTY LOCATION: 41 MILES AVENUE PROPERTY

OWNER/APPLICANT: TOWN OF LOS GATOS APPELLANT: JULIE

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RECOMMENDATION:

1. Hold the public hearing and receive public testimony.

2. Close the public hearing.

- 3. Uphold the decision of the Planning Commission and approve the time extension for Conditional Use Permit U-07-155. (motion required).
- 4. Refer to the Town Attorney for preparation of the appropriate resolution.

If the Town Council concurs that the Planning Commission's decision should be reversed or modified the Council needs to find one or more of the following (motion required):

- (1) where there was error or abuse of discretion on the part of the Planning Commission; or
- (2) the new information that was submitted to the Council during the appeal process that was not readily and reasonably available for submission to the Commission; or
- (3) an issue or policy over which the Commission did not have discretion to modify or address, but which is vested in the Council for modification or decision.

If the predominant reason for modifying or reversing the decision of the Planning Commission is new information as defined in Subsection (2) above, it is the Town's policy

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5. Refer to the Town Attorney for preparation of the appropriate resolution.

The Town of Los Gatos is the applicant for the time extension of the Conditional Use Permit, which is the subject of this appeal. Consequently, the Council has an additional alternative to withdraw the application. If the Council chooses to withdraw the application, no further action is required. This alternative is discussed in greater detail in the conclusion section of this report.

DISCUSSION:

1. Project Summary

The Town is requesting approval of a time extension to the Conditional Use Permit to construct a skate park on approximately 12,300 square feet of Town property. The site area is approximately 22,000 square feet and is currently used as a parking lot. The site is located immediately south of Balzer Field (a baseball field), east of Los Gatos Creek and the Los Gatos Creek Trail, west of Hwy. 17 and north of a Town yard used for landscaping supplies. One entrance to the park will be at the southwest corner of the site (adjacent to the Los Gatos Creek Trail) and the second entrance will be at the northeast corner of the site. The park will be enclosed by an eight foot high chain link fence. A drop off zone and five parking spaces will be provided along the eastern park boundary between the northeast entrance and Miles Avenue. The plans provided at this time are schematic and the details of the final design will be developed during the building permit process.

The existing parking lot contains approximately 34 spaces. The skate park will contain five parking spaces, and 21 spaces would be relocated nearby, resulting in a net loss of eight spaces. There is a minimum of 56 on-street parking spaces along Miles Avenue which the Initial Study noted was adequate to accommodate the loss of parking spaces at the subject site since the parking demand was determined to be less than the available parking supply.

2. Planning Commission

The Planning Commission considered this matter on October 24, 2007. The Commission accepted public testimony, closed the public hearing, and continued the matter to allow the Commission time to review the environmental documents prepared for the original Conditional Use Permit in 2004 and to allow staff time to prepare a response to the concerns raised during the public hearing (Attachment 4). On November 14, 2007 the Commission approved the Conditional Use Permit time extension (Attachment 6).

3. Appeal

An appeal of the Planning Commission's decision was received on November 19, 2007 (Attachment 1). The basis for the appeal is that the Commission erred or abused its discretion in that "conditions have changed."

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The most significant issues raised during the public hearing were parking, traffic and noise. What follows is a summary of the information provided to the Planning Commission prior to its action.

Parking - Based on the recent parking counts taken and the photographs submitted by the public, staff has determined that there is no new evidence to document that the existing on and off street parking demand along Miles Avenue is less than the available parking supply. The subject parking lot on average is not used to its fullest capacity and 56 on-street parking spaces are still available to accommodate the net loss of parking spaces. Even if the lot was fully used, as stated above, there is adequate parking available along Miles Avenue. In addition, there have been no new significant public events that have begun since 2004 and no new retail square footage has been added in the downtown area.

Traffic - Since the approval of the original application, staff estimates there has been a decrease in daily trips on Miles Avenue. This decrease is due to the reduction of seven full time Town employees and additional part time employees at the Corporation Yard and the transfer of the sanitary sewer maintenance function to West Valley Sanitation District whose offices are located in Campbell. Staff estimates that the average daily trips from the Corporation Yard have been reduced by eight to 14 trips.

Staff has not identified new evidence to support the conclusion that traffic conditions on Miles Avenue have changed significantly over the past three years. Police Department records also do not point to a traffic safety issue associated with the location of the skate park and/or Creek Trail users.

Noise - The Initial Study evaluated noise from the skate park and from skateboarders accessing the park on Miles and Edelen Avenues. The Study determined that the noise impact would be 1 and 1.8 dBA, respectively. The increase is not significant and is not perceptible to most people. Based on testimony, staff has not identified evidence that demonstrates that noise conditions have changed significantly over the past three years.

CONCLUSION

No changes are proposed to the project and the plans meet current Town requirements. There is no new evidence that conditions have changed to invalidate the previous data regarding this project.

The findings for granting a time extension under Town Code section 29.20.325(b) (Attachment 2) do not limit the discretion of the Planning Commission in deciding whether to grant an extension, with the single exception where a new application would be legally prohibited, which is not the case here. The Planning Commission determined that the physical and legal circumstances had not changed from the time the original Conditional Use Permit was approved. The Commission did not question the policy behind the selection of the Miles Avenue site for a skate park.

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Council may exercise its discretion in deciding this appeal pursuant to Town Code section 29.20.300, which allows for the modification or reversal of a Planning Commission decision where: (1) there was an error or abuse of discretion by the Commission; or (2) new information is brought for the first time to Council; or (3) the decision involves an issue or policy over which the Commission lacks authority to modify or address.

As mentioned in the recommendation section, Council has an additional alternative action available which is to withdraw the application for a time extension of the Conditional Use Permit since the Town is the applicant. Any project applicant has the ability to withdraw their application at any time. In this instance, if the Council decides that the Town should not pursue a skate park at 41 Miles Avenue at this time, it may vote to withdraw the application. If the Council decides to withdraw the application, no further action is required and this proceeding will be concluded.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

It has been determined that this project will not have a significant impact on the environment and a Mitigated Negative Declaration was previously prepared for this proposal.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The skate park project is included in the FY 2007/08-2011/12 Capital Improvement Program. Project funding includes \$88,470 from the Town (the amount remaining from \$125,000 previously allocated), \$100,000 from Monte Sereno state bond funds (subject to an upcoming deadline to utilize the funds), and the remainder from community donations. To-date, \$14,697.29 has been received in cash donations.

FINDINGS

Sec. 29.20.325 (b). Time extensions.

Before granting an extension of time the deciding body must find from the evidence:

- (1) There would be no legal impediment to granting a new application for the same approval.
- (2) The conditions originally applied or new conditions to be applied as a part of the extension approval are adopted to any new facts concerning the proposed project.

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CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

41 Miles Avenue

PROPERTY OWNER/APPLICANT: Town of Los Gatos

TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: (Planning Division)

- APPROVAL: This application shall be completed in accordance with all of the 1. conditions of approval listed below.
- EXPIRATION: Zoning approval will expire one year from Council's action on this 2. matter, unless the approval has been vested.
- MULTI-USE FACILITY. Skateboarders, rollerbladers, and other skate type uses are 3. permitted. Bicycles will not be permitted.
- 4. HOURS. Hours of the skate park shall not exceed 9:00 AM to sunset during the summer and on weekends and holidays. Hours of the skate park shall not exceed 3:00 PM to sunset during the school session. The skate park shall be locked when the park is closed.

(Building Division)

- 5. *CULTURAL RESOURCES. In the event that archaeological traces are encountered, all construction within a 50-meter radius of the find will be halted, the Community Development Director will be notified, and an archaeologist will be retained to examine the find and make appropriate recommendations.
- *REMAINS. If human remains are discovered, the Santa Clara County Coroner will be 6. notified. The Coroner will determine whether or not the remains are Native American. If the Coroner determines that the remains are not subject to his authority, he will notify the Native American Heritage Commission, who will attempt to identify descendants of the deceased Native Americans.
- 7. *REPORT. If the Community Development Director finds that the archaeological find is not a significant resource, work will resume only after the submittal of a preliminary archaeological report and after provisions for reburial and ongoing monitoring are accepted. Provisions for identifying descendants of a deceased Native American and for reburial will follow the protocol set forth in Appendix K of the CEQA Guidelines. If the site is found to be a significant archaeological site, a mitigation program will be prepared and submitted to the Community Development Director for consideration and approval, in conformance with the protocol set forth in Section 15064.5 of the CEQA Guidelines.
- *FINAL REPORT. A final report will be prepared when a find is determined to be a 8. significant archaeological site, and/or when Native American remains are found on the site. The final report will include background information on the completed work, a

- description and list of identified resources, the disposition and curation of these resources, any testing, other recovered information, and conclusions.
- 9. PERMITS REQUIRED: A building permit shall be required for the construction of the future Skateboard Park. Separate permits are required for site retaining walls, electrical, mechanical, and plumbing permits as necessary.
- 10. CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL: The Conditions of Approval must be blue-lined in full on the cover sheet of the construction plans.
- 11. SIZE OF PLANS: Four sets of construction plans, maximum size 24" x 36."
- 12. SOILS REPORT: A soils report, prepared to the satisfaction of the Building Official, containing foundation and retaining wall design recommendations, may be required to be submitted with the building permit application. This report shall be prepared by a licensed civil engineer specializing in soils mechanics. ALTERNATE: Design the foundation for an allowable soils 1,000 psf design pressure. (Uniform Building Code Volume 2 Section 1805)
- 13. FOUNDATION INSPECTIONS: A pad certificate prepared by a licensed civil engineer or land surveyor may be required to be submitted to the project building inspector at foundation inspection. This certificate shall certify compliance with the recommendations as specified in the soils report; and, the building pad elevation, on-site retaining wall locations and elevations are prepared according to approved plans. Horizontal and vertical controls shall be set and certified by a licensed surveyor or registered civil engineer for the following items:
 - a. Building pad elevation
 - b. Finish floor elevation
 - c. Foundation corner locations
- 14. TITLE 24 COMMERCIAL: For any proposed tenant improvements, on-site general path of travel shall comply with the latest California Title 24 Accessibility Standards. Work shall include, but not be limited to, accessibility to building entrances from parking facilities and sidewalks.
- 15. SPECIAL INSPECTIONS: When a special inspection is required by UBC Section 1701, the architect or engineer of record shall prepare an inspection program that shall be submitted to the Building Official for approval prior to issuance of the building permit. The Town Special Inspection form must be completely filled-out, signed by all requested parties and be blue-lined on the construction plans. Special Inspection forms are available from the Building Division Service Counter or online at www.losgatosca.gov.
- 16. NONPOINT SOURCE POLLUTION STANDARDS: The Town standard Santa Clara Valley Nonpoint Source Pollution Control Program shall be part of the plan submittal as the second page. The specification sheet is available at the Building Division Service Counter.
- 17. APPROVALS REQUIRED: The project requires the following agencies approval before issuing a building permit:
 - a. Community Development: Sandy Baily at (408) 354-6873
 - b. Engineering Department: Fletcher Parsons at 395-3460
 - c. Parks & Public Works Department: (408) 399-5777
 - d. Santa Clara County Fire Department: (408) 378-4010
 - e. Santa Clara Valley Water District

TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF PARKS AND PUBLIC WORKS: (Engineering Division)

18. PARKING. Parking access shall be reconfigured to be from the site. No backup movements into Miles Avenue will be allowed.

- 19. RETAINING WALLS. A building permit, issued by the Building Department at 110 E. Main Street, may be required for site retaining walls. Walls are not reviewed or approved by the Engineering Division of Parks and Public Works during the grading permit plan review process.
- 20. GENERAL. All public improvements shall be made according to the latest adopted Town Standard Drawings and the Town Standard Specifications. All work shall conform to the applicable Town ordinances. The adjacent public right-of-way shall be kept clear of all job related dirt and debris at the end of the day. Dirt and debris shall not be washed into storm drainage facilities. The storing of goods and materials on the sidewalk and/or the street will not be allowed unless a special permit is issued. The developer's representative in charge shall be at the job site during all working hours. Failure to maintain the public right-of-way according to this condition may result in the Town performing the required maintenance at the developer's expense.
- PUBLIC WORKS INSPECTIONS. The developer or his representative shall notify the Engineering Inspector at least twenty-four (24) hours before starting an work pertaining to on-site drainage facilities, grading or paving, and all work in the Town's right-of-way. Failure to do so will result in rejection ow work that went on without inspection.
- EROSION CONTROL. Interim and final erosion control plans shall be prepared and 22. submitted to the Engineering Division of the Parks & Public Works Department. A Notice of Intent (NOI) and Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) shall be submitted to the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board for projects disturbing more than one acre. A maximum of two weeks is allowed between clearing of an area and stabilizing/building on an area if grading is allowed during the rainy season. Interim erosion control measures, to be carried out during construction and before installation of the final landscaping shall be included. Interim erosion control method shall include, but are not limited to: silt fences, fiber rolls (with locations and details), erosion control blankets, Town standard seeding specification, filter berms, check dams. retention basins, etc. Provide erosion control measures as needed to protect downstream water quality during winter months. The grading, drainage, erosion control plans and SWPPP shall be in compliance with applicable measures contained in the amended provisions C.3 and C.14 of Order 01-024 of the amended Santa Clara County NPDES Permit.
- 23. CONSTRUCTION STREET PARKING. No vehicle having a manufacturer's rated gross vehicle weight exceeding ten thousand (10,000) pounds shall be allowed on the portion of a street which abuts property in a residential zone without prior approval from the Town Engineer (§ 15.40.070).
- 24. SITE DRAINAGE. Rainwater leaders shall be discharged to splash blocks. No through curb drains will be allowed.
- 25. STORM WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN. A storm water management shall be included with the grading permit application for all Group 1 and Group 2 projects as defined in the amended provisions C.3 C.3.d. of Order No. R2-2005-0035 of the amended Santa Clara County NPDES Permit No. CAS029718. The plan shall delineate source control measures and BMP's together with the sizing calculations. The plan shall be certified by a professional pre-qualified by the Town.
- 26. SILT AND MUD IN PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY. It is the responsibility of contractor and home owner to make sure that all dirt tracked into the public right-of-way is cleaned up on a daily basis. Mud, silt, concrete and other construction debris SHALL NOT be washed into the Town's storm drains.

- 27. RESTORATION OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS. The developer shall repair or replace all existing improvements not designated for removal that are damaged or removed because of developer's operations. Improvements such as, but not limited to: curbs, gutters, sidewalks, driveways, signs, pavements, raised pavement markers, thermoplastic pavement markings, etc. shall be repaired and replaced to a condition equal to or better than the original condition. Existing improvement to be repaired or replaced shall be at the direction of the Engineering Construction Inspector, and shall comply with all Title 24 Disabled Access provisions. Developer shall request a walk-through with the Engineering Construction Inspector before the start of construction to verify existing conditions.
- 28. CONSTRUCTION NOISE. Between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., weekdays and 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. weekends and holidays, construction, alteration or repair activities shall be allowed. No individual piece of equipment shall produce a noise level exceeding eighty-five (85) dBA at twenty-five (25) feet. If the device is located within a structure on the property, the measurement shall be made at distances as close to twenty-five (25) feet from the device as possible. The noise level at any point outside of the property plane shall not exceed eighty-five (85) dBA.

(Parks and Forestry Division)

- 29. FACILITY. The facility shall be owned and operated by the Town or its designee.
- *NOISE. The project contractor should be given the playing field schedule and should try to avoid operation of heavy equipment during the hours when baseball games are scheduled at this field whenever possible.
- 31. NOISE LEVELS. Noise levels shall be monitored on site, on Miles Avenue, and on Edelen Avenue related to skateboarders and skate park users. Measures to reduce noise levels shall be implemented if noise levels exceed the Town's noise ordinance.
- 32. SAFETY MEASURES. Town staff shall explore and implement as appropriate, methods to provide safety for skaters and users of the park who access the facility from Miles Avenue and the Los Gatos Creek Trail.
- 33. NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING. Staff shall organize a neighborhood meeting within one year of the opening of the skate park to determine whether operational aspects of the skate park should be adjusted or new measures should be implemented to address neighborhood concerns.
- 34. *PROTECTIVE FENCING. Trees to be retained shall be protected with fencing that is placed as far from the trunks as possible.
- 35. *ROOT ZONE. No construction vehicle traffic, foot traffic, paint solvent, or construction materials shall be allowed in the root zone.
- 36. *TRENCHES. Utility trenches within driplines shall be dug by hand.
- 37. *DRAINAGE. Drainage patterns shall not be changed around existing trees to be retained such that the health of the trees would not be adversely affected; water will not be allowed to pond under tree canopies.

- 38. *PRUNING. All pruning of existing trees shall be performed by a certified arborist and approved by the Town Parks and Public Works Department prior to work.
- 39. *GRADES. Grades shall not be changed around existing trees such that the health of the trees would be adversely affected.

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PROCEEDINGS:

CHAIR TALESFORE: This is a new public hearing and this is at 41 Miles Avenue. It's a Conditional Use Permit, U-07-155. Requesting approval of a time extension to construct and operate a skatepark on property zoned RC. A Mitigated Negative Declaration has previously been made for this proposal, APN 529-05-049. Property Owner/Applicant is the Town of Los Gatos. And with that I'll have...is it Mr. Tsuda? Mr. Korb? Who is going to open? Mr. Korb.

ORRY KORB: Thank you, Madam Chair. As you know, the application before you today is to extend a previously approved Conditional Use Permit. This permit has been extended once previously. The Code section under which you operate with regard to this application is 29.20.325. Subsections (a) and (b) of that section both address time extensions. The discussion really is limited at this point to the question of whether to extend a permit that has already been approved for this project.

The first of the two findings that are required are that there would be no legal impediment to granting a new application for the same approval. I think that language

speaks for itself and you can refer to the Staff Report in that regard.

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The second finding concerns conditions originally applied or new conditions applied as part of the extension approval—it says "are adopted," I think are adapted—to any new facts concerning the proposed project. The language of the Staff Report indicates that there are no new facts concerning the proposed project, at least the physical elements of the proposed project.

So once again, your decision tonight is limited to the sole question of extending the permit, not to a discussion regarding the merits of a skatepark. Speakers should keep that in mind in making their comments, and I'm sure the Chair would ask that those comments again be limited to the question of extending the permit rather than the merits of the park, which again has already been approved on that site.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you, Mr. Korb. Mr. Tsuda, did you have anything to add? Okay, Miss Baily.

SANDY BAILY: As Mr. Korb stated this is a request to approve a time extension to a Conditional Use Permit to construct a skatepark on approximately 12,300 square feet of Town property which is currently used as a parking lot. The site is located on Miles Avenue immediately south of the Bowser Baseball Field. The application will expire on

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue December 8, 2007 unless a time extension is approved, which would extend the expiration date for one year.

The hours of operation will be during daylight hours seven days a week. The park will be enclosed by an 8' high chain link fence.

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At this time it is anticipated that skateboarders and inline skaters would be allowed to use the park and BMX cyclists would be prohibited.

It is anticipated that the maximum usage of the park would be approximately 30-40 skaters at any given time during the first year, gradually decreasing to an average usage of approximately 10-20 skaters there after.

The existing parking lot contains 34 spaces. The skatepark will contain five parking spaces and a drop-off zone. There will be a net loss of 29 off-street parking spaces. Parking studies were conducted to determine the existing parking demand along Miles Avenue.

The first study was conducted for the original application between the period of March 16-24, 2004. Of the 34 parking spaces available in the parking lot, 0-16 spaces were occupied during this period. Of the 29 parking spaces available in the Engineering Division parking lot, 3-15 spaces were occupied during this period.

Additional parking studies were recently conducted this year between August 6-10, August 13-17, and October 9-12. Of the 34 parking spaces available in the parking lot,

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1-9 spaces were occupied during the August survey, and 3-7 spaces were occupied during the October survey. Of the 29 spaces available in the engineering division parking lot, 1-20 spaces were occupied during the August survey, and 13-17 spaces were occupied during the October survey.

Based on the survey results, the parking demand on

Based on the survey results, the parking demand or Miles Avenue was determined to be low and that the on- and off-street parking demand is less than the existing available parking supply. Therefore it was determined that with the loss of the 29 parking spaces there will be an adequate supply of parking spaces within the remaining Town lots on Miles Avenue. In addition, there are approximately 56 on-street parking spaces available on Miles Avenue if there is a usually high demand for parking.

Pamela Jacobs, the Interim Town Manager is here tonight to assist also in answering any questions you may have about the skatepark.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you very much. I was going to get there. Commissioner Micciche.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: You've been ignoring me tonight.

CHAIR TALESFORE: I have not. That's not true and that should not be reflected in the minutes. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER RICE: Should we vote on that?

CHAIR TALESFORE: No motion.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: During the Christmas season, the holiday season, shopping season, that lot had been used with transportation that the Town provided I believe to ferry people back and forth to the shopping area from that parking lot. During that time was that parking lot filled, or necessary? Do we know? And are they still doing that? I mean I guess that's my question.

RANDY TSUDA: The Interim Manager is indicating we no longer do that, and we have substituted valet parking in Lot #4 for that service.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: For that? Okay, thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Would you identify where Lot #4
is? Do we know?

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: It's between #5 and #3.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you.

ORRY KORB: It's the parking structure between University and Santa Cruz Avenue.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. They're not legal, so I don't know that. All right, thank you. Commissioners, any other questions at this time? All right. I have 31 speaker cards, and so I'm going to call you up five at a time if you would come over to this side of the Council chambers and be ready, and we'll start with Citizen Ray first.

What I'd like to remind you is that this decision that we're going to be making tonight is about the extension of a previously approved Conditional Use Permit, and so if

you could address your comments to that extension and not to the merits of skateboarding or the demerits of skateboarding, but basically to what we're here for, which is a time extension.

RAY DAVIS: Yeah, that's the real Joe Kapp right there. (Audience applause.) Yeah. All right. The bear will never die. The bear will never quit.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay.

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RAY DAVIS: That's why I come to public meetings.

You never know who's going to be here. Wonderful in Los

Gatos.

But I want to tell you, the comments by the socalled City Attorney have got my goat. Since when in America do we go to a public meeting and have a city attorney tell us what to think and what to say? I can't believe it. Cannot believe it. They ought to fire that guy right on the spot. Any American. Idiot.

Back to the issue at hand, the kids. I want to tell you what happened to me. One of the main reasons I'm here tonight is what happened to me in front of Los Gatos High about two weeks ago.

I'm approaching the middle crosswalk where the kids all come across. On my left I see a movement; it's a kid on a skateboard. I said well he's way over there in the street, not a worry, so I proceed ahead to cross the crosswalk. All of a sudden this kid comes flying down on his

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board; he must have been going 10-15 miles an hour. Not walking, flying across that crosswalk, and he's right smack in front of me and I'm heading right onto him at 25-30 miles an hour. Whoo! Thank God I still have some reflexes. I hit those brakes, and only because I hit the brakes in time is he not in the hospital or worse.

So I'm here tonight to argue you need to extend this time and do everything possible to make this skateboard park a reality, because it's such chump change for the City left to finance. Chump change. This City has \$70 million in reserve that pulls in annually \$3.5 to \$4 million in interest. It is a slush fund, uncommitted. And the amount of money left to do the skateboard park is so minimal it is not to be believed. So I ask you to vote for the kids, put the kids first, and the community first, and lets quit messing around with nonsense. Thank you. Everybody agree?

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(Applause breaks out from audience.)

CHAIR TALESFORE: Excuse me. I'm going to have to ask the audience that we do require that when you are here that we maintain some decorum, and I know your enthusiasm sometimes overtakes you, but if you could just contain yourself. We don't appreciate applause at this time, so thank you. It helps us get through the meetings. Vice-chairman Kane.

COMMISSIONER KANE: I serve the Commission, I serve the Town as Vice-chair, and I want to support the

Chair by reiterating what was said. Anyone can say anything they want to when the mike is open you speak to the subject before us. What the Chair has said, what the Town Attorney has said, is that the corridor on this question is so narrow we'd have trouble, any of us, getting down it. It's very, very black and white, very, very narrowly defined that there are legal impediments to granting this extension or not. It's not the pros and cons on the park, it's just whether or not we give it another year, and the Town Attorney and the Staff Report have commented that the first extension is not inappropriate, the second extension is not inappropriate. It's a very narrow corridor. It's a very simple black and white question. I just wanted to repeat what the Chair said. It's not that we don't want to hear, it's that the only thing before us tonight is so tiny and this is not a great matter of consequence per se.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. I'm going to call the next several names, and if you would just move over to your right side of the room. That would be Brian Burris, followed by Aaron Bean, followed by Phil Knopf, followed by Rick DiNapoli, and followed by Judy Holcomb. And the first speaker up would be Brain Burris.

BRIAN BURRIS: Hello, I'm Brian. I've kind of been born and raised in Los Gatos. I'm a professional skateboarder. I've been skating for about nine years now; I've been pro for about three.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue I don't really know exactly, because this has been kind of brought to my attention recently, I've read something recently by a guy named Jason Lustig I believe was his name, and he made this mention about how a skateboard park in this part of town is going to be kind of rough because most skaters...

Skateboarding is a thing of the street, that's what skateboarding is all about, and I don't know if I'm getting off topic or not, but basically what it is is I've had a lot of familiarity with that part of Town over off Edelen Drive and whatever that main street is, I can't remember. But over at Balzer Park, that's like a real hardcore parking spot; a lot of people park there.

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I'm really all for the skatepark, there's nothing wrong with it to me, but I guess I feel like maybe it should be at another location, because I've had to park in that neighborhood a lot and I've gotten a lot of tickets parking on those streets and then going down the street. That's my only place to park and due to certain familiarities with that it makes it hard.

So I don't know if I'm getting off topic or not, but if it has to do with skateboarding at Balzer Park, I think maybe it should be extended. I don't know, I guess I'm kind of off topic.

CHAIR TALESFORE: It's all right. Any questions?

Commissioner Micciche.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: As a skateboarder, if you were going to the park to skateboard, would you race across the crosswalks still?

BRIAN BURRIS: No, but going down that street it's a very, very steep hill. Going down that hill you're going to create a lot of accidents. There's going to be a lot of people, especially bikers, because that's a big main way for park for the bike riders, you know what I mean?

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Mmm-hmm.

BRIAN BURRIS: And for the most part it could create a lot of little problems just due to people going down that street, skaters just jetting down the hill to get to the park. I think Vasona I guess is a part of the county or something like that, but if it was someplace like that, a bigger area, you know, a different location, in my opinion I just think maybe like you're saying, it wouldn't hit people who were going across the crosswalk.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: I have a question. You're a professional. If you were to come down that hill, how do you stop? And what happens to your board?

BRIAN BURRIS: All the wheels now, they're all made of polyurethane; they're not made of clay, they're not made of steel anymore, and some are even made of other materials which I don't even know what they're called. But when you go down the hill usually you have to stop with what

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue we call a power slide. So you just jam your board sideways

and all four wheels don't turn the way that they're supposed

to turn, so like I said, if you're trying to go down that

hill to stop, there's a good chance you're going to slip out

and hurt yourself if you're not professional or if you're

not skilled enough to do that.

CHAIR TALESFORE: And is that a skill the way you just described this stop? I don't know if it has a name.

BRIAN BURRIS: Yeah, all skaters know what it is.

It's called a power slide.

CHAIR TALESFORE: So is that something that all skaters learn?

BRIAN BURRIS: In the long run, yes. But from the get go it takes a long time for a skater to learn that sort stuff.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you. That was my question. Thank you. Any other questions? No. Thank you.

AARON BEAN: Hi there. Good evening. I'll try to be brief and I'll try to save some of these comments for the Town Council meeting since they're not necessarily appropriate to tonight's agenda. My name is Aaron Bean. I live at 354 Johnson Avenue in Los Gatos, which is now effectively currently part of the Los Gatos Skatepark by going down the street at a high rate of speed.

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The bottom line is the Town needs a skatepark. We've got the funds to do it. We've got a great location to put it in. Although I can appreciate the previous speaker's comments, the location is really excellent. You can get to that park of Town via the Creek Trail and a handful of surface streets that are low impact. The bottom line is just what Mr. Korb said, we need to give this thing a little more time, it needs to develop.

I've been skateboarding myself for about 25 years and I would use the park myself, and my kids certainly would as well. You know, it's not about whether to build it or not, we won't get into that, it's about whether we need to give this things some more time to develop. I think we should. I believe the decision is not even to be made whether or not we should the location; it's simply to continue what we've already decided we shall continue.

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Last but not least, we've had a lot of talk about used sports facilities. You know, we don't have a lot of acreage in Los Gatos. We do have the ability to put this into effect. Let's give it a chance to come to fruition. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you very much. All right, Phil Knopf.

PHIL KNOPF: Thank you, Madam Chair and members of the Commission. My name is Phil Knopf, East Vineland Avenue. Three years ago when the Conditional Use Permit was issued

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the Town was to provide the land and the skateboard 2 community was to raise the private funds for the construction. Last year an extension was granted to the skateboard community to continue to raise private funds to complete the project. Now the skateboard community wants an extension to get the Town to provide funds for the construction of the skateboard park. I feel this is a change in the Conditional Use Permit with funding going from private to public.

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Also, when the parking element was addressed and the survey done that was three years ago. Since then the parking conditions have changed greatly. Many times on weekends and during the summer the lot is full. I feel the parking element needs to be reevaluated.

For these reasons I feel the request for an extension of the Conditional Use Permit be denied. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you very much. Commissioners, questions? None. Rick DiNapoli, followed by Judy Holcomb.

RICK DINAPOLI: Good evening, my name is Rick DiNapoli and I'm here to request that you deny the extension of the Conditional Use Permit based upon a change of conditions that have changed significantly since the initial use permit was issued in 2002. Most significantly it's been

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the expansion of the Town Corporate Yard with heavy vehicles traveling up Miles Avenue.

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Placing a skatepark at the foot of a hill while at the same time increasing the city traffic and trucks going up that hill is to put it politely, troubling, and the results can be catastrophic. For those who may dismiss this possibility, I'd like to show you that it does happen. They do skate down that hill and they do encounter vehicles.

I'd also like to point your attention to an article in the San Jose Mercury News dated August 28, 2007, on a report of a 13-year old boy skating down a steep hill in San Leandro and was killed. That hill, 165th Street, is the top. From the top down, bottom up. Here's Miles Avenue, top down, bottom up. Not a lot of difference. At a minimum this Commission should immediately put in no skateboarding down Miles Avenue, and I'd prefer Edelen as well.

Your parking report is completely deficient.

You've got a parking report that basically is during the workday when this is an overflow lot. Had they gone out after 5:00 o'clock after the report, they would have seen a little different parking lot, completely filled with people attending baseball games.

In addition, I'd like to offer other dates where the parking lot is used. Each one of these is off-hours, and for those of you who may say oh, there's only 12 there,

deficient parking report.

I'm told, and I hope it's not true, that the Planning Commission at the initial approval determined it could not take into account the safety of the access road. Safety is the primary issue and there's no way to mitigate that issue, except to do what Dennis Byron asked me to do in June after I'd stood here in the Council meeting, and that was to call him, to meet with him, to help him find an alternate location. I've called. I'm ready to meet, Dennis. You just have to return my call. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you very much.

Questions, Commissioners? None. Thank you very much. Judy

Holcomb, and then the next group of speakers would be Lynn

Kennedy, Timothy J. Murphy, Stan Iversen, Pamela Murphy, and

Lois Anderson.

JUDY HOLCOMB: My name is Judy Holcomb and I live at 210 Edelen Avenue. I am not in favor of the park as some of the people have talked about before.

I teach in Los Gatos and I'm definitely for kids, definitely want a skateboard park somewhere in Los Gatos, but not at the foot of Miles Avenue for the safety reasons that other people have already talked about. I'm just keeping it brief, but that's my feeling. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: This was about the extension, not in favor of the skateboard park. Just a reminder.

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JUDY HOLCOMB: Right. I'm supporting what Mr. DiNapoli has said.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: All right. Thank you. Okay, Stan Iversen.

STAN IVERSEN: Madam Chair, members of the Commission, my name is Stan Iversen. My wife Linda and I reside on Edelen Avenue. We're opposed to the location of the skateboard park on the Miles Avenue parking lot site. We also contend that the parking study was flawed. It didn't consider the use of that parking lot during peak periods such as during Jazz on the Plazz, and certainly I don't think it evaluated correctly the holiday use when shoppers take the shuttle bus from the parking lot to patronize downtown business.

There are other aspects that have been mentioned, and that is that the Town has extended the use of the Corporation Yard, which has added traffic, it's added a lot of very heavy truck traffic, and also there have been extended uses for Old Town's use permit, at least on two different occasions, which have added demand for that parking. The use for the Creek Trail hikers and bikers has increased and I think that we should deny this permission to extend the use permit and I think the use of the Miles Avenue parking lot, its highest and best use is to remain as a parking lot. Thank you.

Oh, I'm sorry, was it Lynn Kennedy? No, that's right.

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PAMELA MURPHY: I'm Pamela Murphy. I live at 129 Edelen Avenue, on the corner of Miles and Edelen.

I have to tell you how much the conditions have changed since you have approved the skateboard park. We see a major truck volume, back and forth, up and down that street. We see skateboarders in and out of our street. Just the anticipation of the skateboard park has increased the skateboarders and it is the scariest situation that you've ever seen in your life. The skateboarder told you earlier that you have to put on your full brakes to even stop that skateboard. You are asking for a tragedy if you continue with this CUP. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Lois Anderson.

LOIS ANDERSON: Good evening, my name is Lois
Anderson. I've lived on University Avenue for the past 30
years. I have two grown daughters. I've been very involved
in the community and athletics, and they've even
skateboarded a little bit at times when they had time for
it, but I guess I also want to deny the use of the
extension. The parking bothers me. The danger. The noise.
Everything. So I guess I'm getting off, but I'm in agreement
with them. I'm hoping that we don't extend it. So thank you
very much.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you. Questions, Commissioners? All right. Now Lynn Kennedy.

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LYNN KENNEDY: Thank you. I'm Lynn Kennedy. I live on University Avenue, and I request that you refrain from extending the CUP for the park. I'll reiterate a couple of reasons I've heard.

The skatepark is not a suitable use for the property on Miles Avenue. The lot is a natural amphitheater in close proximity to a history residential neighborhood. The decibel level of skateboarding may not exceed maximum sound levels, but the quality of the noise by the park will be a significant nuisance to the neighbors and detrimental to property values. The noise will sweep up the hillside into decks, into yards and homes, making it difficult to socialize or concentrate. I lived next to an abandoned school taken over by skateboarders and know firsthand the scraping, grating sound of incessant boarding wears quickly on the nerves. Think of fingernails on a chalkboard over and over and over again.

Also access to the park from the Los Gatos Creek Trail will increase congestion on a narrow portion of the trail that already requires weaving in and out of gates and crossing Miles Avenue. I often observe families with strollers and kids on bikes and trikes and scooters having trouble negotiating this area. It would be dangerous to add a crush of people at the skatepark entrance to the growing

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue mix of trail users, and such congestion could discourage
trail users from recreation.

Brad, I believe it was, mentioned the steep hill down Miles before and including the Creek Trail crossing. I completely agree with the dangers. I've been biking to the trail when I was passed by two skateboarders having a race going down the hill. Fortunately I can control my bike and nothing happened, but it certainly could have.

The current use of the property as a parking lot is appropriate and necessary. I echo Mr. DiNapoli's thoughts and I'll pass around some photos too. We had the same idea, I guess. When I use the trail to go shopping and run errands, I usually see that lot quite full. This Sunday there were 25 cars parked, which is shown in my pictures. The studies from up to 3:00 o'clock make no sense for this. Similarly, speaking of 3:00 o'clock, school lets out around then. It's the time that the trucks come back from the day of work, school lets out, and the kids are going to be going there, and I have to agree with the folks there that say that this is a bad recipe.

A skatepark needs to be located in a nonresidential area and in an area with safe ingress and egress
and free of attractive nuisances. The Miles lot does not
meet these criteria, and the loss of the trailhead and
overflow parking cannot be easily mitigated. The parking lot
in question is nicely paved and well lit. It's safe and it's

convenient. The street parking is too far away and it's dark and it's unsafe to unload your car. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much, and could the minutes please reflect that we were handed photographs from the speaker? Thank you. Okay, Michael Calise, and while he's coming to the mike, would the next set of speakers please come over to this part of the room and get ready? That would be Christine Currie, Kelly Dougherty, Elizabeth Veazie, and Karen Deloumi.

MICHAEL CALISE: Hi, my name is Mike Calise. I live with my family, Donna, my wife, and my two children, nine and six years old daughters who skateboard. I live on 247 Edelen Avenue and I would like to go on record saying that enough is enough, folks.

The funding momentum for this private sector has been anemic to get this approved. The extension has gone literally nowhere. We're all wasting our time here. There's a clear sign in the community that does want this to occur. You know, there's this debate about, with due respect to some opinion, that skateboarding needs a safe place to happen. That's confusion and blindness behind that argument. I would like to suggest that skateboarding is both an extreme sport and a means of local transportation, and one does not obviate the other, and we need to consider that.

So I would like to make the statement that it is ludicrous to continue, to waste taxpayer money, to waste the

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue time and effort of all involved, and we should kill this in its tracks before we kill something else. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Christine Currie.

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CHRISTINE CURRIE: Good evening, Madam Chair and Commissioners. My name is Christine Currie. I reside at 117 Broadway.

I have two short guys, five and seven. They love to do nothing but get on that crazy skateboard and go as fast as they can. But what I want to talk to you about tonight is the Town Code of Los Gatos, the Municipal Code Section 19.30.020, Subheading 1, refers to the public health, welfare, and safety. Now I can tell you, I've had my kids down this hill, and I don't care how much Mommy's screaming and please don't do it, they're going to do it, and those multi-axle trucks coming out of the public works right across the street from the proposed spot, I'm going to say just please, please, please deny this, because I think there's a spot here somewhere in our lovely community for this park, but it's not at 41 Miles Avenue.

The other thing I wanted to bring up to you was Section 29.20.325, also part of our Municipal Code, which is the Town Code of Los Gatos, and that reads on Subsection (2) that the conditions originally applied or new conditions to be applied as part of the extension cannot have changes to safety or changes to the impediment of granting a new application. So basically in legalize, and I'm just a mom,

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so I'm going to guess that that means anything that is safety related that is a change in the venue or the change of the wording, then it needs to be maybe a brand new application. So just wanted to give you that as my sort of top of the mind mommy awareness.

And then I'd like to just add one tiny thing that's kind of still on the same page, and that's the political hot potato that you have. There's been a lot of presumptions about the money being raised for this, or that the money is already in-hand. Let's all not forget that the money is not in-hand, so I don't appreciate as a taxpayer to be strong armed into a February initiative, but I know that's another issue, so I'm pleading with you as the representatives of our lovely town to deny this. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. Do we have a question? No. Okay, Kelly Dougherty, followed by Elizabeth Veazie.

KELLY DOUGHERTY: Thank you. My name is Kelly Dougherty. I reside at 321 University Avenue with my husband; we've lived there for ten years.

I don't have to go through everything that everybody else just said, because I am also against the extension of the use permit for all the reasons that have been mentioned, mostly safety and the location of this park.

I'd love to see it located somewhere else. Thank you.

ELIZABETH VEAZIE: Elizabeth Veazie. I reside here in Los Gatos and I have been very much involved in the whole process prior to the commitment from the Town Council to look at the site that we're discussing this evening, so I am for Miles Avenue.

I realize that many people here have the concerns of that hill, although I'm taking into consideration that we worked closely with two amazing people, and that was Pamela Jacobs and John Curtis, and I feel like their commitment and their management skills here in the Town, and providing the opportunity for other things that were built, if their concerns were concerns that people are bringing to our attention this evening, it would have been stopped or not even considered at all, and I trust their judgment. They were there when the children were coming to them and they were bringing their ideas. We did bring our concerns. They ran tests.

There was a lot to take into consideration, and it has been a long time, and I would really like to see this move forward and that this project be considered and extended, because I'm putting my trust in those people who were there with us at the time when we had a site visit and we encouraged the public to come out and speak about these concerns, and I was at every one of those meetings.

Regarding efforts, this is truly a grassroots, community-driven, team effort. We are not perfect. We've hit many bumps, no pun intended, but our only motivation is the kids. Not politics, not anything else. I'm excited to provide you with an update on this past year's efforts.

First, nothing has changed in regard to the Miles Avenue location. What has changed? Young and old community members rallied to provide a large number of small donations. The fund for the Town now has \$15,000 approximately, up from \$7,000 last year. Pledges in writing that the Town does not have are as follows: \$50,000 in matching contributions from Sobrato; a \$10,000 donation of cement; another \$3,000 in cement discounts; offer of all materials at costs, conservatively worth \$30,000 dollars;

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue offer of all labor at cost, worth conservatively \$30,000; other offers of free labor, not in the value totaled below, and the offers of labor can only be used if worked closely with the Town. We do have a general contractor on board. We have another \$2,000 to \$5,000 in cash pledges; a pledge of all CVC. We're not sure of the value at this time, but there's plenty. The \$125,000 from the Town of Los Gatos; \$100,000 from Monte Sereno. This totals up to approximately \$368,000 conservatively. Estimated cost of the park? Between \$750,000 and \$850,000. Gap: \$400,000.

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Funding notes: Gap could be funded with redevelopment funds. Town must spend this money or lose the dollars. Funding never part of the Town budget. Funding never a tax increase. Town has the money. We have been turned down for grants and corporate donations, because our Town reserves and per capita income are very high. Most parks are funded by towns that value youth and consider themselves youth-friendly. Low per capita towns have gotten skateparks well before us.

The ballet measure has enough signatures to quality for the ballet. On November 5th the Council can choose to either just pass it or to delay it and have it go to the ballot.

Other items: Additional funding efforts are in the works. One of them possibly could bring in another \$30,000 to \$60,000. Bottle drive that the community can participate

in, but skateparks are not built with bake sales and bottle drives, yet another funding event is also in the works.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much.

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KAREN DELOUMI: Could you read the closing?

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, wait a minute. Any questions, Commissioners? Seeing none, thank you, but would the minutes please reflect that we had a handout from this speaker. Thank you very much. Randi Chen, followed by Elizabeth Stewart.

RANDI CHEN: Hi, I'm Randi Chen and I live at 118 Edelen Avenue, and I don't think you should extend the CUP. Three-and-a-half years is a long time to try and raise money. I know it is very difficult; I try to raise it for the schools every year and it is just really hard to come by. But three-and-a-half years is a long time and it's not really anywhere close.

The EIR is outdated. There is a lot more truck traffic, and it was three-and-a-half years ago and I have to believe that conditions have changed since then.

Your parking study was conducted in March and August, not during Little League, not after school when the skateboard park would be used, not during the holiday season where people park and walk up, not during Jazz on the Plazz, so I think that needs to be redone, and for those reasons I don't think you should extend the CUP.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue RANDI CHEN: And Phil, the Red Sox were winning when I walked in.

CHAIR TALESFORE: We appreciate all updates. Okay,

Elizabeth Stewart, followed by Joe Kapp, and then Don Perry.

ELIZABETH STEWART: My name is Elizabeth Stewart.

I live at 124 Edelen Avenue, and I don't have a lot to add.

I think everyone has ready said it and said it beautifully.

I do also wish to be on the side of those who are opposed to the skateboard park there.

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I know there is so much passion, and you heard it tonight from those who really, really want this park. However, since the Town has already looked at at least 20 other sites and dismissed them all, I think that if this is the best that we have to offer, we need to go back to the drawing board and find something that will really make everyone happy.

There are so many issues. There's safety. There's financial. There's liability. There are all kinds of issues here to be faced, so because of those reasons I really have to be on the side of those who are opposed to this park. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Joe Kapp, and then Don Perry. You don't have to use all three minutes. Not that we don't want to hear from you, but if you've already heard it being said, you could just say you've heard it.

JOE KAPP: I don't think anybody appreciates sports more than I do, it's been my life, and I wish skateboarders find the right place for them. But I've lived on Edelen Avenue with Jennifer and my three children, and this is common sense, if any of us have any, to just go down to Miles, and take the information that you've heard here tonight.

Somebody's going to get hit, even the way it exists now. They're going to get hit. You got a walkway there. You got a steep hill going down. It's really dangerous. Mr. Calise, our neighbor, says kill this effort here, and that's correct, because somebody's going to get killed on that street.

I've been here 20 years, the longest I've ever...
I've been a migratory football worker. And I've been in
Canada, Minnesota, Boston, Moose Jaw, Swift Current, all of
those places. This is not the right place to put it. And I
love sports. I gotta love it.

And the traffic isn't just right there. You turn in to come in on University Avenue, like we have citizens here from University Avenue. I'd been living here two years and I get hit out there on that street. I mean I was thinking maybe Los Gatos doesn't want any Mexicans in town here. But I got hit there, and so the traffic isn't just right there at the bottom of Miles, it's the entrance to the City, and this is a great city, believe it or not.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue So I vote turn them down. They gotta go find another spot. Level ground. I mean you can't do it on this hill. It's dangerous. I invite all of you to come and join us and we'll look at that street. There are no stop signs.

They got no brakes on those things, you know? Any questions?

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. Questions.

JOE KAPP: Thank you, and thank you for serving the city here. We appreciate it.

CHAIR TALESFORE: You're welcome. And for the record, could it reflect that I'm sure that my fellow commissioners join me, but we all do believe this is a great town. Thank you. Don Perry.

DON PERRY: Good evening. As you know I'm on the City Council in Monte Sereno, so for the record I am not here in any official capacity. On a personal note I have two children, ages seven and nine, and for your findings this evening I know my kids would like very much to skate at a skatepark and I would encourage you. I know there are a lot of hoops that still need to be jumped through before the park becomes a reality, but to move it along and see if those hoops can be jumped through, I would encourage you to make the findings tonight to make the extension. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Excuse me, would you please wait at the podium. Thank you. We have a question from Vice-chair Kane.

COMMISSIONER KANE: Councilperson. Monte Sereno has a lot of open space. DON PERRY: Where? COMMISSIONER KANE: Where? DON PERRY: Which open space would you be speaking of? COMMISSIONER KANE: Starting at one end, going to the other. CHAIR TALESFORE: Okav. thank vou. Q DON PERRY: Is that a question? 1.0 COMMISSIONER KANE: No. 11 CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. Okay, here's the next 12 group of speakers. Lori Baker, followed by Mona Voss, 13 followed by John D. Voss, followed by Julie DiNapoli, 14 followed by Dennis Byron. Thank you, and if you would all 15 come over to that side of the audience I'd appreciate it. 16 LORI BAKER: Good evening, Madam Chair, and Commissioners. My name is Lori Baker and I'm a homeowner at 252 Edelen Avenue. I've been living there about three years 18 now, and I am a supporter of the skatepark but am against 19 the extension of this Miles Avenue location. 20 Conditions have changed and there are three areas 21 of concern where I see the conditions have changed: areas 22 around parking, noise, as well as safety. 23 So to start with the parking, the Miles parking 24

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lot is an asset to our community. It is an area where we

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welcome other people from other neighborhoods to come and take part of our holiday parade, Jazz on the Plazz, and take advantage of our shopping and restaurants. Since this was put in place we've had 373 signatures from people in the community as well as merchants saying that this is a valuable asset that we need to protect. So the conditions have changed around parking.

Around the noise. Having lived in the neighborhood for a couple of years now, I've noticed in the last six months the amount of skateboard traffic has increased dramatically along with the amount of truck traffic, and I can share with you that skateboarding is not a quiet sport. So when skateboarders are going down the street I can hear them in my home, and I can only imagine the volume of noise that will occur when we build a large wooden ramp for skateboarders to come to en mass in our backyard. So again, I would ask the Commission to consider this as a condition that has changed. We're seeing the volume of skateboarders go up and this noise level will be a detriment to the quality of life in our community on Edelen Avenue.

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And then finally on the area of safety, I'd like you to consider the fact that this has changed around the amount of trucks we have going up and down Edelen today.

Anyone that lives in our neighborhood knows the amount of effort it takes to negotiate in and out of our driveways. We have blind corners at Bentley. We have a dead end. We have

the steepness of the Miles grade. And I can tell you, it's a daily task to try to get in and out of my driveway without hitting a pedestrian, a bicyclist, a skateboarder, or a truck that's coming around the corner and not used to it being a blind corner that it is. And right now the idea of adding more skateboarding traffic seems reckless and an endangerment not only to the youth, but to the residents in our neighborhood.

Again, conditions have changed. So thank you for your consideration. I appreciate the opportunity to be heard here today. Thank you.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Mona Voss.

MONA VOSS: Good evening. I'm going to read a few statements of fact relating to Miles Avenue. My name is Mona Voss. I live at 123 Edelen Avenue. I'm currently the Director of Environmental Health and Safety for Foothill-De Anza College. For the prior 25 years I was Director and Vice-president of Environmental Health and Safety for Safety Clean Laidlaw. I am familiar with trucks, accidents investigation with trucks, and environmental permitting.

The site proposed for the skateboard park has not had an Environmental Impact Report performed and the site has not had a traffic impact study performed. This proposed site lies at a bottom of a hill. Site access has a pronounced curve. Surrounding roads are used by cars and by light and heavy service vehicles.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue Every accident has an immediate cause and an underlying cause, or root cause. There have been multiple skateboard accidents and fatalities in the United States and Canada in the past year. In the last 90 days, 90 days, in just the state of California there have been three skateboard accidents and fatalities.

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On August 11, 2007 in Marino Valley in Riverside County a 12-year-old boy died after falling off his skateboard and hitting his head. The immediate cause of the accident was failure to wear a helmet. On August 11, 2007 in Menifee/Long Beach, California an 11-year-old girl died three days after sustaining injuries after she lost control and slid beneath a moving vehicle. The immediate cause of the fatality was loss of balance and sliding beneath a heavy vehicle. The underlying cause was skateboarding in close association with vehicles. On August 27th in San Leandro, Alameda County, a teenager died due to head injuries. The immediate cause was a fall without head protection. The underlying cause was the topography, a hill used for skateboarding. Wendy Andrews, she was an eyewitness, says, *I go home that way every night and there's usually a couple of kids at a top of a hill with their skateboards ready to come down, and that's a tragedy. This is an accident just looking for somewhere to happen."

The root cause, or underlying cause, for the California fatalities are skating in close proximity to

moving vehicles and skating on unsafe topography. The Miles Avenue property has both traffic in close proximity and unsafe topography.

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Again, this site has not had an Environmental Impact Report or a traffic impact study performed. We have no verification that this is a safe location for skateboards. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you, Miss Voss.

Anyone have questions? Seeing none, that would be John D.

Voss, the next speaker, followed by Julie DiNapoli.

JOHN VOSS: Yes, good evening. My name is John Voss. I live at 234 Edelen Avenue and have been a resident of Los Gatos for 40 years.

For fear of just being redundant of what's already been said this evening I'm just going to reemphasize the aspects of the safety issues, eliminating public parking, which is a scarce commodity in this town, which could affect retail sails and also tax revenue to the City, the loss of a lot. Also displacement in a Town designated historical district.

I would just encourage the Town to find another spot that has a strategic viewpoint of a common recreational facility meeting the needs of the community. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you very much.

Questions? None. Julie DiNapoli.

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JULIE DINAPOLI: Good evening. I also don't want to sound redundant, but I do feel that I would like to reiterate that there was no traffic study done on this Negative Declaration, and the fact that this is the only street in our town with oversized vehicles and multi-axle trucks. No other way in. No other way out. Including police vehicles. These are our Town employees driving these trucks, and the fact that they may seriously endanger the lives of these kids on skateboards going down Miles Avenue is great, and I do not want to be the person out there that is going 10 to have to pick up a kid off a street when an accident like 11 this happens. So I invite all of you as well to stop by and 12 witness what we witness on a daily basis, and what we are seeing an increase of. The reality of these kids going down Miles Avenue is there.

Also, since Los Gatos is most definitely a kid-friendly town and has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars on many programs for our youth, we ask that the Planning Commission do the right thing for our youth tonight and not extend the CUP for that location. Let us place our time and energy on a land usage in a prime location that is safe for all of our kids, and not one that could lead to a fatality. Thank you for your time and everything that you do for our town.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. And Dennis
Byron. Next group of speakers would include Steven
Leonardis, Maria Ristow, Susan Farwell, and then Cory Farr.

DENNIS BYON: Thank you. My name is Dennis Byron and I live at 455 San Benito Avenue in Los Gatos. I don't want to waste your time. There's a lot of passion on both sides of this issue. I don't want to talk about the 3,000 signatures the skateboarders have raised. I don't want to talk about the parking mitigations that we've talked about. I don't want to talk about the safety factors that we wanted to put in place on Miles Avenue and the fact that the entrance to the skateboard park will be on the Creek Trail. As Vice-chairman Kane said, this is a very narrow topic of discussion that we have here.

Basically nothing has changed since the last extension of this Conditional Use Permit. There have been parking studies. We've looked at 29 sites, other locations for the skateboard park. This comes down to the best location. Please extend this Conditional Use Permit. Let the Town of Los Gatos decide whether or not this skateboard park goes in. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Do we have any questions,

Commissioners? None. Okay, thank you very much. Steven

Leonardis.

STEVEN LEONARDIS: I'm Steven Leonardis. I'm a Los Gatos Skatepark Committee member. I came here tonight with a

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue totally different speech, but after listening to some of the concerns of the Edelen neighborhood, who include teachers and friends of friends, I want to just say some of their concerns can be mitigated. Maybe we should take the street of Edelen Avenue and pave it with cobblestone so skateboarders will not roll down it, because it sounds like whether there's a skatepark there or not there is a safety issue with skateboarders going the hill potentially.

Now there are a lot of hills in Los Gatos. This is not the only hill and it's not the only hill that can be considered dangerous, but for lack of a better term, this sounds like a classic not-in-my-backyard argument from the Edelen Avenue and University Avenue residents. The DiNapolis moved to the neighborhood in 2005, about six months after this had been approved by your commission, and they knew, they were aware of the skatepark being in that location, which is in a RDA zone, which is a blighted area. True, they live in a historical district, however this is a blighted area which used to be a recycling area operated by the Town of Los Gatos. We had gone through, as was said earlier, a number of different sites for the skatepark.

I'd like to obviously request that the CUP be extended for one more year, because this is going on the ballet in February, and this gives everybody a chance to vote, and it think that's the only democratic way to resolve this. This is the American Way. Let's continue with the

American Way rather than shoot it down this evening because there's passion on both sides of the equation and I have friends on both sides of the fence. Thank you.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. Maria Ristow.

MARIA RISTOW: Hi, I'm Maria Ristow. I live at 85 Broadway. I have a ten-year-old son who is a skateboarder and a seven-year-old daughter. I've lived in Los Gatos for 20 years and I consider this a very walkable town. I walk probably ten times more distance than I ever drive. My kids walk to and from school. We ride our bikes on the Creek Trail from Broadway to get to Vasona Park. My kids have taken camps.

I would say that I'm in favor of extending this deadline. I think a lot of points that were brought up:

Parking issues have increased everywhere in town. Traffic issues have increased everywhere in town. I don't think it's unique to this site. I don't think anything specific to this site has changed over time.

As somebody who has ridden bikes with my children down the trail past Miles Avenue where there is a stop sign for the trucks to stop, we personally have had trucks stop for us when we're about 20' away from that crossing and wave us on. The Town employees are very considerate of people on their bicycles and aware of who is there and what a large truck they're driving. On a weekly basis I or one of my children have almost been hit by people in SUVs talking on

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue their cell phones. I look at any other part of this town and realize you would have to go across Blossom Hill or other streets where you would have to deal with drivers who are not aware of their hazard to pedestrians.

So I think this is an ideal location. I think we need more time to raise money. I think we don't want to kill this skatepark yet. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. Any questions? Seeing none, thank you very much for that. Susan Farwell.

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SUSAN FARWELL: Susan Farwell, 121 Willow Avenue. I'm here to speak to ask the Commission to deny the time extension for this, and the reason why is I feel that it's your responsibility as representatives of the Town of Los Gatos to realize that there have been changes, even over the last year. With the addition of the Apple store alone it looks like there's 15-20 employees in that space on an hourly basis. I believe that with the increase in traffic, even in the past year, definitely in the last three-and-ahalf years, that the traffic demands have changed. The parking demands have changed. The skateboarding demands have changed, and I feel it's your responsibility to at least ask for the minimum of a new parking study, a new EIR, and to deny the time extension solely based on the fact that it has changed over the past three-and-a-half years and it has changed over the past year.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Any questions? Seeing none, okay. Cory Farr. And then the next group of speakers would be Jordan Kahler, Heidi Farr, Michael Burke, Tim Murphy, and Tom Calderwood. And I think that will be it unless I get another card. So thank you.

CORY FARR: My name is Cory Farr. I live at 337 Johnson Avenue, one of the premier downhill skating areas in Los Gatos. We actually put speed bumps on our street, so now the teenagers can come down our street and hit the bump to catch air. Then their little buddy picks them up at the bottom of the hill and brings him back up. So I'm thinking to myself, how could be get these kids off of my street, off of your street, and get them off the streets? Go downtown. People are skateboarding and running into you. Get them off the street and put them at a park. They'd love a park. The park is a perfect place. Then we don't have to worry about them on our streets. These people...

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(Inaudible comment by audience member.)

CORY FARR: God bless you. You live in a great neighborhood, and I love the support, but what you're saying is they're going to come down this hill. No. they're going to...

CHAIR TALESFORE: Excuse me. Would you mind addressing your comments to us? Thank you.

CORY FARR: They're not going to go down the hill, they're going to actually go to the skatepark and go in

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1 | these big pools and stuff to skate, so that way they're not going through the neighborhoods to skate. So I'm definitely in favor of extending it and letting people vote on this subject, for sure. CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. RAY DAVIS (from audience): Here, here.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: I don't want any more calling out from the audience. Heidi Farr will be next after Jordan. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER KANE: Caution him.

CHAIR TALESFORE: All right, Jordan Kahler.

JORDAN KAHLER. My name is Jordan Kahler. I live at 226 Edelen Avenue and I'm here to say, very briefly, I've seen the area, it hasn't changed much. There are concerns. Those concerns were looked at, considered very carefully. The optimum place for a skatepark in Los Gatos was determined by this Commission to be the location that's agreed on now. The Town shouldered the responsibility of finance, and the skateboard community, and that is slowly being met. We need the time to do it, and the Commission should give it the opportunity to take place.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you. Was that it? All right, any questions? None. Heidi Farr.

HEIDI FARR: Good evening, I'm Heidi Farr. I live at 337 Johnson Avenue, and I kept my kids up really late

just so they can see the democratic process in action and I think this is well worth for them to watch and experience.

Another thing that they need is a skateboard park, and we just need somewhere safe. Come out to our street. Visit our street. That's where they're coming down, and their friends and pulling them back up with their cars. How safe is that? We need a place where they can go and they can be in a safe and well-supervised area. It's got to be in somebody's backyard, and if you'd like to put it on Johnson Avenue, we'd love to have it. We just want it to be enclosed and to be safe and supervised. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Anyone?
Okay, no questions. Michael Burke.

MICHAEL BURKE: Thank you. My name is Michael Burke. I live on University Avenue.

The Commission has been shown tonight credible evidence that the parking lot on Miles is being used much more than the Staff Report indicated. This is because the parking lot was not studied when the lot is in use: weekends, evenings, holiday season. This represents a new fact related to the application. To quote the minutes from last year's meeting on the extension, "Mr. Tsuda provided comments that the traffic study indicated that the lot only fills up for special events in the town." Well unless every Saturday and Sunday is a special event, that has changed.

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue Furthermore, new approvals over the past three years need to be taken into account. One such approval is for Old Town's use of the amphitheater and regular special events. That's going to increase the need of that lot.

And valid noise and safety issues have been brought up to the Commission tonight. The CUP does not address those issues. We have some misconceptions here.

One, these issues have been dealt with before. Three years ago when I sat up there with you I was told by Mr. Korb that it would be inappropriate to add conditions to this CUP because it was being sponsored by the Town Council-check the minutes, Mr. Korb, sorry-because we would be telling them how to run a park that they were going to run, and that was out of our purview.

Secondly, replacement parking. There are no lights. There is no sidewalk along Miles. It's farther away. It's not as safe. It's not practical. It's not going to get used.

Third misconception. Neighborhoods are protected by permit parking. Permit parking is not actively enforced.

Cars park in front of my house all day and don't get ticketed or even chalked.

Another misconception is voting against the extension kills a project. No. Just be new conditions added when this comes back to the Council.

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And I want to talk to you a little bit about the section in the Code on time extensions. I think Mr. Korb has framed this much too narrowly. The Staff Report, Exhibit A, is incredibly misleading. It draws conclusions of fact based on testimony that hadn't even happened yet, and that is very distressing. You know, you hadn't even had the meeting yet and were already saying that no facts have changed. You haven't had the testimony yet.

So I would ask you to look at Section 29.20.325 on extensions, and read it for yourself, and see if you are limited to only dealing with facts that have changed. There is nothing in there that says that. It says, "Conditions originally applied or new conditions to be applied as part of the project extension approval are adapted to any new facts of the proposed project." If there are new facts, you need to adopt new conditions. But nothing that says unless there are new facts you have to continue this. Absolutely nothing. Thank you.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Any questions of the speaker?

Seeing none, thank you very much. Oh, Commissioner

O'Donnell, did you have a question? I thought I saw your

hand up. Thank you. Okay, Tim Murphy, followed by Tom

Calderwood.

TIM MURPHY: My name is Tim Murphy. I reside at 129 Edelen Avenue, Los Gatos. I'm in the industrial real estate business as an occupation and I will tell you that is

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue I was in a city where I had a development both myself and my tenants would be very much opposed to putting this type of a use within an industrial park. You've imposed upon me potential liability that I didn't want any part of. I'm driving big trucks; I've got problems.

People are trying to sell this, or they're promoting the idea it's a park-like setting because you're next to the baseball park. I go down there and I suggest that you're in an industrial park setting. It's an industrial park, and from the City's standpoint I'd be very concerned about the fact that I am the major tenant and yet I'm also the applicant to bring issues in there. I think you've got to really take a real hard look at that.

Having said that, my issue really is the parking. If you read the reports we are told that studies and observations were made initially and have been made since both in August and October of this year, and in one of the reports they talked about looking at the parking from 11:00 o'clock in the morning till 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Monday through Friday. The conclusion is that the parking is under-utilized. Now I would suggest to you that using that criteria, that if you look at the parking situation at the downtown Safeway store from 11:00 o'clock in the morning until 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, you would conclude that our Safeway store is overparked, or underparked, or pardon me, overparked, parking is under-utilized. I would suggest

you go back at 5:00 o'clock or 6:00 o'clock and make that same conclusion. It's not going to happen.

I've done traffic studies. I've done environment impact reports. When I do those I'm required to look at peak hour. In this case peak hour parking is not Monday through Friday during the day. In August a lot of people are on vacation. It's when there are major events downtown such as events at the high school and heavy retail periods, which is why this was put up there in the first place. I would suggest any of you to look me in the eye and tell me that parking lot is not full during the Christmas parade. That's what it's there for and these uses still exist.

I would question if the Staff actually went down and talked to the residents at 31 Miles. This is a 12-unit residential complex that was put in there a few years ago. I did today. One of the residents relayed to me that as he comes back...

(Timer sounds.)

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Would you just please wrap up. I'll give you like 15 seconds.

TIM MURPHY: All right, I request that you do not extend this CUP, and if you do that you add as a condition of there be a third party traffic and parking study. You are sitting here with an absolute conflict of interest whereby you're having your Staff, who in fact is the applicant, and you're accepting their study as part of this submittal. You

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wouldn't do that for me. You wouldn't let my people do it, so I would request that that condition be added to this if in fact you do extend. Thank you. CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, thank you. Do we have a question? Two questions. Just a minute. Commissioner Bourgeois had his hand, and then Vice-chair Kane. COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: I would just like to hear what the residents at 31 Miles had to say that you were to starting. TIM MURPHY: He said that he has on numerous occasions when there are major events downtown has come home to find that there's no parking available within his complex. He has to find someplace else to park. And this is at the furthest end of Miles as you can get. CHAIR TALESFORE: Vice-chairman Kane. COMMISSIONER KANE: That was my question. CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay. Thank you very much. Tom Calderwood. TOM CALDERWOOD: Tom Calderwood, 193 Mary Alice. Been in Los Gatos since 1960. I'll just talk to a few points. The parking thing, I was curious about that.

During the month of July I visited the Miles Avenue area 15 times. Parking utilization ranged from 7% to 22%. I went during the weekends, morning, the afternoons, dusk, so I went at all different times. Just another data point.

On the issue of safety, hills are all over Los Gatos. Kids will skateboard down hills. They ride bikes down hills. They drive fast when they become teenagers. It's is what it is. I really think that putting in the skateboard park will help kids be safer rather than increase safety risk. I think we'll end up with a safer condition rather than making it worse.

The final thing is to me it comes down to there's views from both sides. Let the democratic process work. Get it on the ballot. Let people vote on it. I think in any neighborhood there is going to be split opinions about it. Let the voters decide. Thanks.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, questions, Commissioners? None. Well, we are at the end of our speaker cards and I'm sure my fellow commissioners would join me in thanking all of you for participating in the public process tonight. You make all of us proud, so thank you.

And with that I'm going to close the public hearing. I will turn it over to the Commission now for a motion, for discussion, questions of Staff, and I'll take Commissioner Micciche first, and then followed by Commissioner Rice.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I thought this thing was going to be pretty straightforward tonight, because I was looking for something that said there were no changes. So I've got a question of Staff here that says given that we

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1 were shown pictures that that parking lot has been filled and a substantial amount of evidence that said it's used quite a bit, does that constitute a change from the original study? ORRY KORB: Well I'm not going to tell you that it does. It's up to the Commission to decide whether it does. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Okav. ORRY KORB: I'm going to tell you that you do get to consider testimony of perspective changes to the conditions in your determination. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Okay. The second question then may be the same answer, is that since the truck traffic has changed considerably and safety is an issue in the Conditional Use Permit, does that constitute a change in the past three years? ORRY KORB: Same response. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Same response. ORRY KORB: It's up to the Commission to decide. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: So it's up to the individuals based on the evidence we' seen. Okay. ORRY KORB: It's up to you as individuals to decide for yourselves and then as the Commission as a group to convince each other whether changes have occurred. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: And Madam Chairperson?

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Yes?

1	COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: There was evidence that
2	was shown on the screen tonight of that parking lot being
3	filled. There was a number of pictures.
4	CHAIR TALESFORE: Yes.
5	COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: So I wonder if that could
6	be entered and shown again to the Staff by the individual
7	that showed it?
8	CHAIR TALESFORE: Oh, was it not left for our
9	record? It was not.
10	COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I think it was Mr.
11	DiNapoli that had it.
12	RICK DINAPOLI: I had four.
	COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: No, no, he had some other
13	ones.
14	CHAIR TALESFORE: He had other pictures. Could I
15	open the public hearing? How do I do this? I just ask. Could
16	I just have the picture?
17	ORRY KORB: If we can just get the picture and put
18	it up on the
19	CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you.
20	ORRY KORB: And I think if you could leave that
21	picture for the record, and any other pictures you brought
22	in that you referred to.
23	RICK DINAPOLI: Gladly.
24	COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I can't see the dates on
25	that though. Can we make that clearer, or could you

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1 RICK DINAPOLI: I could... I'll read... CHAIR TALESFORE: We'll have our Staff... 2 COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: We'll have our Staff do 3 it. CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. 5 RICK DINAPOLI: These are the four things that I've shown. CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, hand them over to Mr. Parsons. Thank you. Okay, Mr. Micciche, you would want? COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I just wanted to understand the dates that those were taken. 11 CHAIR TALESFORE: Can you read the dates to us? 12 RICK DINAPOLI: I can. They were from May 2007 to 13 July 2007. 14 COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Okay, thank you. That's all I had for right now. 16 CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you, Commissioner 17 Micciche, Commissioner Rice. 18 COMMISSIONER RICE: It was covered. Thank you. CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner O'Donnell. 19 COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: Obviously there is a lot 20 of emotion. I'm going to share with the Commissioners my initial analysis, so I'd invite your comments on it. It is not enough, I don't believe, that one could 23 disagree at this point with the Negative Declaration,

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because the time to attack the Negative Declaration is long gone.

The photos I've seen shows that perhaps the Negative Declaration was wrong, perhaps it wasn't, I don't know. You would need evidence that there was a change of circumstance since the Negative Declaration, and we're being asked for something where that becomes relevant.

So at this point I think to deny the extension is a very drastic act, because it does rob the electorate of the chance to do—I think, perhaps something could be done to it—but it seems to rob the electorate of a chance once and for all I think to decide this.

And I think we have to be careful and perhaps need some legal help here, not in ultimate facts, I'm not doing that, but for example the suggestion was that Mr. Korb had made factual statements when of course that's not true at all. On Exhibit A what he said was before granting an extension the deciding body must find from the evidence, and he stated the two things. He didn't say those were true. He simply said you must find those, otherwise you can't grant the extension. So I would like to correct the record on that.

But the way I view this again is if we find that there's credible evidence that says either the Negative...

Well, we can't attack the Negative Declaration, it's over and done with, but since the determination. A part of our

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue problem tonight is we don't have the Negative Declaration in front of us, we haven't reviewed the Negative Declaration in those years, but we need evidence not that somebody's parking there, but that somebody wasn't parking there when the Negative Declaration was originally done. I haven't heard that.

So I guess I'm concerned not because I'm not sympathetic with both sides on this, but I am saying what is our job here? We adopted a CUP after doing the CEQA requirements, after adopting a Negative Declaration, and if we have to revisit this every time, we have fairly narrow constraints, and the constraint is have the facts changed?

In the first place, photographs I've seen haven't shown the parking lot full. They've shown some cars in the parking lot more than we've been led to believe on some occasions. On the other hand we heard a testimony from a gentleman who was there 22 times, or whatever it was, and his observations were consistent with the Staff's supposed observations for the Negative Declaration.

So I'm just saying the way I look it is if this Commission can say the facts have changed since the Negative Declaration, perhaps we should indeed deny the extension.

But I just want to be very careful that it isn't enough that you say gee whiz, there are cars there. What you want to know if have the cars changed from the time we adopted the Negative Declaration?

And as far as the downhill problem is concerned, I agree with everybody who said hills are a problem with skateboards, and whether we put the park here or somewhere else is not going to cause the skateboard riders not to go down hills, and putting a skateboard on a flat surface seems to be somewhat of a contradiction in terms. So I think that if in fact the speakers are correct that nobody wants this, then it will be denied at the ballot box. If in fact it's Edelen that doesn't want it, then perhaps it won't be. So I just throw that out for discussion purposes.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you, Commissioner
O'Donnell. That's giving us a lot to think about and
probably some of us were thinking that. Commissioner Rice,
Micciche, and then Bourgeois. I think that was in order.

COMMISSIONER RICE: I'm just curious, do we have a copy of the Mitigated Negative Declaration available?

RANDY TSUDA: We have a copy in the file.

COMMISSIONER RICE: Because for me to determine whether or not there was a change would be kind of difficult since I wasn't on the Commission when it was originally passed and I never saw it.

RANDY TSUDA: This is not to answer that part of your question directly. We've reviewed these photographs that were handed out, and we compared them against the park (inaudible) that were contained within the Mitigated Negative Declaration. The Negative Declaration reported that

in that Miles Avenue lot, and that's generally consistent
with what has been submitted in this latest sheet, and it's
still consistent with the other observations that you've
heard today.

So again, I'm not trying to dismiss all the testimony you've heard tonight, I'm simply reacting to the photographs that we've just received, that these are generally consistent with the numbers that were contained in the Negative Declaration.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Does that answer your question, Commissioner Rice?

COMMISSIONER RICE: Not completely.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay. Do you have a follow-up question or discussion?

COMMISSIONER RICE: The applicant is the one that's providing the information, which we wouldn't take from if it was a different applicant.

(Small applause from audience.)

COMMISSIONER RICE: Please. So I'm struggling with it. Obviously I'm not saying that it's not correct, I just never saw it to begin with, and now I'm being asked to say that nothing has changed from what I never saw, and that's a concern to me, and I'll leave it at that.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: (Inaudible).

CHAIR TALESFORE: I'll have to go in order. We'll get right back to you, Commissioner O'Donnell. Commissioner Bourgeois. Oh, I'm sorry, Commissioner Micciche. Oh, I'm so sorry.

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COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: She keeps doing that. I guess I wanted to get clarification from my fellow Commissioner O'Donnell, my learned lawyer Commissioner here. The statement that the Negative Declaration has been passed and so forth, I thought we saw evidence tonight that during this some time there was a change in that aspect, because we were told one thing but have now seen another in that same period of time. Does that constitute a change?

CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner O'Donnell, go ahead. You may respond, please.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: What I'm trying to say is this. If someone wants to suggest to us that we should not grant the extension, then they have the burden of persuasion, okay? And that means they say look, in your Negative Declaration this is what it said. I didn't hear that tonight. And this is how it's changed, because if you compare today to the Negative Declaration, you can see the change. I heard nothing like that. I heard look at my photos; there are cars in the parking lot. And if you're telling me there aren't cars in the parking lot, there are, and that's great, except that the reason you have some finality to CEQA is for obvious reasons, and if someone

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue wants to attack a Negative Declaration, the statute provides how long they get to do that. It wasn't attacked here. It wasn't appealed here. It's a final document. I heard not one word saying here's what it said in the Negative Declaration and here is why it's changed. If you want to say there's more than 12% cars parked there, fine, but it isn't our burden to defend the Negative Declaration, it is their burden to show us why the Negative Declaration is no longer current.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Just a question back to Mr. O'Donnell, if I may, since it's on the same subject?

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay. Commissioner Bourgeois, I promise we'll get to you.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: In the Staff Report they refer to the Negative Declaration by stating that there was sufficient parking that was made, that the study that made that show these numbers. The evidence showed during that same time there are higher numbers now.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: One thing, I'm not trying to talk anybody out of this.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: I will just tell you that a traffic study, as Mr. Murphy pointed out, is usually fairly detailed. I saw the traffic study in 2004. I don't remember it. We could look at it. But the photos I saw, I

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can't say they prove the Negative Declaration is wrong. If you can, then you've got better recall than I do.

 $\label{local_commissioner_micciche:} \mbox{I can't prove it, but I} \\ \mbox{can question it.}$

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: But the question becomes whose burden is it? If it is enough to suggest that we should deny this because you have a question, it really raises serious issues as to finality.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I don't mind raising them.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: I don't care whether this is the skateboard park or anything else, I would like to think that an applicant has some comfort in saying been there, done that, and if you want to say you haven't been there and you haven't done it, or it's changed, then you've got to prove it, and I didn't hear that, that's all.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner Bourgeois, was your comment about what we're talking about, or can I have Vice-chair Kane comment? Okay, Vice-chair Kane.

COMMISSIONER KANE: I have the luxury of not being a lawyer, and so do most of the speakers, so I'm going to go way out on a limb and for the first time in my life disagree with Commissioner O'Donnell, not.

If the speakers say if this and this and this, and if the speakers say if that, that, and that, you know it's my responsibility to apply what they say to the Mitigated Negative Declaration to know if there has been a change. I

LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue don't think it's theirs. They're not attorneys. I disagree. You know, I could get schooled on that, but I think that makes some sense. I ought to know based on what they say whether or not there's a change, and so I go back to what Commissioner Rice said, maybe I ought to go look, because I didn't.

I don't know. This is more complicated than I certainly thought it was going to be. The problem with extensions is that things change, and we've been dealing with this since June 2004. It had tentative go ahead in August 2004, it stared the process anyway, and that's three years, two months. And the one thing that's occurred to me while the speakers were coming up and in looking at the children—hi, guys—who came down tonight, is they may not have been here three years and two months ago.

My point being that if skateboarding and rollerblading are gaining in popularity, and more and more kids, and more and more ticked off adults, and more and more traffic jams, then we've got more kids headed for that park, and there are specific numbers in this proposal that might need to be reexamined as then applies to safety, as then applies to traffic, parents stopping. If we've got twice as many skateboarders, 50% more than was reported in the report, we may need to look at that.

It has nothing to do with delaying the process.

This is due process, the fact that we had an apartment

1 |complex like this about two years ago where the applicant 2 had came up for a second extension and town attorney said 3 |well you know, sometimes we just give that first extension, because they have a right to look for more financing and do this and do that, and the second one was coming up, and I said, "How many?" and he said well the second one's a little bit more touchy, because you've got the land lying fallow-he didn't say that, I did-land lying fallow and things have changed. Well what had changed was the demand for rental units, and as a consequence the application was withdrawn, I think.

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What matters is that things do change over time. In one year things can change a lot. In three years they can change a hell of a lot, especially with this town and what we have growing here and how many children we have. I think that may need to be reexamined, given the popularity of the sport. Why? Because it goes to safety.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you, Commissioner Kane. And Commissioner Bourgeois, let's go to you.

COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: I have a couple of comments and questions for Staff mainly.

First of all, we heard testimony that the types of numbers of vehicles being used in the Corp Yard has changed. I mean it's the Town's Corp Yard. Has there been a change? I mean we can get that out of the way.

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ORRY KORB: No. In fact the number of vehicles, trucks, have gone down because of the sale of the Town's Sanitary Sewer Division, and the total headcount in that entire maintenance yard is down below what it was previously.

COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: Okay, thank you. Secondly, if I could get maybe clarification from the Town Attorney, if you could talk a little bit about the CEQA threshold that tips it from a Mitigated Negative Declaration to a the need for an EIR, because in the past I know we've taken pause on certain projects and stepped back in light of substantial new evidence, taken a look at the adequacy of the CEQA documentation, and how does this differ? Is it because the Mitigated Negative Declaration has already been made?

ORRY KORB: Yes.

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COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: And so in those other cases it was not yet approved, so we took pause.

ORRY KORB: That's correct.

COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: So in light of that how do we view this new evidence? I mean if you can maybe comment on Commissioner O'Donnell's perspective.

ORRY KORB: I'm not going to tell the Commissioner how to make a decision regarding the evidence. I cannot do that. Commissioner O'Donnell has articulated a very interesting analysis of how to determine whether a change

has occurred, or how to determine whether evidence of a change has been presented. He's expressed his view. He has clearly stated to the rest of the Commission that you may feel differently, but that's one Commissioner's view. The rest of you have to decide this for yourself, you have to weigh this evidence for yourself, you have to take into consideration whatever factors you believe make it possible for you to determine whether a change in circumstances has occurred. I know it's difficult, but that's what you're paid for.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you. For that we want a raise.

. COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: I mean to make the Commissioners maybe feel a little better about weighing this evidence, I believe there is CEQA case law that upholds non-technical evidence as substantial evidence.

ORRY KORB: Yeah, in the CEQA context, and you're

COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: Right.

ORRY KORB: ...but yes, in the CEQA context that is true. As a matter of fact I think sitting in the audience someplace is somebody who probably knows quite a bit about that, former-Commissioner Burke, who once had an issue along those lines as well.

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LOS GATOS PLANNING COMMISSION 10/24/2007 Item #2, 41 Miles Avenue COMMISSIONER BOURGEOIS: But the point I wanted to make is that substantial significant evidence on a topic does not have to come from a technical expert.

ORRY KORB: That's correct. You can be deemed an expert just based on your particular knowledge of the facts regarding a specific area, whether you're trained as one or not.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: I have a question for Mr. Korb,
I think. Well I'm not sure whom it would go to, but anyway.
So if we did find some significant evidence that could change the environment that we have, can conditions be added to this CUP or not?

ORRY KORB: At the beginning of the hearing, and thank you, Commissioner O'Donnell, for clarifying what I said, because it's true, what I did at the beginning of the discussion was read the language from the Code, and B2 of the Code does say, or at least does fairly clearly imply, that new conditions could be added regarding additional facts. But I would be very cautious to do that, because you may have additional facts, but you don't have a lot of study with regard to those facts, and you haven't had the opportunity to determine the impact of the kind of conditions you're talking about, so I'm just simply saying yes, you have the authority, but cautioning you to be very circumspect about how you exercise that authority.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, Thank you very much.

Commissioner O'Donnell, Micciche, and Commissioner Sayoc.

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COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: Let me say this, that an environmental document can become too old, can become stale, can become out of date, in which case we shouldn't rely on it. That would mean that we would make a finding that the Negative Declaration, although when we adopted it it was correct, et cetera, but there have been changes and therefore we should no longer rely on that out of date Negative Declaration.

I would suggest to you if that's the occasion it might be nice if we read the Negative Declaration and compared it to the facts we are now hearing, because I can tell you right away that the last time I looked at that Negative Declaration was out of memory. So if people want to continue this so we can look at the Negative Declaration in light of what we've heard and decide whether we think that the environmental documents are stale, at least I could then do it in good conscience and look at it and we could see. But I mean to sit here tonight and say golly, on what we've heard the Negative Declaration, which I question whether any of us remember it, is now out of date, that would be a real leap.

 $\mbox{So I'm not on one side of the other of this thing,}$ but I am saying lets be very careful in doing it, and if you

CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner Micciche was next, followed by Commissioner Sayoc. Then I'll saying something. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Thank you. I've got two others for Staff. What if the recommendation from the Commission were for a continuance so we could study the Negative Declaration? Is this a plausible way to go? ORRY KORB: Can you do that? Yes. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Yeah, we can. Okay, and the second one is what if we were to deny the continuance? What is the action that takes place after that? ORRY KORB: Well, your decision is final unless appealed to Council. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Okay, thank you. CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner Sayoc. COMMISSIONER SAYOC: Actually, I can tell you right now that I don't feel comfortable making a decision without having looked at the Negative Declaration in front of us. I wasn't here three years ago, and after hearing tonight's evidence I can certainly say that I can't make that judgment call, so I would definitely agree that I'd like a continuance at the very least to receive that information.

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The second comment, I guess second question, is a question of Staff. How does approval or denial of the time extension affect the February election?

ORRY KORB: I'm going to tell you not to take that into consideration. Your issue is a land use issue and it's defined by the Code. The election issue is a separate one and really shouldn't come into play with regard to your decision-making.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Commissioner Kane, and then Commissioner Micciche.

COMMISSIONER KANE: I'm ready to make a motion and see if it flies, see if I can get a second. Pardon me? Did you want to make the motion?

CHAIR TALESFORE: No, I was referring to Commissioner Micciche.

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COMMISSIONER KANE: I move that we continue the Conditional Use Permit U-07-155 to a time certain, during which time, if this is a reasonable request, Staff provide for us please a summary of the comments tonight and a copy of the Mitigated Negative Declaration, so that we can reread it and also consider that in light of the testimony we've received this evening, and if we're not specific and limited to that, let's just see if things have changed in three years and two months and if we have to revisit the whole auestion.

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COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I'll second the motion. I'd like to have you add something to it though as the seconder, and that is that they also evaluate the evidence that was presented tonight to aid us and assist us in understanding if it is a change from the Negative Declaration. Is that a possibility? COMMISSIONER KANE: I'm overwhelmed. You've never seconded one of my motions in five years. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I know. It's the first time you've been right. CHAIR TALESFORE: Thank you very much. Commissioner Kane, will you be accepting that? COMMISSIONER KANE: I accept the amendment. 13 CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, Commissioner O'Donnell. 14 COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: I guess the one question 16

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I have, and I'll direct this to Staff. The CUP runs out on December 8th. Assuming we accept this for a date certain, you know, it's not going to be next week or two weeks from now probably, if we were to deny it tonight, I have this premonition that it might be appealed, and if it were appealed it might indeed get before the Council on or before December 8th, and if it got decided by the Council at least it would be a final determination, whereas when we make a determination it doesn't necessarily come the final determination.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Good point.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: And I guess I would hate to see us kill this with kindness. I'm not suggesting that's an answer, but it just occurred to me when we were doing this, perhaps by saying let's study it some more, and Mr. Korb can tell us don't think, but if the reality is that it runs out on December 8^{th} and we have prevented it from reaching finality, I'm going to think. So I throw that out for consideration. CHAIR TALESFORE: That was a question of Staff. COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: I'd like to get Staff's say. CHAIR TALESFORE: That was a question of Staff.

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ORRY KORB: I am going to say contrary to the opinion of some, I've never told the Commission not to think. But Mr. Tsuda did remind me that you have one meeting scheduled between now and the expiration date, so it is possible. I don't know what scheduling problems there would be, but it is possible to give you that one more bite at the apple before the expiration date. If you were to deny tonight and the matter would be appealed, the date is automatically extended based on the fact that it's been appealed, the expiration date.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Do you have one more question? COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: If were we to take the time and have the one more meeting, and deny it, and it were appealed, would that automatically stay the...

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ORRY KORB: Yes.

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Yes.

COMMISSIONER O'DONNELL: So then I feel better. Thank you.

CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, Commissioner Kane.

COMMISSIONER KANE: We have extended continuances for the convenience of the calendar before. In this case it would be 12/12, because that's our next date after the November meeting, which is in two weeks. But I remember offering that the continuance be terminated the day after that date certain, so we have done it in the past, have we not? Couldn't we extend this to 12/13 and the date certain be 12/12?

ORRY KORB: You did something like that once and I can't recall exactly how that went, but I think what you did was the Commission granted an extension of less than a year, which is something you can do under the Code.

COMMISSIONER KANE: My concern is this, if I may, Madam Chair? I don't want to pass this on to Council. We have a job to do and we ought to do it.

COMMISSIONER MICCICHE: Yeah, agreed.

COMMISSIONER KANE: And then if it has to go to Council for whatever reason, that's fine. Whether or not it goes to Council, I don't care. But I do want to do my job, and Steve's brought up the Mitigated Negative Declaration question and it's a darn good one. I don't want to pass it

1	onto them until we've decided that. What I need to do, Town
2	Attorney, is change my motion to include the twelfth?
3	CHAIR TALESFORE: Repeat your motion.
4	COMMISSIONER KANE: That we continue CUP U-07-155
5	to a time certain. That we gather evidence. That we get what
6	was said here tonight as provided by Staff, and that we, as
7	Commissioner Micciche said, take that into due
8	consideration. Study the Mitigated Negative Declaration and
9	see if anything has changed. Then we can decide the question
0	and send that to wherever it's going to go. I guess the
1	second plank of that then has to be that we on an ad hoc
2	basis just move the expiration from 12/8 to at least 12/13.
	CHAIR TALESFORE: We have some clarification from
3	Staff. Mr. Tsuda.
4	RANDY TSUDA: I would recommend that you continue
5	it to the next meeting. You do have one meeting before this
6	permit expires. I would suggest you continue it to November
7	14.
8	COMMISSIONER KANE: Two weeks?
9	RANDY TSUDA: Two weeks.
0	CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay.
1	COMMISSIONER KANE: You think that's adequate time
2	for you to get the info we want?
3	RANDY TSUDA: We'll have to make that work.
4	COMMISSIONER KANE: That's okay with me.
5	CHAIR TALESFORE: Is that okay with the seconder?

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CHAIR TALESFORE: Okay, I would support your 2 motion for the very same reason. We didn't have all the information and we have new information being presented to us. It's hard to make a decision when you only have half of a page in your hand. So okay, with that, Commissioners, I will take the vote now. All in favor? Opposed? None. Motion carries 7-0 to continue this case. Thank you.
